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

#### **Directors bringing students:**

once you arrive at the Symposium, we take over supervision of your students. You are free to visit with them during meals and between classes, but you can relax knowing that Bands of America is taking care of your students so you can concentrate on your own continuing education!

#### **Transportation**

## NBA & BOA join forces at the Summer Symposium

The National Band Association and Bands of America will join forces during the summer of 2004 for a "first of a kind" summer symposium/national convention. Scott McCormick, Executive Director of BOA, and David Gregory, President of the NBA, have announced plans for the 2004 NBA National Biennial Convention to be held in conjunction with the BOA Summer Symposium during the week of June 20 - 26 on the campus of Illinois State University.

The NBA/BOA event will offer the "best of the best" for participants. This first-time joint convention will combine nationally known conductors, composers, arrangers, show designers, clinicians, and concert bands in a week-long series of classes, seminars, concerts, and discussion groups. The National Band Association holds its national convention every other year. The opportunity to combine the talents and skills of nationally and internationally known conductors and clinicians was one that both the NBA and BOA were anxious to see brought to reality. The Directors track of the Summer Symposium will include access to the NBA Conference offerings as part of the curriculum.

The **Air Force Band of Mid-America**, under the direction of Lt. Colonel Steve Grimo, will serve as the clinic ensemble for both young

The Conductor Mentors for 2004 are Dr. Thomas Fraschillo, Professor James Keene and Professor Frank Wickes.

In order to maximize interaction time among students and mentors, only 3 young composers and 3 young conductors will be selected for participation in the 2004 Mentor Project.

The **NBA National Community Band** is comprised of selected adult musicians and performs at the National Convention. **Dr. Lowell Graham** will conduct the National Community Band.

Faculty includes directors and staff of the awardwinning Carmel High School Band and The **Cavaliers** instructional staff. Richard Saucedo, Director of Bands at Carmel High School and The Cavaliers composer and instructor, will lead the team of Marching Band Faculty. The staff and members of the corps will help to provide tips on rehearsal and performance that each member can take home to their own programs.

- How do we create balanced and musical sound at all dynamic levels?
- How can we get a uniform look from a marching standpoint?
- How do you "clean" a set of drill?

- What are some ways to create music and visual effect in your show?

 What types of student leadership are necessary in a successful marching band?

Marching students will learn music and drill to perform at week's end. However, the focus of the group will be much more than just learning a 2-minute show. Each member will learn the important fundamentals involved in creating a high level performance. Students will receive detailed instruction from experts in the activity and explore concepts that often cause band members and directors the most problems.

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## Spotlight: Carmel High School Symphonic Orchestra, Indiana

s BOA looks to the future and the upcoming Honor Orchestra of America to debut in 2005 and the 2006 National Orchestra Festival, it has invited the Carmel High School Symphony Orchestra to perform at the 2004 National Concert Band Festival, February 26-28 in Indianapolis.

"The Carmel High School performing arts department is exemplary in terms of excellence achieved and finest-quality ensembles," said Scott McCormick, President of BOA. "We are please to have the Carmel Symphony Orchestra as the first school orchestra to perform at a BOA event."

Carmel High School currently has five orchestras with about 290 students–200 string players and 90 woodwind/brass/percussion. The orchestras are under the direction of Andrew King, who is also the coordinator of BOA's Orchestra Division at the Summer Symposium (see page 10).

King, a horn player, played in the Carmel High School Symphonic Band when they performed at the first BOA National Concert Band Festival in 1992 at Northwestern University and was in the first Honor Band of America under the direction of Frederick Fennell. "It was one of the greatest learning experiences that I have ever had," King says about his experience with 1992 Honor Band of America.

The Carmel orchestras consist of 3 large full orchestras (Symphony, Philharmonic, Concert Orchestra), one string orchestra (Sinfonia) for their least advanced students that focuses on developing technique, and their most advanced group. They also have an extra-curricular pit orchestra for their spring musical each year.

"Currently, over 70% of our string players are studying privately," says King. "Over 80% of the students in the top three ensembles study privately. 100% of the students in the Camerata and Symphony have studied privately at some point in their high school careers. As we have grown it has gotten really competitive to get into Symphony and Camerata and the kids understand that they probably won't be able to compete with all of the students studying privately without lessons. So, while it is not a rule that kids

have to study privately to get into any group, the level of competition and commitment of many of our students makes it a necessity for students wanting to play in the best groups."

"I think that the orchestra program has been successful for a few reasons. First of all, we have a fantastic middle school feeder program," says King. "The teachers are outstanding. We don't start strings until sixth grade, but the kids are pushed develop at a really fast pace. This helps when they get to the high school, because they are used to being constantly challenged. Another thing that has been a great blessing for our program is the great working relationship with the band directors and the rest of the Performing Arts Department. With wind players and percussionists in three different orchestras, we have to share and work together to make sure that everyone gets what they need. One thing that is somewhat unique in my experience, is that in every full orchestra, we are able to start regular full orchestra rehearsals from the very beginning of the year. I know that many of my colleagues have to wait until marching season is over. The advantage that we have is that we can really work on developing the skills in those wind players necessary to be a great orchestral wind section over a period of time. The other great thing about this is that we are able to do four concerts with different sets of music all from standard repertoire. The band directors and I really make an effort to accommodate each other's needs as much as possible."

