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

or several years before the debut of the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival in 1992, there was a dream of creating and providing a national showcase for outstanding high school concert bands. This dream of BOA's leadership was buoyed by the support of several icons in music education. Dr. William D. Revelli, whose high school bands from Hobart, Indiana won

the National Band Contest of the 1920s and 30s several times, told stories that no one else could tell about the positive impact of that program on music education, and how a national stage could again bring together America's finest.

John P. Paynter, the revered Director of Bands at Northwestern University, hosted the first two National Concert Band Festivals and was instrumental in the planning and design of the non-competitive festival. Gary D. Green, now Director of Bands at the University of Miami (FL), gave enthusiastic input and ideas, as did many other key conductors and educators who were part of those early years of the festival and

continue to share their wealth of musical knowledge with the performing ensembles.

Today, the Music for All National Festival, presented by Yamaha, is a national showcase of the finest instrumental scholastic music. The festival comprises the National Concert Band Festival, the Orchestra America National Festival, the Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival and the Middle School National Music Festival, as well as three national honor ensembles – the Honor Band of America, Honor Orchestra of America and the Jazz Band of America. The invited ensembles and honor ensemble members performing this week were selected through a recorded audition process. The listening panels included many of the most respected music educators in the country. Those selected were deemed to have achieved the highest level of musical performance and artistry.

With the Orchestra America National Festival, Music for All provides a national showcase

and educational opportunity – and a positively life-changing experience – for string players and orchestras.

The Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival provides a national forum for performance and recognition of America's outstanding concert percussion ensembles. Ensemble members perform and participate in the full festival experience. The festival is endorsed by the Percussive Arts Society and honors the legacy of the late Sandy Feldstein, former Music for All board member and a significant force in percussion education.

The National Concert Band Festival serves as a model for non-competitive performance and education festivals nationwide. The Middle School

National Music Festival was added in 2009 to provide this positively life-changing experience for middle school bands and orchestras as well.

The Music for All National Festival provides a positive atmosphere that celebrates music making. All ensembles participate in scheduled audience time, ensuring a sizeable and knowledgeable audience for the concerts. Each ensemble receives written and recorded evaluation from a panel of renowned educators and conductors and a post-concert clinic. Students also participate in instrumental master classes with world-class musicians.

Col. Arnald Gabriel, retired conductor and Commander of the United States Air Force Band, has called the Music for All National Festival the "epitome" of music festivals in America. We're proud to continue that legacy with this year's festival.





Professor of Music Education at the University of Louisville, where she directs the Symphonic Band and teaches courses in undergraduate and graduate conducting, graduate research and music education.

Mr. Crabiel is a regular extra percussionist and timpanist with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra



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

Col. Gabriel received two awards of the Bronze Star Medal, the Combat Infantryman's Badge and the French Croix de Guerre. In 1946, Col. Gabriel enrolled in Ithaca College, where he earned degrees in music education. In 1989, his alma mater conferred upon him an Honorary Doctor of Music degree, and in 1997 he was further honored with its Lifetime Achievement Award. Richard Floyd is presently in his 49th year of professional involvement as a conductor, music educator and administrator. He has been an evaluator and clinician for the Music for All National Festival nearly every year since its inception, and in 2010 he was a conductor for the MFA Summer Symposium concert band division.

Mr. Floyd has enjoyed a distinguished career at virtually every level of wind band performance from beginning band programs through high school and university wind ensembles as well as adult community bands. Live Oak Emerald Regime Band, the band was eight-time California State Champion and received numerous awards for concert, symphonic and jazz band. He is an active judge for DCI (Drum Corps International) in addition to Bands of America and holds the position of Drum Corps International Pacific judges' coordinator. As a composer and arranger, he has prepared more than 100 arrangements and original compositions. Mr. Rubino has designed and implemented an elementary music program that has proven to be highly successful in teaching 4th through 6th grade students the basic elements of music.

Although he always played percussion in the Honor Band of America, Teegarden's principal instrument is cello. Teegarden is currently a freshman at the University of Florida, where he is studying both finance and cello performance. He received a cello performance scholarship and hopes to be a professional cellist after college.

"The connections alone that Will made through Music for All will be integral in his future career as a musician," said Mrs. Teegarden. "The friendships that he made with the other students in the program will last him a lifetime. What an amazing opportunity and experience for a young musician."

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




he opportunity to learn music for its own sake is in itself a sound reason for studying music. But there are additional benefits that seem to be important to us now.

Research informs us that music instruction trains the mind in many ways beyond acquiring musical skill and knowledge. Studying an instrument increases spatial-temporal reasoning skills — our ability to visualize in space and time. It's an important skill in solving math and engineering problems and in understanding fractions and proportions. Music students develop the mental flexibility to think and read ahead while performing a precise task in the present. As students begin to compose and improvise, they learn to consider options in real time and make quick decisions. Since music is a language in

its own right, musicians learn to think in pitches, timbres and tempos without the aid of words and sentences. Translating these musical thoughts into the act of playing an instrument introduces young minds to thinking in the abstract. Musicians practice in order to master a piece of music. The discipline and honest selfevaluation required is excellent training for any future activity. All of these skills are necessary for success in the 21st century workplace, and we want to give



our kids every opportunity to succeed.

Research reveals strong correlations between quality music education in school and:

- . Healthy social development
- Preparation for the 21st century workplace έ.
- · Quality of a young person's life

Music students score higher on SATs:

Many studies support similar conclusions - music making helps the brain develop in many positive ways, and it advances core learning and personal skills for life. Mark O'Connor, violin Performing with the Honor Orchestra of America, Friday and Saturday, March 18 and 19

A product of America's rich aural folk tradition as well as classical music, Mark O'Connor's creative journey began at the feet of a pair of musical giants. The first was the folk fiddler and innovator who created the modern era of American fiddling, Benny Thomasson; the second, French jazz violinist, considered one of the

greatest improvisers in the history of the violin, Stephane Grappelli. Along the way, between these marvelous musical extremes, Mark O'Connor absorbed knowledge and influence from the multitude of musical styles and genres he studied. His newest CD, Follow the Sun (Concord) was released in Spring 2010. Other recent recordings include a solo piano CD entitled The Nearness of You (Arbors Records) and a two-piano recording

with Dick Hyman, Meeting of the Minds (Victoria). Mr. Berg is known for his collaborations with jazz vocalists, and he has performed, recorded and arranged for Patti Austin, Nancy Wilson, Bobby McFerrin, Kurt Elling, Monica Mancini, Dionne Warwick, Tierney Sutton, Lorraine Feather and Carmen Bradford.

He maintains a busy, worldwide schedule of jazz festival and club performances and has performed Music, where he was on faculty for 16 years. He is and/or recorded with a "Who's Who" of jazz legends, including Ray Brown, Louie Bellson, Eddie for Jazz Education (IAJE) and was honored as the Daniels, Peter Erskine, Jon Faddis, Woody Herman, James Moody, Arturo Sandoval, Tom Scott, Clark Terry and Bill Watrous, to name a few. Dave Brubeck raves, "Shelly Berg is a great jazz pianist who has a total command of his instrument." He is also a frequent quest artist on Jim Cullum's Riverwalk Jazz radio series (PBS), where he explores the music of great stride pianists such as James P. Johnson and Fats Waller. Mr. Berg's composing and orchestrating for television includes ABC's Fudge, CBS's A League of Their Own, and HBO's Dennis Miller Live. He has orchestrated for Chicago, Kiss, Carole King, Richard Marx, Joe Cocker, Elliott Smith, Lou Rawls, Section Workshop for Jazz Directors, Essentials Steve Miller and most recently was a featured orchestrator on Ray Sings, Basie Swings (a Ray Charles/Count Basie Orchestra collaboration) as well as Arturo Sandoval's A Time for Love (Concord), Film orchestration work includes Warner Bros's Almost Heroes and For Your Consideration, Fox's Men of Honor and the NBC mini-series The '60s. He has written for the Royal Philharmonic, the American Symphony and orchestras worldwide. Mr. Berg composed the theme song to the 1986 U.S. Olympic Festival

and orchestrated Anniversary Concerto for the 10th anniversary of the Emperor's coronation. His orchestrations are called "magnificent... incredible" by Johnny Mandel.

A Steinway piano artist, Mr. Berg is the Dean of the Frost School of Music at the University of Miami. He was previously the McCoy/Sample Professor of Jazz Studies at the USC Thornton School of a past president of the International Association 2003 "Educator of the Year" by the Los Angeles Jazz Society. In 2002, Mr. Berg was the recipient of the IAJE Lawrence Berk Leadership Award, and in 2000 the Los Angeles Times named him one of three "Educators for the Millennium." Mr. Berg was a finalist in the 1988 Great American Jazz Piano Competition and has appeared as a performer and lecturer throughout the United States as well as in Canada, China, Mexico, Europe, Israel, Japan, Romania and Venezuela.

Mr. Berg has numerous compositions for jazz ensemble in publication, and his texts include the Chop-Monster improvisation series, Rhythm of Jazz Theory (Alfred Publishing) and Jazz Improvisation: The Goal-Note Method (Kendor Music). He has also recorded over 30 disks for the Yamaha Disklavier piano.

The founding Music Director of the Illinois Chamber Orchestra, Larry Livingston has appeared with the Houston Symphony, the Los Angeles Philharmonic Green Umbrella Series, the Festival de Musique in France, the Stockholm Wind Orchestra, the Pan Pacific Festival Orchestra in Sydney, at the International Jazz Festival in Rome and with Keiko Abe in Tokyo. Mr. Livingston regularly conducts in Europe. Formerly Dean of the

Thornton School of Music at the University of Southern California, Mr. Livingston is Music Director of Thornton Orchestras. Reviews describe, "long, unending applause, enthusiastic cheers, like at a rock concert." During 2007-09, he appeared with the George Enescu Philharmonic Orchestra in Romania; festival orchestras in Arizona, Texas, Indiana and Colorado; and the Idyllwild Festival Orchestra in Disney Hall. As a motivational speaker, he holds a national reputation for his presentation, Conducting Your Company, Conducting Your Life. From 2002 to 2007, he was also a member of the Board of Directors of the Guitar Center, whom he now serves as Director of Educational Initiatives. At the personal request of Quincy Jones, Mr. Livingston chairs the Education Committee of the Quincy Jones Musig Summit.

Conductor Krzysztof Urbański becomes the ISO's seventh Music Director at the beginning of the 2011-12 season. At age 28, Urbański is the youngest music director among major orchestras in the United States.

The Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra's Learning Community creates pioneering and inspiring musical opportunities through concerts, programs, workshops, symposiums and resources that serve over 100,000 people from around the state. In its history, the Young People's Discovery Concerts have attracted more than one million young children, and the annual Side-by-Side program has paired hundreds of student musicians with their orchestra counterparts for the last 20 years. The ISO adopted the Metropolitan Youth Orchestra into its educational offerings in 2008, and the program continues to enrich the lives of our inner city youth and their families through music education.

The ISO was the first orchestra in the world to offer digital music downloads on InstantEncore.com and currently maintains the largest digital music library of any orchestra on that site. In addition, the orchestra uses mobile fan applications and its innovative text messaging platform, mSYMPHONY – to connect to audiences worldwide. You can also find the ISO actively participating in online conversations about music and the concert experience on Facebook, Twitter, Flickr and the ISO Blog.

As one of America's leading orchestras, the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra's mission is to inspire, entertain, educate and challenge through innovative programs and symphonic music performed at the highest level. This mission fits perfectly with Music for All's mission to create, provide and expand positively life-changing experiences through music for all.





Hilbert Circle Theatre

Constructed in 1916 in the style of the mid-18th century English architect Robert Adam and originally named the Circle Theatre, the Hilbert Circle Theatre in downtown Indianapolis was one of the first motion picture palaces west of New York built especially for the purpose of showing feature-length photoplays. The Theatre fell into disrepair in the 1970s with the advent of suburban multitheater movie houses and faced possible demolition before the combined efforts of the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indianapolis, the Commission for Downtown and the Theatre's next door neighbor, Indianapolis Power and Light Company, succeeded in placing the Theatre on the National Register of Historic Places. After a \$6.8 million renovation in 1982, the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra opened its 1984 season in the newly converted concert hall, where it has performed ever since.

The historic Theatre's intimate size (1,781 seats) and customized stage area create a superb venue for live performances. In December 1996, the Orchestra received a \$10 million gift from Mr. & Mrs. Stephen Hilbert, the largest single contribution from a living person in the Orchestra's history. In recognition of that gift, the venue was renamed Hilbert Circle Theatre. In May 2002, the Orchestra began a four-month \$2.75 million renovation of the Hilbert Circle Theatre stage that was initiated to provide more performance space and to improve the on-stage acoustics for the musicians. The renovation included new acoustical clouds that can be adjusted for performance as well as new walls, flooring, fly space rigging and reverberation chambers above the stage to enhance the already superb acoustics of the hall.

The Hilbert Circle Theatre is one of the few prominent early 20th century movie palaces that remains active and in operation today, and its storied history was the subject of a cable television profile by the American Movie Classics cable television network, hosted by Robert Doran.

Richard Clary Conductor

Richard Clary is Professor of Music, Senior Band Conductor and Director of Wind Ensemble Studies at The Florida State University. His primary duties include serving as Music Director and Conductor for the University Wind Orchestra and Chamber Winds, teaching graduate-level conducting and wind literature courses and providing guidance for both FSU's Master of Music degree program in Wind Band Conducting and the Wind Band Conducting Major emphasis in the Ph.D. program in Music Education. Prior to his 2003 appointment at FSU, Professor Clary served 10 years as Director of Bands at the University of Kentucky. During his tenure in Lexington, the UK Wind Ensemble earned a national reputation for excellence through several

acclaimed performances for prestigious musical events, including the 1997 and 2003 National Conferences of the College Band Directors National Association. Most recently, he conducted the FSU Wind Orchestra in the finale concert of the 2007 CBDNA National Conference in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Prior to his appointment at UK, Professor Clary served as a member of the music faculties of the University of Utah in Salt Lake City, the University of Arizona in Tucson and Marcos de Niza High School in Tempe, Arizona. In each environment, ensembles under his direction have received consistent and enthusiastic praise from composers, fellow conductors and audiences for their high levels of musical expression, clarity of texture and authoritative command over a broad range of musical styles.

An active guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator, Professor Clary has served in these capacities throughout the United States and Canada, and in seven countries of Western Europe. In addition to his various band-related activities, he has also enjoyed successful engagements as guest conductor with professional ensembles, including the Lexington Philharmonic (Kentucky), the Renton Civic Theater (Washington) and the Wichita Falls (Texas) symphony orchestras. He holds active memberships in the Music Educators National Conference (MENC), the Florida Music Educators Association (FMEA), the Florida Bandmasters Association (FBA), the College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA), the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles (WASBE), and in March, 2000 he was honored by election to membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association (ABA), He has served as President of the SEC Band Directors Association, founding Chairman of the SECBDA Commissioning Consortium and the past Chairman of the CBDNA National Commissioning Panel. He currently serves as Chairman of the CBDNA Young Band Composers Contest. He also serves as President-elect of the Southern Division of CBDNA, and will serve as that organization's Divisional President in 2011-2012.

Professor Clary holds Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in Music Education from the Arizona State University and has completed course work for the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Instrumental Conducting at the University of Washington in Seattle. His principal conducting teachers have been Richard Strange, Tim Salzman, and Peter Erös.

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



Curtis Essig Director of Bands

Curtis Essig is in his 22nd year of teaching and his 18th year at the Youth Performing Arts School. Prior to his current position; he was Director of Bands at Waggener High School in Louisville, KY from 1989-1993. In 1993, Mr. Essig joined the faculty as the Associate Director of Bands at the YPAS and the Director of Bands at duPont Manual High School. He became the Director of Bands at YPAS in the fall of 2008. Mr. Essig's Bachelor of Music Education and Master of Secondary Education degrees are from the University of Louisville. His teaching responsibilities include:

Intermediate Brass, Chamber Ensemble, Jazz Improvisation, Jazz Ensemble, Symphony Band, Wind Ensemble and the music rotation of Arts and Humanities. Additionally, he supervises the development of etude and solo repertoire for all brass players in the YPAS Instrumental Music Program as well as being responsible for and monitoring the band program as a whole.

Curtis Essig was selected as High School Music Teacher of the Year for District 12 in Kentucky in 1999. He has served multiple terms as KMEA District 12 Band Chair; multiple terms as KMEA All State Jazz Coordinator and held the offices of Secretary, Vice-President, President Elect and President in the Kentucky Unit of the International Association for Jazz Education.



Jason Gregory Assistant Director of Bands

Jason Gregory currently serves as the Assistant Director of Bands for the Youth Performing Arts School and the Director of Athletic Bands for duPont Manual High School in Louisville, KY. Mr. Gregory's teaching responsibilities include Percussion Ensemble, Chamber Ensemble, Intermediate Woodwinds, Symphonic Band, Wind Ensemble, Marching Band, Pep Band, Pit Orchestra and Music Theory. Along with sectional coaches, Mr. Gregory oversees all aspects of the woodwind program at YPAS. Prior to teaching at YPAS and duPont Manual High School, Mr. Gregory was the Director of Bands at Myers Middle School, North

Oldham High School and Henry County Middle and High Schools.

Mr. Gregory also serves as a freelance percussionist, arranger and adjudicator throughout the state of Kentucky. Over the years he has performed with the Louisville Orchestra, Owensboro Symphony, Evansville Symphony and served as a percussion clinician for two Yamaha "Sounds of Summer" camps. As an arranger, he has written for numerous high school programs and two Senior Drum and Bugle Corps. As an adjudicator, he serves as a music and visual judge for Kentucky Music Educator Association (KMEA) sanctioned marching band festivals. Mr. Gregory has also served as a concert band and solo and ensemble adjudicator for the KMEA 5th District Bands.

Mr. Gregory is a graduate of the University of Louisville School of Music (BME 2001) and Indiana Wesleyan University (MED 2008). Mr. Gregory resides in Louisville with his wife Nikki and two children Cole and Hope.



Todd Parker Director of Percussion

Todd Parker has worked throughout the United States as a percussion clinician, performer, writer and arranger since 1980. Mr. Parker is actively involved in public education, having taught groups of all ages, and is currently in his eleventh year as the Director of Percussion Studies at the Youth Performing Arts School. Mr. Parker has also served as instructor with Morehead State University and the University of Louisville. In addition, he is a clinician and performing artist with the Yamaha Corporation of America and an Educational Artist with Vic

Firth Sticks and Mallets. Mr. Parker holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Morehead State University, where he studied with Frank Oddis. The YPAS Percussion Ensemble was a participant in the Music for All National Festival under Mr. Parker's baton in 2007.

Music at Youth Performing Arts School

The YPAS Instrumental Winds and Percussion Program offers a wide variety of classes to prepare students to continue their music studies at the university level. The class offerings include: Music Theory I, Advanced Placement Music Theory II, Arts and Humanities, Applied Piano, Intermediate Band, Chamber Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble, Symphony Band, Wind Ensemble, Full Orchestra, Pit Orchestra, Jazz Improvisation and Jazz Ensemble. Students are enrolled in a minimum of two music classes per semester, and they may schedule more courses, as they become upperclassmen.

Upon acceptance into the program, each student receives an Individualized Curriculum Packet containing four years of specific reading assignments, etudes, solo repertoire and special projects. The curriculum packets are customized by instrument and year in school. Over the course of four years, students will complete 24 etudes of progressive difficulty, 8 solos, many reading/writing assignments and 24 special projects. In addition, they will perform over 100 different concert band compositions focusing on grade five and six literature. On the average, more than 60 students from the YPAS bands are selected annually for All-District Band and more than 30 are selected for an All-State ensemble. Nearly 70% of YPAS students continue their study of music after high school.

YPAS students have gone on to many of the finest universities and conservatories in the nation including Eastman, Juilliard, New England Conservatory, Boston Conservatory, Cleveland Institute, Cincinnati Conservatory, Oberlin, Northwestern University and many more. The YPAS Bands, founded in 1978, have earned distinguished ratings from each prepared-music and sight-reading judge at every local, state and national festival since the school opened. The bands travel annually and have most recently participated in festivals in Indianapolis, Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, San Antonio, New Orleans, Chattanooga, and Toronto and Montreal Canada.

About the school and community

The Youth Performing Arts School is part of the Jefferson County Public School System, serving students in grades nine through twelve. As a magnet school, YPAS has a diverse student population representing all parts of the county. To be admitted, the students must exhibit talent and interest in Dance, Drama, Technical Theater, Musical Theater, Vocal Music, Piano and/ or Instrumental Music. YPAS is located near downtown Louisville and is part of the Educational Park complex, which includes Noe Middle School, duPont Manual High School, YPAS and the University of Louisville. Students who meet the necessary qualifications may take courses at the University of Louisville during the school day as a part of the Educational Park mission. Academics at duPont Manual also include magnet programs in math/ science technology, high school university, communications, and visual arts.

