Summer Symposium Concerts & Performances

United States Army Field Band will be part of Summer Symposium Concert Series

One of the most exciting aspects of the BOA Summer Symposium is that every evening features a world-class concert or event for all students and directors. The famed **U.S. Army Field Band**, the Musical Ambassadors of the Army from Washington D.C., will be in concert **Tuesday, June 24**, as part of the Summer Concert Series. The concert will be a part of the **Young Composer's Mentor Project** (YCMP) to be held at the Symposium. The Field Band's program will consist of compositions from applicants selected to participate in the YCMP.

Since its formation in March 1946, the Field Band has appeared in all fifty states and in more than thirty countries on four continents. The organization's four performing components, the Concert Band, the Soldiers' Chorus, the Jazz Ambassadors, and the Volunteers, each travel over 100 days annually. Tours include formal public concerts, school assemblies, educational outreach

programs, festivals, and radio and television appearances.

The United States Army Field Band is considered by music critics to be one of the most versatile and inspiring musical organizations in the world. Its members, selected by highly-competitive audition, represent some of the finest musical talent in America.

YCMP at BOA!

BOA and the **National Band Association** have partnered to host the Young Composer Mentor Project at the BOA Summer Symposium. Conceived by composer-conductor **Mark**

Camphouse in the late 1990's, the NBA Young Composer Mentor Project held its inaugural session in San Antonio in July of 2000 during NBA's National (biennial) Convention. Mentors for the BOA-hosted 2003 NBA YCMP will include Mark Camphouse, David Gillingham and Frank Ticheli.

The Symposium evening concerts will open with the Yamaha Young Performing Artists (YYPA) in concert **Monday, June 23.** The Yamaha Young Performing Artist program is designed to provide early career recognition for outstanding young musicians in the United States. Hundreds of applicants ages 16-21 apply annually and undergo a rigorous taped audition process for a panel of national celebrity musicians. Annual winners join a total of over 100 other winners since the program's inception in 1989. Many winners have received scholarships to prestigious universities and conservatories, or are playing professionally with major jazz groups and top symphony orchestras. Several BOA past participants are YYPA performing alumni.

The YYPA concert has become an important annual event at the Summer Symposium, giving camp students and directors the chance to enjoy exceptional young musicians in a live setting.

Bands of America's recently redeveloped website www.bands.org is also the direct interface with BOA's database of schools and people. In the process of moving all of our school and contact data over from the old database to the new one, the database was unable to differentiate which school contact was the "Primary Director." The person designated as the Primary Director of a school in our database is to whose attention our newsletter and all general mailings are mailed. This means that many directors who have been at their schools for decades and who have been participating with BOA for years and getting mail addressed properly may get this newsletter addressed to the incorrect person. We apologize for this inconvenience and ask for your help in correcting this issue and "scrubbing" our data.

In order to keep your and your school's data secure and confidential, only BOA staff can designate who is the Primary Director attached to your school. Please send an email to webmaster@bands.org confirming what name should be the Primary Director at your school. Please include "BOA Database Correction" (without quotation marks) as the Subject Line.

Online registration is active for fall championships and the Summer Symposium

The integration of website and database means that you can now enroll for Bands of America events securely online. Online enrollment for Bands of America will change the way band directors can easily register for events, as well as manage their band and personal information.

Register online today for the BOA Regional and Grand National Championships. You must have a valid BOA Network sign-in name to access the online registration. You will be asked to select your school, then be guided through the online registration process. Payment is required before application is complete and a hard copy confirmation must be signed by director and principal and returned to Bands of America.

Registered bands will then be able to manage their fall enrollment online, submitting "paperwork" electronically, viewing the status of their registration and

registration information online as needed.

The integrated database and website is being programmed by ENVISAGE, which has been architecting high-availability, enterprise-class internet systems since 1995. The site is secure and safe, with your privacy foremost in mind at every stage of development.