The center of the YPAS building is the 886-seat formal proscenium theater with state of the art production equipment and capabilities. In addition, a 200 seat Experimental Theater allows for more intimate performances of small dramas, chamber concerts and workshops. Brian Froedge Director of Bands

Brian Froedge is currently the director of bands at North Hardin High School. This is Mr. Froedge's 11th year at North Hardin High School. Previously, he was the band director at Radcliff Middle School for six years. Mr. Froedge holds a BA in Music from Transylvania University and a MA in Music Education from Western Kentucky University. Under his direction, the Radcliff Middle School Bands and North Hardin High School Bands have received numerous honors.

The marching band has been a Kentucky State Finalist, a Bands of America Regional Finalist, a Grand National Championships Semi-Finalist, and a Regional Class Champion. In 2009, the marching band placed second in the nation in Class AA at the Grand National Championships. Mr. Froedge's concert bands have performed at the state convention and other invitational events. The concert bands at Radcliff Middle School and North Hardin have consistently received distinguished ratings at the District and State level.

In 1997, Mr. Froedge was named the Fourth District Middle School Music Teacher of the Year, and he has been selected to Who's Who among American teachers. In 1999, Phi Beta Mu honored him as the Outstanding Young Band Director in Kentucky. Mr. Froedge has served as a presenter at the KMEA In-Service Conference and as a guest conductor, guest clinician and adjudicator throughout the state of Kentucky. Additionally, Mr. Froedge has taught numerous sectional rehearsals with the Louisville Youth Orchestra. Mr. Froedge is a "Kentucky Colonel" and has been president of the Fourth District Band Directors Association.

Mr. Froedge is a member of KMEA, MENC, Phi Beta Mu and the National Band Association. Mr. Froedge has also had articles published in the Bluegrass Music News and NBA Journal. In 2006, he was selected from a nation–wide group of applicants as one of two winners of the National Band Associations' International Conducting Symposium, which took him to Italy to tour and conduct for a week. In 2007, Mr. Froedge was elected as the 4th District High School Music Teacher of the Year. Also in 2007, Mr. Froedge was named the Kentucky High School Music Teacher of the Year by KMEA.



J. Abram Barr Associate Director of Bands

Abram Barr is currently Associate Director of Bands and Director of Jazz Studies at North Hardin High School. Since his arrival at North Hardin, the NHHS marching band has been a consistent KMEA State Marching Band finalist in Class 5A.

Mr. Barr's symphonic bands have received distinguished ratings every year at District Concert Festival. The North Hardin Jazz Ensemble was invited to perform for the 2010 KASA Superintendent Annual Conference and received

a distinguished rating at the 2008 University of Louisville Jazz Festival. Mr. Barr holds a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education from the University of Kentucky. Upon entering UK, Mr. Barr received the Lewis Award, UK's most prestigious music scholarship awarded to the top incoming instrumental musician. While attending school, Mr. Barr participated in the UK Wind Ensemble, Symphony Orchestra and Jazz Ensemble. Mr. Barr is a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Fraternity, KMEA and MENC.

Music at North Hardin High School

The North Hardin High School Band began its proud history of excellence with the formation of North Hardin High School in 1962. The instrumental music program currently involves over 250 students in grades nine through twelve. The program consists of three performing concert bands and various other ensembles, including marching band, jazz band, percussion ensemble and pep band.

The North Hardin Wind Symphony has received exclusively superior ratings at the district and state levels since the inception of the state concert festival. The Wind Symphony has performed at numerous venues and conventions, including the Kentucky Music Educators Association State Conference, the University of South Carolina's Directors Symposium, the Mid-West International Band and Orchestra Clinic and Carnegie Hall. This is the band's fourth appearance at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival. In 2003, the band was honored as a recipient of the John Philip Sousa Foundation Sudler Flag of Honor.

About the School and Community

North Hardin High School is located in Radcliff, Kentucky, a friendly city of approximately 21,961 people. The community can best be described as a medium-sided city with a small town environment and lifestyle. The population is multi-cultural and reflects the diverse nationalities that live in Radcliff. This diversity is a direct result of having Fort Knox as the city's closest neighbor. A large sector of the workforce is military based and many government officials and retired military personnel make up the population.

Hardin County School District, the third largest in the state of Kentucky, serves over 13,000 students. The district is comprised of 12 elementary schools, five middle schools and three high schools. North Hardin High School serves approximately 1,300 students in grades nine through 12. The school is diverse and comprised primarily of middle to low-income students. He holds degrees from Illinois State University and the University of Iowa. Bands under his direction have previously appeared three times at the Music

for All National Concert Band Festival, three times at the Illinois Music Educators Association All-State Conference and 12 times at the prestigious Illinois Superstate Band Festival. The band was selected as the Class AAA Honor Band in 1999. In addition, his bands have earned the Grand Championship Award at the Midwest Music Festival three times.

He has appeared as guest conductor with the University of Illinois Summer Youth Music Camp, the Iowa All-State Music Camp, Wheaton Municipal Band, Freeport Concert Band, IMEA Jazz Bands and served on the faculty of Rushmore Music Camp for 15 years. He was also Assistant Director of the Illinois Ambassadors of Music for three European Concert Tours. Mr. Valkema was honored as an Outstanding Chicagoland Music Educator, received an Illinois Math and Science Academy Award of Excellence, and received six Citations of Excellence from the National Band Association. Patrick Hoadley is the Associate Band Director at Plainfield Central High School. A native of Morton, Illinois, he received a Bachelor of Arts in Music Education degree from Elmhurst College. His duties at Plainfield include directing the Concert Band and Jazz Band as well as assisting with the Wildcat Marching Band. Mr. Hoadley was a member of the Blue Stars Drum and Bugle Corps and has served as a marching band

technician at a number of high schools in Illinois and Indiana.

About the school and community

Plainfield Community Consolidated School District 202 is a creative, proactive school system in the southwest Chicago suburbs. The school district is dedicated to ensuring that all students learn, achieve and grow to their maximum potential. From a quiet, rural "bedroom community" in 1994 that consisted of one high school, one middle school and four elementary schools, District 202 now has four high schools, seven middle schools and 17 elementary schools. District 202 serves nearly 30,000 students from a 64-square mile area encompassing the communities of Plainfield, Bolingbrook, Crest Hill, Joliet, Lockport, Naperville and Romeoville, and is currently the 4th largest school district in Illinois. Approximately 2,450 students attend Plainfield Central High School.

Music at Plainfield Central High School

The Plainfield High School band program came into existence in 1947 with director Bill Johnston and continued under the direction of Edward Jones for almost 40 years. The band has received numerous awards throughout a colorful history, including first place in their class at the Illinois Superstate Band Contest, finals placement several times at the State of Illinois Marching Band Championships and the Grand Championship Award at the 2006 Midwest Music Festival. The Symphonic Band performed at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival in 1996 and 1999, was featured at the Illinois All-State Music Conference in 1996 and 2009 and performed as a rehearsal lab ensemble at the 2009 Midwest Clinic. The Plainfield Band Boosters are proud sponsors of the Annual Plainfield Invitational Concert Band Festival, which began in 1993. This non-competitive festival hosts outstanding high school and middle school bands who are evaluated by many of the most prominent music educators in the nation. The band has also been actively involved in a New Music Commission Project, which has featured the works of Jonathan Newman, David Dzubay, and Wataru Hokoyama.

Students in the Plainfield Central Band program participate in either Symphonic or Concert Band and combine to form the Wildcat Marching Band. Two jazz ensembles and Jazz Combo meet as extracurricular activities. An active chamber ensemble program participates in the Annual Holiday Collage Concert and Plainfield Solo and Ensemble Festival. Additional music department opportunities include three curricular choirs, Music Survey, Music Theory 1, AP Music Theory and Commercial Music Production. Band and choir students also have the opportunity to participate in Tri-M Music Honor Society.

Since 1990, the Band program has grown from 42 members to its current membership of 145. Growth in the Plainfield band program was featured as part of a national CNN News story in November 1994, dealing with expanding student interest in bands in the Chicago area and across the United States. The Band enjoys and appreciates strong support from the District 202 Administration, Board of Education and Band Boosters Association.



Steven Lundin is the Director of Bands at DeKalb High School. He directs the DHS Marching Barbs, Jazz Ensemble, Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, Percussion Ensemble and teaches courses in music appreciation. Mr. Lundin holds degrees from The Crane

School of Music and Northern Illinois University with a focus in music education and percussion performance and pedagogy. Originally a native of Setauket, New York, Mr. Lundin has also taught in New York in addition to serving as the assistant director of bands at Long Island's USDAN Center for the Performing Arts. He has presented clinics at various high schools and colleges throughout the Midwest, as well as the 2006 Bands of America Summer Symposium as a member of the Base4 Percussion Quartet. Base4 won the 2003 Percussive Arts Society international competition for collegiate percussion ensembles and performed at the PAS international convention (PASIC). Base4 also performed Akira Nishimura's Concerto for timpani and five percussionists at PASIC's celebration of the solo timpanist in 2007. Mr. Lundin maintains an active private percussion studio and performs as a freelance musician in and around DeKalb.

Mr. Lundin likes to spend his free time with his family. He and his wife Emily have a three-year-old daughter named Mariana as well as a dog and a cat. They live in DeKalb.

Music at DeKalb High School

The DeKalb High School Percussion Ensemble is in its fifth year of existence as a curricular ensemble. The ensemble is comprised of every percussion student enrolled in the DeKalb High School instrumental music program. In addition to regular percussion ensemble rehearsals, students in the percussion techniques course also rehearse music for the marching band, two concert bands and the symphony orchestra. Since the change in curriculum has taken place DeKalb percussionists have enjoyed a tremendous amount of success performing both as individuals and as ensembles. In addition to many student successes in IMEA district and all-state auditions, DHS percussionists have also enjoyed tremendous success participating at the IHSA solo/ ensemble competition. They have also enjoyed pursuing percussion at the collegiate level. The ensemble has performed at the 2009 Percussive Arts Society's Illinois Day of Percussion as well as concerts and tours throughout northern Illinois. In January of 2011, The DeKalb High School Percussion Ensemble performed at the Illinois Music Educator's Association's All-State Convention. The performance marked the third time a DeKalb High School performing ensemble received such an honor. Previous performing ensembles that have represented the school at the state level include: The DHS Jazz Ensemble and the boys a cappella group, Fly Check. The DHS Jazz Ensemble was proud to be named a finalist in the Essentially Ellington Competition in 2008, and two different a cappella groups have participated in ICHSA High School A Cappella Championships in New York City on three occasions. The DHS Percussion Ensemble is proud to join these ensembles in representing the DHS music department on both the state and national level.

The DeKalb Percussion Ensemble holds selection of repertoire to be the most important educational decision that occurs every year. It is the group's sincerest intent that our audiences enjoy the literature that we have prepared for every performance.

About the school and community

DeKalb High School, located in DeKalb, Illinois just minutes from Northern Illinois University, is home to approximately 1,700 students representing the communities of DeKalb, Malta and Cortland. DeKalb's student population is diverse and ever-changing. During Mr. Carroll's tenure at Permian, the marching drum line has won several drum line contests in the western part of Texas. In addition, his groups have won the "Outstanding Percussion Ensemble" award at the West Texas A & M University "Day of Percussion" and have been consistent winners of "First Division" awards at the Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest. He has held clinics for Texas Bandmasters Association, the West Texas A&M University Day of Percussion and the West Texas

Auxiliary Championships. On numerous occasions, he has also conducted the percussion section rehearsal for All-State Bands and Orchestras in Texas, as well as serving as panel chair for the Texas All-State percussion section seating auditions. Mr. Carroll is also a member of the Vic Firth, Inc. Education Team.

Mr. Carroll holds membership in Texas Bandmasters Association, Texas Music Educators Association, Percussive Arts Society and Phi Beta Mu Honorary Band Directors Fraternity.



Lamar Burkhalter Guest Conductor

Lamar Burkhalter currently serves as the Music Director for the NFL Houston Texans, "Bull Pen Pep Band" and serves on the Executive Board of the "Texas Bowl." Mr. Burkhalter is also the Founder/Executive Director of Percussion One Foundation, a nonprofit percussion education and performance organization that performs for many corporate, sporting and community wide events around the Houston area. In addition, N8RHYTHM is Mr. Burkhalter's percussion education company that teaches and guides percussion curriculums around the state of Texas.

Music at Permian High School

The Permian High School Percussion Ensemble has been in existence for 14 years. It is an outgrowth of the award-winning Permian High School Band. It meets completely outside of school hours.

The Percussion Ensemble has won the "Outstanding Percussion Ensemble" award at the West Texas A&M University "Day of Percussion." It is a consistent winner of "First Division" awards at the Texas State Solo/Ensemble Contest. Additionally, the Marching Drum Line has won the West Texas Auxiliary Championships in Lubbock, Texas on four different occasions. It is also a two-time winner of the Randall High School Marching Drum Line Contest in Amarillo, Texas. Individual students from the Percussion Ensemble consistently do well in All-Region, All-Area, and All-state competitions in Texas, as well as Texas solo contests.

The Percussion Ensemble is most appreciative of the support of its percussion parents, without whom today's performance could not be possible.

About the school and community

Located in Ector County in West Texas, the City of Odessa is a community of almost 95,000 residents. The availability of cheap land and the extension of the Texas and Pacific Railway encouraged settlers to the area in the 1880s. By the mid-1890s, Odessa was an established cattle shipping center.

The discovery of oil in 1926 brought people of varied interests and occupations to the area, and the local economy began to change from a ranching base to an industrial one. The city's economy has long been subject to the boom and bust cycles of the oil patch, linked to fluctuations in world demands for petroleum products. Today, Odessa is considered one of the major oil field technology centers in the world.

In September of 1959, the booming oil town of Odessa opened a new school. This newly established academic institution set the highest of standards and thus created a lasting tradition of excellence. Academically, athletically, and artistically, the first Permian High School students strove for success and often succeeded. Our school mascot is the black panther. "MOJO" was born on a chilly fall night in 1967 when a group of students began to intone the phrase at a football game in an effort to motivate the Black Beasts. Even in defeat, however, there was victory as the MOJO cry lived on to permeate the state and become synonymous with victory, glory of triumph and with Permian High School itself. Chanted and echoed by students, faculty and supporters, MOJO stands for the "magic" that comes from the hard work, dedication and quest for excellence that has always been exemplified by students of Permian. Today, Permian is home to over 2,000 students in grades 10 through 12.

Tim Gipson is a native of Louisville, Kentucky. Mr. Gipson is a graduate of North Bullitt High School and earned his Bachelor's degree in Music Education and Master's degree in Music from Morehead State University. He is currently a Director of Bands at Jefferson County Traditional Middle School, where he teaches with Mary Wolf and is the Percussion Director and Assistant Jazz Director at Louisville Male High School with Nan Moore. Mr. Gipson is the fifth grade band teacher at Audubon, Cochran and Lincoln Elementary Schools in Louisville. He also teaches private percussion at Louisville Male High School and Little Flock Academy of Arts, and he is the Worship Leader and music associate at Little Flock Baptist Church. Mr. Gipson has played percussion and

bass guitar professionally throughout the Louisville Area. He is married to Anne (Mefford) Gipson, and they have two children, Grace (nine years old) and Hannah (14 years old). Mr. Gipson is a member of the Kentucky Music Educators Association and Percussive Arts Society.

Music at Louisville Male High School

The band program at Louisville Male High School is under the direction of Nan Moore and involves 130 students. Students at Male are selected through an audition process for the 60-member Symphonic Band or the Concert Band. The music department also includes string orchestra, vocal ensembles and music theory. Opportunities for performance after school hours include a marching band, winter guard, jazz ensemble, basketball pep band and percussion ensemble.

The Symphonic Band has enjoyed many honors over the past three decades. Since 1980, it has consistently received superior ratings at KMEA district festivals and KMEA state concert band festivals. It has also garnered superior ratings at many national and international events, including Music Maestro, Music in the Parks and Dixie Classic Festivals in cities as diverse as Washington, D. C.; Toronto; Chicago; Orlando and Williamsburg. Additionally, the Symphonic Band has been featured at the KMEA In-Service Conference seven times as well as once at the Southern Division Music Educators National Conference. The Symphonic Band was selected to perform at the 2004 CBDNA/NBA Southern Division Conference in Atlanta. In December 2001, the Symphonic Band performed at the prestigious Midwest Clinic in Chicago, Illinois. The Percussion Ensemble has consistently received distinguished ratings at the KMEA Solo and Ensemble Festival and was selected to perform at the 2011 KMEA In-Service conference.

About the school and community

Established in 1856, Louisville Male is the oldest public high school west of the Allegheny Mountains. A growing 19th century river city needed a place to prepare its men for leadership. 
Daniel Morrison

Although grateful for these honors, Mr. Fischer is most proud of the accomplishments of his students, who continue to strive for excellence as performers and as young men and women.



Michael Blackman Associate Director of Bands

A product of the Howard County Public Schools, Michael Blackman eagerly accepted a position as instrumental music teacher with the school system in 1991. He taught in various elementary schools for eighteen years and began his tenure at River Hill High School in 2009. He holds degrees in Music Education from the University of Maryland and the Peabody Conservatory, where he studied conducting with Dr. Harlan Parker.

Mr. Blackman is also the proud director of the Columbia Concert Band, a non-auditioned group of adults who rehearse and perform solely for the love of music. His other musical endeavors have included composing and arranging, adjudicating, assisting with the revision of the Maryland All-State audition process and playing/teaching woodwinds and percussion. Mr. Blackman is honored to have received the Howard County "Music Educator of the Year" award in 2007.



Timothy Beall Director of Percussion

Mr. Timothy Beall, former Associate Director of Band at River Hill, now serves as the full time Director of Bands at Northfield Elementary School. Mr. Beall continues to share his extensive knowledge with the staff and students at River Hill by coordinating and directing the percussion ensemble. He earned his bachelor's degree in music education from the University of Maryland, College Park and is currently in the

final stages of earning a master's degree from the American Band Directors College at Sam Houston University.

Music at River Hill High School

Gerry Miller Director of Bands

Mr. Miller serves as Wakeland's first Director of Bands and Fine Arts Department Chair. He oversees the arts education of over 800 band students in the Wakeland H.S. cluster, teaches the Wind Symphony and Concert Band II classes, and serves as the Department Chair for Fine Arts. Under his direction, the Wakeland H.S. Wind Symphony earned first runner-up in the 2009 AAAA TMEA Honor Band Competition

and the 2008 AAA TMEA Honor Band Competition. The Marching Band earned a fourth place finish at the 2009 UIL AAAA State Marching Band Contest. The Marching Band has also been named Grand Champion at the 2008 and 2009 Denton Golden Triangle Marching Contest and the 2009 Centennial Marching Festival, sweeping all captions at both. Throughout his tenure at Wakeland H.S., the marching band has been a consistent finalist in several Dallas-Fort Worth area marching contests.

The Wakeland Band has numerous soloists and ensembles that earn first division ratings at UIL Region Solo and Ensemble Contest each year, with the majority continuing on to UIL Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest. Since its inception, the Wakeland Band has earned the UIL Sweepstakes Award for receiving overall first division (superior) ratings in marching, concert and sightreading contests. In 2008, Mr. Miller was awarded the prestigious UIL Sponsor Excellence Award. Since 2007, Mr. Miller has taught on the staff of DCI's nine-time World Champion Drum Corps: The Cadets.

Mr. Miller received his Bachelor of Music Education degree at Loyola University, New Orleans, where he served as President of the Loyola University Collegiate Music Education Chapter, President of the Loyola University Bands and Student Coordinator for the Dean's Student Advisory Council. As a member of the Loyola Wind Ensemble, Mr. Miller's principal teachers included Dr. Joseph Hebert and Colonel John Bourgeois. Mr. Miller and his wife Lori live in McKinney, Texas with their 10-year-old son Gerry and three-year-old son Benjamin.



Sarah Marquez

Associate Director of Bands Mrs. Marquez is currently serving her third year on staff with the Wakeland Band.

She teaches the Concert Band and music theory classes; sponsors the Wakeland H.S. chapter of Texas Future Music Educators and the Wakeland Woodwind Choir; and assists with the Marching Band, Symphonic Band and Wind Symphony.

She earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of North Texas

in 2006. While at UNT, Mrs. Marquez performed in the Symphonic Band under Dennis Fisher and the esteemed UNT Wind Symphony under Eugene Migliaro Corporon. Additionally, she led the UNT Green Brigade Marching Band for two years as drum major and was a four-year-member of Dr. Jim Gillespie's clarinet studio. Mrs. Marquez is a 2002 graduate of Coppell High School, where she studied under Scott Mason and Albert Lo, served as Drum Major and was a twotime TMEA All State clarinetist.