Bands of America launched the "new" bands.org last October during the Regional Marching Band events, amidst a record number of hits and visits. Bands.org received a whopping 18,703,091 hits during the month of November alone, giving it the most traffic Bands of America has ever experienced in the history of our web presence.

Band fans from every state and over 16 countries world-wide visited www.bands.org during the fall for news and information on all things band. The site moved to a new server and a faster pipeline for improved speed and response as it continues to grow and expand.

The most popular area of the site continues to be the BOA Network Forums, where students, directors, parents and fans discuss topics about band, music and life in general. "Friendships are being forged between BOA Network members across the nation through their participation in the Forums," says **David McElvain**, Bands of America's Systems Administrator and Webmaster. "As with any open forum there are sometimes heated discussions, but, in general, the forum 'posters' monitor and police themselves and point out to each other (and us) if someone gets out of line." In addition, BOA monitors the forums to ensure appropriate behavior and language compliance with the BOA mission and students.

Bands from throughout the country are invited to join us for the first two-day Super Regional, Friday and Saturday, October 31st and November 1st in San Antonio, Texas.

Bands of America will offer the twoday regional event intended to offer a unique opportunity for wide-scale Texas and surrounding states' participation. The event is intended to offer a special (larger than life) "positively life-changing fall marching band experience" for band members, band directors, families and enthusiasts. The event is open to the first 60 bands that enroll. We expect bands from across the nation, as well from Texas, making San Antonio a destination for a world class high school band event. BOA anticipates offering one such marching event annually rotating between world class venues in areas of high interest in BOA programming. Presently, we are considering being in **San Antonio** every other year (non-AAAAA state championship years) and alternating between **Atlanta's**

Georgia Dome and **St. Louis' Edward Jones Dome** in non-Texas years.

BOA will use a single judging panel over the two day Super Regional preliminary. On Saturday afternoon (at the end of the Preliminary Event), BOA will announce ratings and Class Championship Results (as it does at other regional events).

The top 14 scoring bands, regardless of classification, from the Preliminary Event, will advance to Saturday evening's Finals event. If a Class Champion is not among the top 14, the Class Champion will be invited to perform in exhibition at the Finals Event.

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
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Inside Report: BOA Advisory Board Recommends Grand National Finals Change

It was unanimously recommended by the advisory board members and guests present at the Advisory Board meeting January 12-13 that starting in 2003, Bands of America Grand National Finals Championship will be a showcase of 12 of the finest high school bands in America and a celebration of all finalists that does not focus on the ranking of the bands. It will be a "presentation of the best of the best." A Grand National Champion will be named, Outstanding Achievement Awards presented in three captions based on scores, and all finalists recognized for the incredible achievement of earning a position in Finals.

The response and discussion about the Grand National Finals format change has been across the spectrum.

"I think we can all agree that change can be a challenge and disturbing," said Scott McCormick, President of Bands of America. "I hope we can also further agree that all of us, whether pro or con on Bands of America's Grand Nationals format change have BOA's mission to 'create and provide positively lifechanging experiences for students, teachers, parents and communities' as our mutual focus."

"Over the past few years, the level of performance and excellence of the finalist bands has gotten to the point where to designate who was 2nd best and who was 12th best (or for that matter the '1st best') is of little value and beside the point," says Scott McCormick. Bands of America's more than 25 years of success has helped to drive the level of excellence in marching band and general band education to unprecedented levels. At some point, the competitive drive can and will exceed the perceived benefits. Grand National Finals is at this stage of development. It is almost absurd to measure, at this level, the comparative excellence of these performers.

We need to take a look at the nature of celebrating 12 outstanding bands. We need to place maximum emphasis on the MANY who exude that superior level of excellence that has become Grand National Finals.

The Finals awards ceremony will change to place primary emphasis on the achievement and celebration of each finalist participant and band. It will be a celebration of music and achievement.