Arturo J. Denis Associate Director of Bands

Mr. Denis is Wakeland High School's first Associate Director of Bands. He teaches the Symphonic Band and AP music theory classes; directs the award-winning Wakeland H.S. Jazz Ensemble and Jazz 2; and assists with the Marching Band, Symphonic Band and Wind Symphony. He is the TMEA Region 24 Jazz Coordinator. During his tenure at Wakeland High School, Mr. Denis' Symphonic Band has

earned consecutive UIL Sweepstakes Awards for receiving overall first division (superior) ratings in marching, concert and sight-reading contests since 2008. As Region Jazz Chair, he hosts the all-region jazz auditions, clinic and concert attracting some of the country's finest jazz educators. Both the Wakeland H.S. Jazz Ensemble and Wakeland H.S. Jazz 2 have been awarded the "Outstanding Band Award" by the Collin County Community College Jazz Festival. Under his direction, the Jazz Ensemble won the AAA Classification of the 2008 Texas Christian University Jazz Festival and has placed in the top five finalist bands at the UTA Jazz Festivals. Previously, Mr. Denis served as Assistant Band Director at Clark Middle School in Frisco under the direction of David Dunham. While at Clark Middle School, both Mr. Denis' Concert II and Jazz II bands received "Best In Class" Awards at the Sandy Lake Festival, and his Concert Band II received superior ratings at both Pre-UIL and University Interscholastic League Region XXIV performances. Mr. Denis attended The University of Texas at Austin, where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Music Education. While studying at Texas, he was part of several organizations, including Delta Sigma Phi, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia and the Longhorn Marching Band, where he was named the Most Outstanding Musician. As a member of the "Showband of the Southwest," Mr. Denis was a section leader and a trumpet soloist for the Longhorn Band. He was also a member of the esteemed University of Texas Wind Ensemble under the direction of artistic conductor Jerry F. Junkin. Mr. Denis is a member of TBA and TMEA. Mr. Denis is married to Jenny Denis, a band director at Fowler Middle School in Frisco. Together, they have two chihuahuas and are expecting their first child in May.

Music at Wakeland High School

Students at Wakeland High School develop into highly trained musicians through a vast array of ensembles, allowing them to rise to their fullest potential. The marching bands, concert bands and jazz bands all strengthen the students' abilities, while optional ensembles like woodwind choir, orchestral winds and chamber ensembles allow them to foster their talents in other areas of music education. 95% of students in the Wakeland H.S. cluster are enrolled in private lessons. Additionally, students may register for music theory and AP music theory to further their knowledge and love of music Texas Future Music Educators, a student-division of TMEA.

The Wakeland H.S. Wind Symphony has earned the UIL Sweepstakes Award since the school's inception in 2006. In 2009, the Wind Symphony was named first runner-up in the TMEA AAAA Honor Band Contest with their recordings of Hindemith's "March" from Symphonic Metamorphosis, Ellerby's Paris Sketches, and Grantham's J.S. Dances. In 2008, they were named first runner-up in the TMEA AAA Honor Band Contest with their recordings of Sousa's The Black Horse Troop, Holst's 1st Suite in Eb and Ticheli's "Apollo Unleashed" from Symphony No. 2. Additionally, the Wind Symphony has been named Best in Class at several regional and national competitions.

The performers in the Wind Symphony are the finest instrumental musicians at Wakeland H.S. Brent A. Mounger Director of Bands

Brent A. Mounger received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Stetson University. While at Stetson, he began an active role in music education. During the fall of 2004, he took on the assignment of conducting the school's Brass Ensemble. Later in 2006, he petitioned the faculty, with the help of Dr.

Bobby Adams, to create a new ensemble for woodwinds - Chamber Winds. In 2005, Mr. Mounger was President-Elect for the Florida Collegiate Music Educator's National Conference and served as President in 2006. While President of FCMENC, he restructured the statewide organization and was able to increase the association's membership. He also established a partnership program, in which larger universities in Florida were zoned with smaller universities and community colleges to help establish links and communication between future music educators. Mr. Mounger also served on the Florida Music Educator's Association State Board from 2005-2007.

As Director of Bands at Coral Reef Senior High School, his teaching responsibilities include the Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Brass Ensemble, Chamber Winds, Concert Jazz Band and the "Barracuda" Marching Band. Under Mr. Mounger's direction, the Coral Reef Senior High band program has received Superior ratings at district and state, jazz and concert assessments. Graduates from the band program attend the New England Conservatory, University of Miami Frost School of Music, The Florida State University College of Music, Berklee College of Music and the University of Florida School of Music.

Music at Coral Reef Senior High School

The Coral Reef Senior High School program is recognized as one of the top ensembles in Miami-Dade County and across the State of Florida. Over the past four years, the band program has developed a conservatory-style environment. Courses offered consist of performance based ensembles: Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Brass Ensemble, Chamber Winds, Jazz Band and an Honors Music Theory course that is both academically and performance based. The chamber ensembles (Brass Ensemble and Chamber Winds) are designed after Fiorello H. LaGuardia School of the Arts in Manhattan. Students in these classes focus on individual instrumental technique, solo repertoire and wind chamber music, allowing for the individual musician to grow and develop.

The premier performance ensemble, the Wind Ensemble, is comprised of student musicians who have achieved high marks in their musical careers. Members from the ensemble consistently audition and are selected for the FMEA All-State Bands and Orchestras. Each member of the ensemble has also earned top honors at both district and state solo evaluation. In 2010, the students in the Coral Reef Wind Ensemble set a district record in Miami-Dade county, earning over 100 superior ratings at the Florida Bandmasters Association's District 16 Solos and Ensembles Evaluation. Upon hearing the ensemble, James F. Keene, retired Director of Bands from the University of Illinois, had this to say:

"A very musical performance, a very expressive performance...a breath of fresh air!"

Every year, conductors from around the United States have come to work with the Wind Ensemble. Guest Conductors that have worked with the ensemble include: Jay Gephart, Purdue University; Stephen K. Steele, Illinois State University; John P. Lynch, University of Georgia; Nicholas DeCarbo, University of Miami; Catherine Rand, Florida International University; Brian C. Wuttke, George Mason University; Gary D. Green, University of Miami. Students in the ensemble also work with members of the University of Miami, Frost School of Music and the New World Symphony Orchestra on a regular basis.

Mr. Rivers was a very successful musician and student leader, participating in a number of musical ensembles and organizations. He was Student Director and Arranger for the "Marching 101" Band, Principal tuba in the SCSU Symphonic Band, President of Kappa Kappa Psi National Honorary Band Fraternity Inc. and President of Collegiate Music Educators National Conference (CMENC) SCSU Chapter.

Music at Martin Luther King, Jr. High School

This includes nine superior ratings for the MLK Wind Ensemble in nine years. In 2006 the Martin Luther King, Jr. High School Marching Band, better known as the "Kings of Halftime," became the first American marching band to perform in South Africa. The band served as the exhibition band for the 2006 Field Band Foundation's South African National Championships held in Johannesburg, South Africa. The "Kings of Halftime" also participated in the 2008 Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Texas. The MLK Jazz Band took top honors as the winner of the Atlanta Jazz Festival Youth Jazz Competition in 2008. Most recently the MLK Wind Ensemble was selected to perform at the 2011 Music for All National Concert Band Festival in Indianapolis, IN as well as the 2011 Honor Bands of Georgia Clinic hosted by Columbus State University. The committed and talented students in the Martin Luther King, Jr. Band, along with a dedicated parent booster organization, have helped to create the fastest growing, most talked about and one of the most highly sought after bands in the state of Georgia.

About the school and community

The Martin Luther King, Jr. High School opened in August, 2001, in the DeKalb School system. This beautiful facility is home to grades 9-12. Martin Luther King, Jr. High School is an International Baccalaureate World School. The International Baccalaureate Program, a two year academic program for juniors and seniors, is the most rigorous level of instruction that a student can receive at the high school level. The Martin Luther King, Jr., High School has been named for one of the great men in American history, and its mission embodies the vision of Dr. King and promotes excellence in academics, leadership development, community service and character development. This beautiful school has a green and inviting campus, an ideal place for students to learn.

A native of Vienna, Virginia, Mr. Weise is a product of the Fairfax County Public School System, where he attended Thoreau Middle School and James Madison High School. He received a Bachelor's degree in Music Education from James Madison University in 2004. While at JMU, Mr.

Weise was a member of the Symphonic Band, Wind Symphony, Brass Band, Tuba Ensemble and 450-member Marching Royal Dukes. He has studied euphonium with Gene Duman, Matt Troppman, Lance LaDuke, Roger Behrend and Kevin Stees. He is currently working toward a Master's degree in Conducting from George Mason University and has played in the Fairfax Wind Symphony. During the summer, he serves as one of the directors of the Vienna Summer Band Camp and the Virginia Ambassadors of Music.

Mr. Weise started his career as the band director and music department chair at Kilmer Middle School in Fairfax County, Virginia. He was responsible for overseeing all aspects of the music program at Kilmer. In his four years at Kilmer, the band program grew from 188 students to over 260. The Kilmer Symphonic Band received straight superior ratings at all contests and festivals they had entered. They also received multiple Grand Champion awards at all Musicale and Music in the Parks festivals on their spring trips. In 2006, they were the featured middle school performing ensemble at the Virginia Music Educators Association's State Conference. In 2008 Mr. Weise was a nominee for the Washington Post/Fairfax County Teacher of the Year.

Mr. Weise began his affiliation with the McLean band program in the spring of 2004 when he was assigned to complete his college student teaching experience with Mr. James Kirchenbauer, the previous director. His work continued with McLean as an assistant director of the marching band for three years. In 2008, Mr. Weise became the Band Director at McLean High School. During this time, the McLean Bands grew from 170 students to over 220. All ensembles under his direction have continuously placed first in competitions and have earned all "Superior" ratings. The marching band was recently showcased as a Finalist in the Bands of America Regional Championship in Akron, Ohio.

Mr. Weise resides in Vienna, Virginia with his wife, Christina, and their one-year-old daughter, Savannah Grace.

Music at McLean High School

The Symphonic Band, Concert Band and Jazz Ensemble continue to receive "superior" ratings at district and regional festivals. All ensembles have claimed championship awards and superior ratings at festivals in Lakeland and Orlando, Florida, Boston, Massachusetts, Myrtle Beach, South Carolina and Montreal, Canada.

In 2009, the Symphonic Band's first-place finish at the Festivals of Music competition in Orlando made it the top scoring concert band in all of their North American festivals that year. In 2005, the Symphonic Band was selected as an instrumental champion at Musicfest Orlando. The McLean Symphonic Band has made three appearances at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival in 1995, 1999 and 2006. They were the featured performing group at the Virginia Music Educators Conference in 2002 and again in 2006. In 2000, the John Philip Sousa Foundation awarded the McLean Symphonic Band the Sudler Flag of Honor, the most prestigious recognition a high school concert band can receive.

The McLean Band strives to provide a wide variety of quality experiences for its students and is proud to be a part of a music department that includes vibrant and successful programs in orchestra and chorus as well. In 2008 and 2010 she was named to Who's Who Amongst American Women,

and in 2007 she was named to Who's Who in Education. In 2006 she was selected as a member of The Chancellor's List, a select group of outstanding graduate students from across the nation. She is a member of Sigma Alpha lota, honorary music sorority for college women. Her professional affiliations include the College Band Directors National Association, The College Music Society, Texas Bandmasters Association, Texas Music Educators Association and Women Band Directors International.

Ms. Taylor was appointed Director of Bands at The Classical Center at Brandenburg Middle School in 2000. Her teaching responsibilities include conducting the Honors Band, assisting with the Symphonic Band and directing the Beginning Band. In addition, soon after coming to Brandenburg, she began a Jazz Band, known as The Tribe. Ms. Taylor was the first director in Brandenburg's history to lead the Honors Band to a UIL Sweepstakes in 2004, and the band consistently earns Superior ratings each year at concert festivals at both the district and regional levels. In 2008 the band was invited to perform at the Western International Band Convention in Seattle, Washington. The Honors Band also performed in the rotunda of the state capitol in Austin, Texas on March 9, 2009, a special invitation by the Texas Coalition for Quality Arts in Education. In 2009 the Honors Band was selected as a Commended Winner in the Mark of Excellence National Wind Band Honors Competition.



Dino Antonuccio Assistant Director

Mr. Dino Antonuccio is in his fifth year as the Assistant Director of Bands at The Classical Center at Brandenburg Middle School in Garland, Texas. Mr. Antonuccio is the primary director of the Classical Center at Brandenburg Symphonic Band. Under his direction the group has earned consecutive UIL Sweepstakes; the first ever in the history of the group. Mr. Antonuccio's other duties at Brandenburg include teaching the

beginning brass classes, conducting the Concert Band and assisting the Honors Band. Mr. Antonuccio is originally from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he was an active musician at a young age performing with the Philadelphia Boys Choir. His early choral training allowed him to perform at various venues such as The Sydney Opera House, Carnegie Hall and The Academy of Music. Mr. Antonuccio began playing tuba in high school, where he studied privately with Brian Brown of Princeton University and performed with the Bravo Brass, a select Brass Choir led by alumni of the Curtis Institute of Music. Mr. Antonuccio holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree and Performance degree from the University of Miami and a Master of Music Education degree from the University of North Texas. During his collegiate experience, Mr. Antonuccio performed with many ensembles including: The University of Miami Wind Symphony, Symphony Orchestra and The University of North Texas Symphonic Band. His private teachers include Donald Little and Brian Bowman. Mr. Antonuccio held the principal tuba position in the Miami Symphony Orchestra in 2003.

Music at Brandenburg Middle School

Combining parts of Rowlett, Sachse and all of the city of Garland, the Garland Independent School District enrolls 57,000 students. The district is made up of 45 elementary schools 13 middle schools and seven high schools. The Classical Center at Brandenburg Middle School, a Texas Education Agency Exemplary School, is known for its strong academic program. The school is a TAKS Exemplary Campus and was recently named a National Blue Ribbon School.

The band program began in 1974 when Brandenburg Middle School opened its doors. Over the last decade, under the direction of Kelley Taylor, The Classical Center at Brandenburg has experienced major growth and success, whereas the program currently includes more than 275 students in grades six through eight and continues to thrive.

In every ensemble, emphasis is placed on rhythm comprehension, technical exercises and range development with special emphasis placed on the development of tonal concepts and group ensemble skills. Brandenburg provides a positive learning environment where students can fully develop their talents supported by a character education program. Brandenburg offers a variety of opportunities to develop the musical interests and aptitudes of each child and has produced many outstanding individual musicians. Personal achievement is recognized in the areas of Concert and Solo and Ensemble performance. Brandenburg is proud of its consistent Superior ratings at the district and regional levels, high representation in the GISD All-District Band and outstanding Solo and Ensemble Assessments.

In particular, the Honors Band has excelled to great heights and is recognized as one of the leading ensembles in the region. The Brandenburg Honors Band consistently earns Superior ratings each year at concert festivals at both the district and regional level, including the University Interscholastic League (UIL) Concert and Sight-Reading Contest. The Honors Band also participates in the Dallas Wind Symphony Invitational each year, performing in the beautiful Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Hall. The Honors Band performed at the 2008 Western International Band Convention in Seattle, Washington, a performance by invitation only. The band also performed in the rotunda of the state capitol in Austin, Texas on March 9, 2009, a special invitation by the Texas Coalition for Quality Arts in Education, another wonderful honor for the Honors Band. Most recently, the Honors Band was selected as a Commended Winner in the 2009 Mark of Excellence National Wind Band Honors Competition.

The Brandenburg Band program is strong year after year with consistent success in every ensemble and with the Honors Band leading as a premiere ensemble in Texas.

About the school and community

With an enrollment of over 57,000 students, the Garland Independent School District is the second largest district in Dallas County and one of the largest districts in the state of Texas. The community maintains a "small town" feeling, yet our teachers have access to the increased resources that large districts offer. Every school in the district provides the same high level of instruction. However, that doesn't mean that you will find "clone" schools in Garland ISD. Audrey Murphy Director

Audrey Murphy is in her seventh year as Director of Bands at Hopewell Middle School. Prior to accepting this position, she began her music education career at Mt. Pleasant Middle School in North Carolina, where she taught for four years. A native of Columbia, South Carolina, Ms. Murphy is a 2000 graduate of East Carolina University, where she earned the Bachelor of Music

degree in music education with Magna Cum Laude distinction. She was named both "Most Outstanding Senior in Instrumental Performance" and "Most Outstanding Senior in Music Education" by school of music faculty. While studying at East Carolina University, Ms. Murphy served as head drum major of the Marching Pirates as well as principal clarinetist of the symphonic

Music at Hopewell Middle School

Now in the seventh year of the school's existence, the Hopewell band program has grown from 140 to nearly 300 sixth, seventh and eighth grade students. Each band member is enrolled in one of six 53 minute classes. The sixth grade band students are placed in either the woodwind class or the brass class, with the percussion section divided evenly between the two. Seventh and eighth grade band members are placed in either Concert or Symphonic Band and then scheduled for the grade level class that corresponds with this placement. This is determined by auditions that take place in the spring. In addition, the Symphonic Band meets once a week after school.

The Hopewell Jazz Band meets Friday mornings before school. Though mostly comprised of seventh and eighth grade band members, students from within the general school population are invited to audition for this ensemble's rhythm section.

About the school and community

Hopewell Middle School is located in Milton, Georgia and is a member of the Fulton County School System. Its doors opened in August of 2004 with a student population of approximately 870 students. Now in its seventh year of existence, this number has grown to over 1,200. Most sixth grade students enter Hopewell from one of four elementary feeder schools. Two-thirds of Hopewell's eighth grade students will attend Milton High School, while one-third will attend Alpharetta High School. As a state-ofthe-art middle school, Hopewell provides a myriad of enrichment programs, including extracurricular and intramural sports, band, orchestra, chorus, clubs and outreach opportunities. With a strong academic focus, the school implements a rigorous curriculum while providing a bridge between elementary and high school. Hopewell's mission is teaching middle school students the skills and concepts necessary for academic and personal success. band, wind ensemble and symphony orchestra. Her additional performance experience includes the Long Bay Symphony Orchestra, the University of North Carolina at Charlotte Community Concert Band, the Charlotte Civic Orchestra, principal clarinetist of the Capital City Opera Company of Atlanta and clarinetist for Atlanta-based woodwind quintet Highland5.

Ms. Murphy has served as a guest clinician and adjudicator throughout Georgia and Alabama. She has received the National Band Association's Citation of Excellence on two occasions for her contributions to the field of concert band. She is also a recipient of the North Fulton Jaycees Outstanding Young Arts Professional Award and was named the Hopewell Middle School 2010-2011 Teacher of the Year.

Ms. Murphy holds membership in Sigma Alpha lota, Pi Kappa Lambda, Phi Beta Mu, the National Band Association, MENC: The National Association for Music Education and the Georgia Music Educators Association. She resides in Atlanta, Georgia.

For three of the past six years, concert ensembles have been organized by age rather than ability level. Both seventh and eighth grade ensembles have earned consecutive Superior ratings at GMEA Large Group Performance Evaluations. Sixth, seventh and eighth grade ensembles have gone on to win first place distinctions at the Music in the Parks Festival in Georgia and in North Carolina where, in 2009, the Eighth Grade Band earned the highest score of all participating instrumental ensembles.

Hopewell bands have made guest performing ensemble appearances at the 2006 University of Georgia Middle School Band Festival and the 2010 GMEA In-Service Conference. Members of the Hopewell band program regularly participate in GMEA Solo and Ensemble Performance Evaluations and have consistently earned chairs in both the District V Honor Band and All-State Band. Students have also participated in the UGA Middle School Band Festival as well as the Jacksonville State University Honor Band Clinic.

Founded in 1871, the Fulton County School System is one of the oldest school districts in Georgia. During the 2010-2011 academic year, more than 92,000 students will attend classes in 59 elementary schools, 19 middle schools, 16 high schools and seven charter organizations, making Fulton the fourth largest school system in the state. Families are attracted to the district because of its consistent and well-deserved reputation as a quality school system. With a focus on student achievement and a commitment to continual improvement, Fulton County has earned a reputation as a premier school system. This long history of excellence is evidenced by the many state and national honors bestowed on its schools, staff and students.

The City of Milton, a distinctive suburban community of the metro Atlanta area, has a population of approximately 30,000 and covers 23,000 acres. Milton, which officially became a city in July of 2006, embraces small-town life and heritage while preserving and enhancing its rural character.

Music at Thompson High School

The Thompson High School Wind Ensemble was formed in 2001 as the result of tremendous growth in the Thompson High School Band program that allowed for the creation of another performing ensemble. The Wind Ensemble is 70 members strong with the majority being juniors and seniors.

Since the inception of the Wind Ensemble, they have earned straight superior ratings at all Alabama Bandmasters Association district and state evaluations.

In addition, they have also earned straight superior ratings from other regional competitions throughout the Southeast, most recently Festivals of Music in South Carolina, Smoky Mountain Music Festival in Tennessee, the Alamo Music Festival in San Antonio and the Dixie Classic National Adjudicators Invitational in St. Louis, Missouri.

Most notably, the Wind Ensemble was selected as a guest performer for the Southeastern United States Concert Band Clinic held on the campus of Troy University in Troy, Alabama in February 2007, the Alabama Music Educators Association In-Service Conference in January 2009 and was a featured performer at the University of Alabama Honor Band Festival in February 2010.

Membership into the Wind Ensemble is through an audition/selection process. While the members are serious and dedicated to the performance of outstanding symphonic wind literature, few students actually study privately. The Wind Ensemble consistently has members selected for the Alabama Bandmasters Association's All State Music Festival and for many university sponsored honor band festivals throughout Alabama and the Southeast.

Other performing ensembles at Thompson High School include the 200-member "Marching Southern Sounds," the 90-member Symphonic Band, various chamber ensembles and the 19-member "Southern Knights" Jazz Band.