Saturday evening will be a show that acknowledges all of the finalist band members with National Finalist medallions. The Grand National Champion, Outstanding Music, Visual and General Effect, and Esprit de Corps will also be awarded. No placing or scores will be announced, no scores provided to the bands, only commentary by the adjudication panel. The numbers will be kept confidential and only used to tabulate the Grand National Champion and the Outstanding Achievement Awards.

We want our participants and supporters to know that Bands of America did not propose this change. The concept and change originated with members of the Advisory Board. All present at the Advisory Board meeting were unanimously in favor of the change. Among those present were band directors who between them hold nine Grand National Champion titles, with five finalists from 2002 alone.

The decision is appropriate for Grand National Finals especially. At this time, BOA feels it is still appropriate to recognize places at Regional Finals. The levels of performances at a Regional Finals have more variance than at Grand Nationals. Grand National

Finals is at the highest level and cannot be compared to any other competition, exhibition or other format of marching band competition, including the BOA Regional Championships. The competitive Regional Championship system is still a powerful and valuable tool for the educational goals of band programs at different levels. It is that system that puts us at this point of decision to change Grand Nationals Finals format as the best and right next step.

With any decision for change comes controversy. We frequently hear that change causes discomfort, and that authentic leaders adhere to guiding principles regardless of the initial reaction of the masses. Debate is important and valuable. However, Bands of America strongly agrees with and adopts the recommendation of the advisory board. We are convinced that this move will support and contribute significantly to the continued development of school music education and young people who participate.

"No one is trying to completely wipe out competition," points out Greg Bimm, Director, Marian Catholic H.S., IL. "There is straight up competition in prelims and semi finals. The goal is to celebrate the top 12 by de-emphasizing the finals placement. True, a champion is named. It is after all the National championship. My perception is that by stopping there, we are awarding all who have achieved finals. Just as in the Academy Awards, where it is an honor both to be NOMINATED and to be awarded the Oscar, it is an honor to be a finalist at BOA. If someone perceives this as 1 winner and 11 losers or an 11 place tie for 11th, perhaps they are seeing the glass half empty. Maybe it is 12 great bands (1 who happened to perform best that evening) who should be congratulated and celebrated without over emphasizing stratification."

"Grand National finals is a special and unique evening and in my opinion it merits not to be set up like every other contest in our country nor should it be different from the rest of the Grand National experience where there are no scores or placements other than the class champions announced after prelims or semi-finals," says "There is no doubt about it that the top 32 bands at The BOA Grand Nationals are some of the top marching bands in the United States. It has always been an honor for our students to make the finals at the BOA Grand Nationals and this format change will make it even more exciting if we are fortunate enough to

make it again and be considered one of the top twelve bands in the nation!"

"It should also be noted that the decision to move toward this recognition was voted on unanimously by a 20 member advisory board to which 7 of the people including myself have been Grand National finalists. The one thing we all have in common is that last performance with our students. We want the emphasis to be on their individual, team, and life changing accomplishments that they have made throughout the process of the year and not what place they did or did not come in on that particular night. This new and educational format supports this! We all were in agreement that the honor of making the finals is enough in regard to placement and competitive ranking."

"I will certainly listen to, and respect, the opinion of anyone who disagrees with my 'take' on this subject," says **Richard Saucedo, Director, Carmel H.S., IN.** "But I sincerely ask all of those who feel we should compete for placing on Grand Nationals finals night to ask themselves a few very simple questions:

- 1. Why do I really feel this way?
- 2. Am I going to enjoy my participation in my music group less if competition is not involved?
- 3. Am I in my music group because I love music or is it because I love competition?
- 4. Do I listen to my favorite music performers because they are in competition with others, or do I listen because I like the music?
- 5. Should the Chicago Symphony and the New York Philharmonic start competing to increase attendance at concerts?
- 6. Have you ever been involved in putting down another group you were competing against instead of just worrying about your own performance? These are just a few of the questions I think we should ask ourselves as we, together, try to move this activity to the next level.

"From a personal viewpoint in a band program that is in its 3rd year of development, we have instilled values in our students that take the competitive edge out of everything we have done," says David Starnes, Director, Kennesaw Mountain H.S., GA. "I am a firm believer that competition between oneself is much greater than the competition we have among contenders, of which the students have no control over. I am in great trust of the BOA judging community and I do not think this is a decision based on the inaccuracy, inability, or history of judges making the "right call." Moreover, I believe that each band's level of performance from prelims to semi-finals to finals dictates who moves into finals. Yes, marching band is a competitive activity. I will agree with the statements of many regarding this concept. However, we are not a competitive sport with the mindset of a "win at all cost" mentality.

"The discussion and banter of students and parents on the BOA website is a great sense of frustration for me, regarding this matter. I firmly believe that the activity is headed toward a very uneducational dead-end if we as educators, advisory members, students and parents do not derail the competitive train. I have watched the BOA activity go from a healthy and mutual respectful venture to one that has been degrading of others programs, staffs, and students. We are all in the activity for the same reason. Our love for music, achievement, and experience of the marching band art form at the national level brings us together every year to experience what talent exists in our national high school band programs. In an era where music education is fighting to be saved, we are doing all we can internally to hold on to the values that make our art form so innovative, creative, and entertaining."

"I have served as a director of a band that has been named Class AAA Champion at Grand Nationals," says Frank Troyka, Director, Cypress Falls H.S., Houston, TX. "I have also served as a director of a band that has only hosted a Regional so that his students could become exposed to the BOA culture from the non-performing side of the activity. My students know what it is like to finish in the top five at a Regional and they know what it feels like to finish well below the 10th place cut. In any scenario, my students have benefited from the experience more so than the outcome. With the change in the Grand Nationals Finals format, BOA has simply provided a better balance to that experience. There will still be the competitive aspect to each level of performance--Prelims, Semi-Finals, and Finals--and the Semi-Finals will still offer that incredible thrill as Finalists and Class Placement Awards are announced. The real difference I see as an educator is that Bands of America has elevated each finalist band to a much higher place with this new format. In my opinion, speaking as one who has been there, the thrill of advancing to Finals has the potential to be far more enduring than in the past when it may have been compromised through rankings. This represents a tremendous forward evolution in our art form and our educational philosophy, one that might not be possible in other competitive activities."

"Being selected as a GN Finalist is, and should be viewed as, an honor, one that many bands work hard for all season long, not to mention for years," says **Stan Schoonover, Music Specialist, Fairfax County (VA) Public Schools.** "That being the case, the BOA Advisory Board correctly decided to honor ALL of those groups with the same level of distinction, that of being a Grand National Finalist. This achievement is laudable, and is worthy of the distinction that many other bands, those that do not make the finals, will not receive. Then, attention can be focused on the incredible achievement,

and not the competition, as we celebrate ALL of the bands that have been included in the GN Finals show, and recognize the superior level that they ALL display. Each band, and their audience, can then support ALL of the performances, and give ALL the performers the recognition that they deserve, without the "fear" that by recognizing ALL the performances they would somehow lessen their own band's chances of winning."

"Truth be told, the present Grand National Championship format that is comfortable and familiar to everyone involved is not the format that existed when the championships were started," points out William Galvin, **Director, Trinity H.S., PA.** "As organizations grow and progress, change occurs. In this instance, I believe the change is timely and appropriate. Creating an opportunity that recognizes the achievement of the twelve finalist bands enables everyone to celebrate all that is good about the marching band movement in our country. Everyone will have opinions regarding which band was better; ranking the bands two through twelve need not validate those opinions."

"BOA is known for establishing creative approaches to bringing the most outstanding experiences to students," points out **Margene Pappas, Director, Oswego H.S., IL.** "The members of the advisory board are also trailblazers in the profession, not only as band directors, but as professional educators and leaders.