About the school and community

Alabaster, Alabama is a sprawling suburban city located in the heart of Alabama and situated 17 miles south of downtown Birmingham.

Alabaster has experienced remarkable growth over the last ten years with a growth rate of well over 60 percent, making Alabaster one of the state's largest cities.

Thompson High School is located in Alabaster, Alabama and is a part of the Shelby County School System. The high school has 1,600 students in grades nine through 12.

Derek Shapiro is currently in his seventh year as the band director at Cypress Creek High School and in his ninth year of teaching. About the school and community

In the fall of 2010, the Ronald Reagan High School Marching Band was recognized as the Class 4A Champion at the Bands of America Regional Championship at The Woodlands and a Bands of America Super Regional Finalist in San Antonio. The marching band has also been a consistent UIL Sweepstakes recipient and performed at the 2010 UIL 5A State Marching Contest. Mr. Chavis graduated Magna Cum Laude with a Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Houston.

He also maintained a successful trumpet studio in the Houston area and performed with the Wind Ensemble, Marching Band and Jazz Orchestra. After marching with the Cavaliers Drum and Bugle Corps from 2002 to 2004 as a trumpet player, Mr. Chavis served on the Brass Staff from 2006 to 2009. He is now a member of the Santa Clara Vanguard staff, where he serves as Lead Visual Technician and is concurrently serving as a member of the Brass Staff.

Prior to his position at Reagan, Mr. Chavis served as an Assistant Band Director at Elkins High School in Missouri City, Hebron High School in Carrollton and Ronald Reagan High School in San Antonio. He also maintains a private trumpet studio in the San Antonio area. His professional affiliations include Texas Music Educators Association and Texas Bandmasters Association. Mr. Chavis currently resides in San Antonio with his wife Amanda, a professional flutist.

Music at Ronald Reagan High School


At Ronald Reagan High School, the band program combines with award-winning programs in art, choir, debate, orchestra and theater to form the remarkable Fine Arts department. The Wind Ensemble, a 45 to 60 member select ensemble, is the top performing group in the band program. With an enrollment of 200 students, the comprehensive instrumental program at Ronald Reagan includes three concert ensembles selected by audition, Symphony Orchestra, Musical Pit Orchestra, Jazz Band, various chamber ensembles, Color Guard, Winter Guard and the Marching Band. Our students participate in the Region XII All-Region Band and Orchestra as well as the Texas All-State Band and Orchestra each year. The Reagan Bands have enjoyed numerous Sweepstakes awards and superior ratings at UIL contests. The Marching band has received numerous awards as an area participant and numerous finalist performances at Bands of America competitions. The Reagan Band's most recent achievements include their highest finish in school history as a finalist in the TMEA 5A State Honor Band Contest (placing sixth in Texas), finalists at the Bands of America Regional Championship at The Woodlands and Super Regional Championship at San Antonio and an invitation to perform at the 2011 Music for All National Concert Band Festival.

Students in the North East Independent School District begin band in sixth grade. Those attending Ronald Reagan come from two middle schools: Barbara Bush Middle School (Gabriel Rosas and Erin Sharkey, directors) and Jose M. Lopez Middle School (Andrew Post and Kim Garza, directors). In middle school, students begin their instrumental instruction in homogeneous classes and then participate in concert bands in seventh and eighth grade. Credit for the strength and success of the Ronald Reagan H.S. band program must be shared with these committed middle school teachers. The Ronald Reagan H.S. He earned a Master's degree in Arts from Southern Oregon University in 2005 through the American Band College.

While earning his undergraduate degree he was Bass Trombonist in the Santa Fe Symphony for three years, substitute for the New Mexico Symphony, and performed many other jobs on call. His teaching career has taken him to positions in El Paso, Texas; Rio Rancho, New Mexico; and Clark County, Nevada. In 2005 Mr. Downey was named Nevada's "teacher that makes a difference" in music education in America by School Band and Orchestra Magazine. Mr. Downey is a former director for the Las Vegas Youth Symphony (2002-2008). Mr. Downey's teaching responsibilities at LVA include Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Co-Director of Philharmonic Orchestra, brass methods and music theory. In addition to his directing responsibilities, Mr. Downey has been the Clark County Band Director Association's president from 2001-2003 and a Past President for the Nevada Music Educators Association (2003-2009).



Robert Logan Biles Director

Robert Logan Biles earned his Bachelor's degree in Music Education from VanderCook College of Music in Chicago, Illinois and a Master of Music degree in Saxophone Performance and Literature from the University of Notre Dame. As an undergraduate, he studied classical saxophone with Jim Kasprzk and jazz with Mike Pendowski. While attending Notre Dame, he instructed the saxophone studio, clarinet ensembles and the second jazz band.

In addition, he worked with the world famous Notre Dame Marching Band, "The Band of the Fighting Irish." He also toured New Zealand and Australia with the Notre Dame Wind Ensemble, performing as a featured soloist in the Sydney Opera House and other historic venues. In addition to teaching, Mr. Biles is a published composer, writing music for a variety of ensembles. Most recently, he completed work on a full length Requiem for symphony orchestra and choir. Currently, he directs at the Las Vegas Academy in Las Vegas, Nevada, where he teaches band, jazz band and AP music theory. He has also served as the Clark County Band Festival Chair, High School Region Representative for the Superintendent's Region and the All-State Band Chair for the state of Nevada.



Patrick Bowen Guest Soloist

Patick Bowen is in his ninth year at the Academy, where he teaches fulltime for the area of World Jazz Studies and the Chamber Ensembles. He was the percussionist for the hit Broadway show "Mamma Mia" at the Mandalay Bay Resort and is presently the Principal Percussionist with the Las

Vegas Philharmonic. He has a Bachelor's degree in Music Performance from the Hartt School of Music (Cum Laude), a Master's degree in Music Performance from the University of Montana and a Teaching Certificate from UNLV. Mr. Bowen has served as the President of the Percussive Arts Society for the State of Nevada. He has also published "Snares and Sets: A Book of Duets" and "Temple: A Timpani Concerto for Timpani and Percussion Ensemble." He has written articles for the Percussive Arts Society, and many of his original works have been recorded.

Music at Las Vegas Academy

In May of 2006, Mr. Barat was appointed Director of Bands at Douglas Anderson School of the Arts in Jacksonville. His teaching responsibilities include the direction of the Wind Symphony,

Symphonic Band, Percussion Ensemble and Chamber Winds, as well as teaching Advanced Placement Music Theory. Under Mr. Barat's direction, the DA Wind Symphony has performed at the 2008 University of South Carolina Band Clinic and the 2008 MENC National Biennial In-Service Conference in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. In addition they've performed at the 2009 Florida Music Educators' Association Clinic-Conference in Tampa.

Prior to arriving in Jacksonville, Mr. Barat served as Director of Bands at Winter Haven High School in Winter Haven, Florida. During his six year tenure at WHHS, the marching, symphonic and jazz bands, as well as brass, woodwind and percussion ensembles, consistently received superior ratings at Florida Bandmasters Association district and state level events. The band program received the Florida Bandmasters Association's Otto J. Kraushaar Award five years in a row for year-long superior ratings, and the Symphonic Band performed at the 2004 FMEA In-Service Clinic-Conference, the 2004 Stetson University Band Invitational, the 2005 Bands of America National Concert Band Festival in Indianapolis and the 2006 CBDNA/NBA Southern Division Conference in Nashville.

Mr. Barat continues to be an active clinician, adjudicator and involved member of several music organizations. He has served as guest conductor for All-County Bands and summer music camps. He is currently the chairman for the Florida Bandmasters' Association District 17. Mr. Barat's professional affiliations include the Music Educators' National Conference, Florida Bandmasters' Association, the National Band Association, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia and Pi Kappa Lambda Music Honor Society. Alumni include professional classical and jazz performers, music educators and amateur musicians.

The Douglas Anderson Symphonic Band and Wind Symphony are committed to performing the finest band literature at the highest levels of musical achievement. The Wind Symphony is the principal concert ensemble of the band program and has earned a reputation as one of the finest symphonic organizations in the state of Florida. The band has consistently received superior ratings at Florida Bandmasters Association district and state level evaluations. The band performed at the 1997 Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago, the 2006 Music for All National Concert Band Festival, the 2008 University of South Carolina Band Clinic, the 2008 MENC National Biennial In-Service Conference in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and has been invited to return to Indianapolis to perform at the 2011 Music for All National Concert Band Festival. Members must audition for this elite ensemble and attend weekly sectional rehearsals.

The Douglas Anderson Jazz Ensembles have consistently been rated superior at all FBA Music Performance Assessments. Jazz 1, under the direction of Ace Martin, has been recognized by Downbeat Magazine as one of the top high school jazz ensembles in the country. The band performed at the 1992 Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic and took first place in the Essentially Ellington National High School Jazz Band Competition in New York City in May of 2006. Jazz 1 is featured in the 2007 documentary Chops, which chronicles their journey to compete in the Essentially Ellington jazz event.

About the school and community

Douglas Anderson School of the Arts (DA) is a Duval County Public School located in Jacksonville, Florida. The school is for students in grades nine through 12 with a desire for intensive study in the arts. Established as an arts high school in 1985, the school attracts students from all parts of Florida who have talent in dance, instrumental or vocal music; performance or technical theater, film and television production; creative writing and visual arts. 

Deanna L. Kringel is a native of Delaware. She began her instrumental music studies as a Suzuki violin student at the age of four at the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore, Maryland. She began her performing career playing solo violin for the Governor of Delaware's Inaugural Banquet at the age of 12. Ms. Kringel was selected all four years in

high school to perform in the All-State Orchestra. She was also the first music student in her high school to perform at the All-State level in three performing ensembles: All-State Orchestra, All-State Band and All-State Chorus.

Ms. Kringel received her Bachelor's degree in music education with high honors from James Madison University and was the first JMU student to perform a double senior recital on two instruments (violin and flute) as well as the first to graduate with majors in two primary instruments. Ms. Kringel began her teaching career in Roanoke City Schools, where she was nominated for the Sallie Mae First Year Teachers Award. She recently completed her Master's degree in music education from Old Dominion University.

Ms. Kringel is currently in her 11th year as the Director of Orchestras at Oscar F. Smith High School in Chesapeake, Virginia. She is also the beginning strings teacher at several feeder elementary schools. During Ms. Kringel's tenure, the string enrollment has more than doubled at OSHS. Most recently, the Oscar Smith High School Chamber Orchestra performed by invitation at the 2005 Virginia Music Educators (VMEA) In-Service Conference, the 2007 National Band and Orchestra Festival in Carnegie Hall, the Music for All Orchestra America National Festival in Indianapolis and the 2009 ASTA National Orchestra Festival in Atlanta (as a part of the American String Teachers Association's National 'ASTA' Conference). Both the OSHS Concert Orchestra and OSHS Chamber Orchestra have consistently received superior ratings at the VBODA District IV Orchestra Festival (www.osmith-orchestra.org).