"We have been going through some educational shifts in this country, especially in the way instrumental music is taught with less focus on competition and more focus on curriculum, cooperation, creativity, and growth. As the philosophies of education continue to evolve and become more refined, so must BOA change. Any good organization looks at the operation and continually works to improve the programs offered for the good of the constituency and when changes are made, organized abandonment must occur; in this case only the placements of 2nd through 12th have been eliminated while offering to GIVE everyone in Finals a well-earned reward for their contributions and efforts. Certainly, the format for a celebratory climax to the BOA Grand Nationals experience will eventually result in bands working even harder to achieve that level of recognition that comes with being a Grand Nationals Finalist while still having a chance to push excellence to the next level and enjoy the possibility of a Grand National Championship. To recognize the accomplishments of ALL GN finalists is the goal."

Bands of America to induct first class into the BOA Hall of Fame

Bands of America will induct five people who have greatly impacted the BOA organization, the band activity and music education into the Bands of America Hall of Fame on March 22, 2003 in Indianapolis at the National Concert Band Festival. This will be the first class of inductees into the newly-established Hall of Fame.

Inductees are **Dr. Frederick** Fennell, conductor of the Kosei Wind Ensemble and Principal Guest Conductor of the Dallas Wind Symphony; Larry McCormick, founder of Bands of America; Col. Truman W. Crawford, retired commander of the United States Marine Drum and Bugle Corps; Dr. William D. Revelli, former Director of Bands at University of Michigan (inducted posthumously); John P. **Paynter,** former Director of Bands at Northwestern University (inducted posthumously), and L.J. Hancock, long-time director at Norwin H.S., PA and BOA Camp Director.

The first class of recipients was nominated by members of the Bands of America Advisory Board and BOA staff.

"It has been our dream for several

years to establish a Hall of Fame," says Scott McCormick, President of Bands of America. "We want to recognize the icons who have made significant contributions to Bands of America and have helped shape the band activity and music education in America. The first five inductees represent a cross-section of contributions, and all have left an indelible mark on the state of the band world as it is today."

The presentation will be made following the intermission of the Honor Band of America concert at the BOA National Concert Band Festival and National Percussion Festival, which will be held March 20-22 in Indianapolis. Dr. Fennell and Mr. McCormick are expected to be on hand to receive their award. Hall of Fame recipients will be recognized permanently in the Bands of America

Hall of Achievement in its new corporate headquarters in Indianapolis.

Dr. Frederick Fennell is one of the world's most active and innovative maestros. This globe-trotting octogenarian is principal guest conductor of the Dallas Wind Symphony, principal conductor of the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra in Japan, and Professor Emeritus at the University of Miami School of Music. The internationally-acclaimed conductor, widely regarded as the leader of the wind ensemble movement in this country, is one of America's most recorded living American classical conductors, and is a pioneer in various methods of recording.

Born July 2, 1914 in Cleveland, Ohio, the maestro studied at the Eastman School of Music on the University of Rochester campus, earning a Bachelor of Music degree in 1937 and a Master of Music degree two years later. He became a member of the Eastman conducting faculty in 1939, founded the Eastman Wind Ensemble in 1952, and received an Honorary Doctorate from Eastman in 1988.

He has been part of pioneering recordings with the Cleveland Symphonic Winds and Dallas Wind Symphony and his honors, awards, appointments and conducting appearances are legendary.

Dr. Fennell was the conductor of the first Honor Band of America in 1992, at the debut National Concert Band Festival, held at Northwestern University. At the 2003 Festival, Dr. Fennell will speak to participating and guest directors and be part of a panel discussion with the legendary icons who are on the Festival evaluation panel, as well as be on hand at many of the ensemble's concerts to make taped comments.

Lassiter H.S. Marching Band wins second Grand National title

The Lassiter High School Marching Band, from Marietta, Georgia and under the direction of Alfred Watkins, took home the 2002 Bands of America Grand National Champion title after Saturday evening's Finals, November 16, in the RCA Dome, Indianapolis. Lassiter also won the 1998 Grand National Championships.

Lassiter H.S. lifted up the soul with "Liturgical Sketches." Church window drill outlines reminded all of the theme. Flurries of woodwind notes in the opener counterbalanced the dedicated proclamations of the brass, joyfully blaring brief snippets of well-known hymns like a mighty choir of angels reverberating from the parting heavens. The Rutter "Requiem Aeternum" movement redefined "blissful" with its sonorous, divine chords. Towards the end, percussion played on colored pads on giant screens that triggered electronic drum sounds, followed by the remarkable soaring resonance of electronically amplified concert French Horns in the heroic melodic statement of "The Old Hundredth" ("Doxology").

The Grand National weekend featured nearly 88 bands from 23 states. "I believe Saturday's Semi-Finals was without a doubt the most exciting and finest group of marching bands brought together anywhere in the country this year," said **Debbie Laferty-Asbill**,

Finals Highest Achievement Awards went to Lassiter H.S. for Outstanding Music, Lawrence Central H.S. for Outstanding Visual and Lassiter H.S. for Outstanding General Effect. The **Fort Mill H.S. Band** from **Fort Mill, South Carolina** was presented with the "Al Castronova Memorial" Esprit de Corps Award (see page 23).

Three exhibition bands added even more energy to the event. The University of Delaware Fightin' Blue Hen Marching Band and the Jacksonville State University Marching Band performed in exhibition and at Friday night's Celebrate America! Southwest Dekalb High School Marching Band, Decatur, GA, was the first high school band

ever invited to perform in exhibition at Grand Nationals.

Another first: BOA hosted the Indianapolis Public
School Tournament, with eight IPS marching bands
performing and receiving taped and written input from
the adjudication panel. The **Northwest H.S.**

Marching Band from Indianapolis was named the IPS Tournament winner.

The year of "firsts" continued with the live broadcast of the Semi-Finalist directors draw for performance times on large screens at Celebrate America! Several thousand people gathered on Pan Am Plaza following the Friday night awards ceremony for the Celebrate America! with standstill performances, on-screen interviews, and the announcement of the Semi-Finals performance order.

This was one incredible show. If you've never been to a live BOA Grand Nationals, consider celebrating the youth of America with a visit to the RCA Dome during **November 13-15, 2003.**

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BOA's new downtown Indianapolis Headquarters is up and running

Bands of America officially moved into our new space in Indianapolis' historic Union Station on Thursday, January 2nd, 2003; opening for business on Monday, January 6th.

"There are still boxes to be unpacked, and furniture to be put in place, but the staff at Bands of America could not be more excited about our new home," **says Chuck Henson,** Marketing Manager and "The Voice" for many Bands of America Championships.

Bands of America moved its offices from the Chicago suburbs which was its home for 27 years to downtown Indianapolis, home to two of BOA's three major national events. "The Union Station space provides Bands of America with new office space that is worthy to be called the National Headquarters for an organization such as ours," says Henson. "We will be proud to have participants and guests visit our offices and the new performance space."

The new Bands of America Headquarters' 20,000 square feet makes BOA the second largest tenant in Union Station, next to the Crown Plaza Hotel. The completed space includes a 50-seat performance space with webcasting ability, two additional education rooms, 16 private offices, two conference rooms, large open workspaces, hospitality and warehouse space.

Upon entry, visitors to the office will see the attention to detail in the conference rooms with "piano key" dividers on the windows, and the "bass drum" light fixtures over the lobby and down the "Hall of Achievement," leading to the Performance Room. The overall space is divided into Events and Technology in the south wing and Administration/ Marketing to the north of the "Hall of Achievement." The "Hall" itself will serve as a walking history tour for Bands of America's 27 years of providing positively lifechanging experiences.