From 2000-2010, Ms. Kringel directed the high-demand, entertaining "Oscar Smith High School Strolling Strings." She also directed the Williamsburg Youth Orchestra's "String Orchestra" for five years. Ms. Kringel is listed in Who's Who in American Women, Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Who's Who Among America's Teachers and National Honor Roll's Outstanding American Teachers.

Ms. Kringel has served as a guest conductor and adjudicator throughout Virginia. She is an active member of the Music Educators National Conference, Virginia Music Educators Association and American String Teachers Association. The last five years, she has served on the Board of Directors for VASTA (the Virginia chapter of the American String Teachers Association). Music at Oscar F. Smith High School

Oscar F. Smith High School is one of seven high schools in the City of Chesapeake and is located in the community of South Norfolk. Earning a reputation for excellence during the past nine years, the Oscar Smith High School Orchestras have grown from 48 members to over 100 members. The orchestras have earned top awards in music festivals in Virginia, Georgia, Maryland, Florida, New York, Indianapolis and Atlanta and have consistently earned superior ratings at the VBODA/VMEA District IV Music Assessment (formerly known as District IV Orchestra Festival).

The OSHS Orchestra program consists of two performance ensembles, divided into three classes. The Concert Orchestra and Chamber Orchestra meet every other day in a modified block schedule for 90 minutes. The Concert Orchestra, the largest ensemble, combines two separate classes comprised of freshmen and other developing string players. Students must audition and are required to have at least four years of orchestral experience. Basic fundamental skills are learned. The ensemble performs at least five concerts during the year, including the VBODA/VMEA District IV Orchestra Assessment.

The Chamber Orchestra is comprised of approximately 30 string players (grades 10-12) and is the premier string ensemble at Oscar Smith High School. Membership in the Chamber Orchestra is through audition. The Chamber Orchestra performs at least nine concerts per year, including the VBODA/VMEA District IV Orchestra Assessment. They also earned a standing ovation for their outstanding performance as the final orchestra performance of the 2005 Virginia Music Educators Association (VMEA) In-Service Conference. Since then, they have performed by invitation in the 2007 National Band and Orchestra Festival in Carnegie Hall, the 2008 Music for All National Orchestra America National Festival in Indianapolis and the 2009 ASTA National Orchestra Festival in Atlanta (as a part of the American String Teachers Association's National 'ASTA' Conference). The Oscar Smith High School Chamber Orchestra is honored to be invited back a second time to perform in Music for All's 2011 Orchestra America National Festival.

About the school and community

He also taught in the Griffin-Spalding County School System (1985-1988). Mr. Tyndall received a Bachelor of Science in Education degree from Jacksonville State University (Alabama) in 1984 and Master of Music Education degree from West Georgia College in 1991. He has served as a clinician and adjudicator throughout Georgia and various other states and has been on the staff of Encore! Music Camps since 1999. Mr. Tyndall also served as a Middle School Band Rehearsal Lab Technician at the 61st Annual Midwest Clinic in 2007 and presented a clinic at the 63rd Annual Midwest Clinic in 2009. Mr. Tyndall's bands have previously performed at the 1990, 1997 and 2003 Georgia Music Educator's Association In-Service Conferences. He also had bands perform for the University of Southern Mississippi Instrumental Conductors Conference in 1992 and 2001, the

Dr. Poor holds a Doctor of Music Education degree as well as a Master of Music degree in Trumpet Performance from the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music Cincinnati, Ohio. He previously received a Bachelor of Music Education degree (High Honors) from the University of Florida in Gainesville, Florida. Furthermore, Dr. Poor is a National Board Certified Teacher in the area of Early Adolescence to Young Adulthood-Music/Band as recognized by the National Board of Professional Teaching Standards. Music at Rising Starr Middle School

The Rising Starr Middle School Symphonic Band was formed with the opening of the school in the fall of 1997. The Symphonic Band is comprised of 75 seventh and eighth grade students and consistently receives superior ratings at district level large group performance evaluation governed by the Georgia Music Educators' Association. The band has received invitations to perform for the University of Georgia Middle School Festival (1999), the University of Southern Mississippi Instrumental Conductor's Conference (2001), the Troy State University Southeastern United States Middle School Concert Band Clinic (2002), the Georgia Music Educators' Association In-Service Conference (2003), the 57th Annual Midwest Clinic in Chicago (2003), the Western International Band Clinic in Seattle (2005), the Music for All National Concert Band Festival in Indianapolis (2007) and the 62nd Annual Midwest Clinic in Chicago (2008). Students from Rising Starr regularly qualify for District Honor Band and participate in the local solo and ensemble festival. In addition, the band program has been represented in the Georgia Middle School All-State Band every year since the program began.

The members of the Rising Starr Middle School Symphonic Band are honored to represent their school and community for the second time at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival.

About the school and community

Rising Starr Middle School is located about 30 miles south of Atlanta, Georgia in unincorporated Fayette County. Over the second half of the last century Fayette County grew from a sleepy, farming community into one of the most appealing suburban counties in the metropolitan Atlanta area, with a population exceeding 106,000. The county seat is the historic town of Fayetteville, established in the early 1820s. The Fayette County School System has grown as well and now serves over 22,000 students in pre-kindergarten through 12th grades. There are 30 schools within the system, including five high schools, six middle schools, 17 elementary schools, alternative school and evening high school. The Fayette County School System, is recognized statewide for its excellence in academics, arts and athletics and serves as a model for other systems within the state of Georgia.

Rising Starr Middle School is located just outside the city limits of Peachtree City, a planned community of approximately 38,000 in population. It was established in 1959 and draws its 1,076 student population from both unincorporated Fayette County neighborhoods and the city of Peachtree City. Rising Starr has been designated a Lighthouse School to Watch. The middle school is part of a three-school complex opened in 1997 that also includes Starr's Mill High School and Peeples Elementary School. The high school and middle school actually share one large facility that is laid out in a wheel and spoke design joined by an auditorium and dining facilities.

Mrs. Alvarado's teaching responsibilities at Bailey include conducting the Symphony Band, assisting with the Wind Ensemble and teaching the clarinet, french horn, and trombone beginner classes.

Music at Bailey Middle School

The Bailey Middle School Band program includes 392 students in grades six through eight. The beginning band is divided into six homogeneously grouped classes. The seventh and eighth grade students are divided into three levels of performing concert bands, as well as semester courses in Jazz Ensemble and Steel Drum Ensemble. Students may also choose to participate in a private lesson program once a week before, during or after school. The interest and expertise of these studio teachers has added greatly to the quality of the band program.

Since the school opened in the fall of 1993, the Bailey Wind Ensemble has received 17 consecutive sweepstakes awards. The Wind Ensemble has earned top honors at invitational band contests each year, including "Best in Class" and "Best in Contest" honors at band festivals across the nation. The Bailey Wind Ensemble was featured at the 1996 Music Educators National Conference in Kansas City, Missouri; the 2001 John Philip Sousa National Middle School Honor Band Clinic in Charleston, South Carolina; the 2002 Western International Band Clinic in Seattle, Washington and the 2004 CBDNA/NBA Southern Regional Conference in Atlanta, Georgia. In 2004, the Bailey Wind Ensemble had the honor of performing at the Midwest Clinic in Chicago, Illinois, and in 2007 the Bailey Wind Ensemble was selected to be the first middle school to perform at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival.

The Bailey Middle School band was the 2001 recipient of the prestigious Sudler Cup award, presented by the John Philip Sousa Foundation for outstanding merit and achievement.

About the school and community

Bailey Middle School is located in the southwest corner of the Austin Independent School District. The school has a total enrollment of 1,073 students in grades six, seven and eight. In addition to a strong instrumental music department with a combined band and orchestra enrollment representing over forty percent of the student body, Bailey has achieved statewide recognition in many academic areas. The school is justifiably proud of its successful mixture of the disciplines of the arts, academics and athletics into a well-rounded campus led by a caring faculty, an active student body and a supportive administration.



Music at Lassiter High School Orchestra Association

The Lassiter Chamber Orchestra is Lassiter's most advanced string ensemble. They consistently receive superior ratings at the Georgia Music Educators Association's yearly High School Orchestra Performance Evaluation and are frequently invited to perform at conferences and competitions across the nation. The Lassiter Symphony was selected to perform at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago, Illinois in 2001 and the Chamber Orchestra performed in 2008. The Lassiter Symphony was also selected to perform for the 2003 and 2006 Georgia Music Educator's Conference in Savannah. Last year the orchestra was hosted by the United States Air Force Band and Strolling Strings and participated in rehearsals and clinics with members of the Strolling Strings at Bolling Air Force Base in the Air Force Band facility. The Chamber Orchestra performs approximately 10 times per year. They rehearse weekly after school and meet in section rehearsals before school. The Lassiter Music Program is designated as a Grammy Signature School.

To handle the increasing growth, Cobb residents renewed the one percent sales tax for education in September of 2008 that will provide funding for new schools and renovations for many Cobb County school facilities, including a new Fine Arts Center for Lassiter High School.

The district's purpose is to ensure that all Cobb students maximize their individual learning potential. Toward that end, every school has implemented Performance Based Instruction for every student, meaning that students will know, do, use and communicate what they are learning. The result is high achievement for Cobb County students. Cobb students consistently score above the national average on norm-referenced tests. In 2007, 80 percent of Cobb seniors took the Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT), achieving a combined average score of 1534, compared to the national average of 1511 and the state average of 1472. Cobb boasts six magnet programs to challenge students and a unique Advanced Placement Certified Schools program that encourages participation in advanced course work.

Located just across the Chattahoochee River from Atlanta, Cobb County is a dynamic community of approximately 680,000 residents. To serve its students, the district has 16 high schools, 25 middle schools and 68 elementary schools. Cobb County high schools provide a broad-based curriculum in academics, technical and vocational education, and personal development plus a wide range of co-curricular and extracurricular activities on a semester basis.

Lassiter High School was established in 1981 and has approximately 2,000 students in attendance. Lassiter is located in East Cobb County, Marietta, and north of the City of Atlanta. Newsweek Magazine recognized Lassiter as being in the Top 5% of High Schools in the Nation. Lassiter was named a 2008 Advanced Placement Merit Honor School and was awarded the Siemens Foundation Award for Advanced Placement. MLassiter High School received the Governor's Cup as one of the top schools in the state for highest test scores, boasts six National Merit Finalists and has been selected as a 2008 Georgia School of Excellence. In addition to top honors in academics, students are encouraged to participate in fine arts and lifetime sports programs.