"As much as possible I try to treat the students in our Symphony Orchestra like college music majors," says King. "Students receive the majority of the following year's repertoire in May. There is an expectation that they prepare parts on their own and that we rehearse the music during rehearsals. During class periods where I only have half of the string section at a time, I allow the students to spend a good deal of time in sectionals and group practice, so that when we are together for rehearsal they are as prepared as possible. We also bring in guest artists (or go to them) each year to do master-classes or sectionals. In the

past few years we have had members of the Indianapolis Symphony and the Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra come out. We have also been fortunate to work with William Preucil, concertmaster of the Cleveland Orchestra, Peter Salaff, violinist of the Cleveland Quartet, the Miami Quartet, Cathy Morris, members of the Indianapolis Baroque Orchestra, and string faculties from various colleges. These experiences have been incredibly inspiring to many of my students.

"Each semester, I try to make a big project out of learning a major work. In addition to performing an entire work we will spend a good deal of time talking about the history of the work and some analysis of the piece's construction. We also spend time in class comparing interpretations from various recordings. Each of my students is required to own a recording of the music that we play that is standard repertoire—a start of a collection of classical recordings that they will hopefully grow over time. Occasionally, if we are going to be doing a lot of analysis, I will purchase mini-scores for all of the students.

"With the top ensemble, I also make it a priority to play one fairly contemporary work each year. This is an area where high school band directors have on the whole been (partly out of necessity) more forward thinking than orchestra directors have been. We have done a couple world premieres as well as explored new music that is getting played a lot by major orchestras. In the last few years, I have done music by Michael Schelle, Michael Daugherty, Tan Dun, Peter Gilbert, and Krzysztof Penderecki.

Although Carmel High School has won the ISSMA state orchestra contest 11 out of the 18 years that the contest has existed, King makes it a priority to deemphasize competition. "Last year, for the first time ever, we did not go to contest," said King. "I let the seniors vote on whether that was something that they wanted to do, and they chose to spend our spring learning repertoire that would not have been possible had we gone to contest. I was really proud to learn that have reached a point where students are as motivated to learn and perform great repertoire, as they are to go to contest. I think that there is certainly a place for contest and we will continue to compete about every other year, so that at some point the students have that experience."

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
## Growing up musical: A family affair for Atlanta Symphony's Chris Martin

s the Atlanta
Symphony Orchestra's
principal trumpet
player, Chris Martin is the
most consistently audible
player in the orchestra.
"There's really nowhere to
hide," he told the Atlanta
Constitution-Journal in a
September 2003 article.
"You're just out there. It's like
walking the high wire all the
time."

Born and raised in Marietta, Georgia, Chris's musical upbringing has truly been a family affair. His first teacher was his dad, Freddy, current band director and brass specialist for the Westminster Schools in Georgia, a long-time adjudicator and clinician for Bands of America and founder of Spirit of Atlanta Drum and Bugle Corps. Chris attended Sprayberry High School, a Bands of America participating band, where his uncle. Dan Martin, was the band director for 28 vears. His aunt was teaching at Sprayberry, and brother Michael, also a trumpet player 10 years younger, attended Sprayberry and is now at Northwestern University studying with Chris's former teachers, Charlie Geyer and Barbara

Chris, 28, started his third season as the ASO principal trumpet in September 2002. He came to the ASO after three years as associate principal trumpet of the Philadelphia Orchestra. When he auditioned in Philadelphia, Martin was just 22, fresh out of the Eastman



School of Music, from which he holds a bachelor of music degree.

Chris also plays with the Atlanta Symphony Brass Quintet, which performs almost two weeks of concerts in schools, teaches at Emory University, and gives private lessons and master classes for students in schools. He is also a Yamaha artist.

We talked to Chris about growing up immersed in a family environment of music education and how his years and influences in school shaped his success as a professional.

## What was it like having your uncle as your band director?

My family moved so that I could go to Sprayberry High School. Until then I hadn't been that excited about music. At my father's suggestion I went to Sprayberry for the experience of a better school.

From the first day I got there, I transformed overnight from a kid who really wasn't that interested in music to having it be the biggest thing in my life, simply by being around good people and because the

music-making was at such a high level.

My uncle and I got along very well, and my father taught the brass (at Sprayberry) for all four years I was there, my aunt was teaching there, so it really was a family affair.

## There seems to be a perception that orchestra players are inaccessible.

At the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra we recently had a swing band come in, with a great brass section. They agreed that they sometimes feel they cannot approach professional players and, likewise, others don't see them as approachable. I'm certainly not that way and none of my colleagues (in the ASO) are that way. Brass players and wind players seem to be open.

My colleague, Colin Williams, principal trombone with the ASO who played with me at the Midwest Clinic (in December 2003), commented to me before Midwest how great it is to be at a band conference. The band community is very warm and friendly and collegial.

#### What's your impression of Bands of America?

My impression of Bands of America has always been incredibly positive. A good friend of mine works with (BOA participant) Kennesaw Mountain High School, and through involvement of my father and others like Alfred Watkins (director at Lassiter High School), BOA has always been around (in my life).

BOA does such great things for kids. It's one of the only near-professional performance experiences that a high school student could ever have. When I see the video recordings of these bands playing at the national competitions and other BOA events its incredible to think that these are high school kids that in their every day lives might never think they could perform at such a high level. I think that's one of the best things your organization does for kids, it gives them the opportunity to really see, with some effort, just how much they can accomplish.

I think these are the kinds of things that inspire students, more than words, more than anything you can say to them or get them to read in a book. Show them an experience like that, that's what really inspires them. Not even necessarily to be musicians or performers, but to realize just how much they are capable of.

Colin (Williams) said to me before Midwest, "You won't believe it—you go to these concerts and you won't believe your ears and eyes, that young people can perform at such a level," and its true. And its the same for the experience that BOA provides.

## When you were in high school, what kinds of things were you listening to?

I was mostly listening to fairly standard orchestral music. My teacher ingrained in me that I had to know these pieces if I wanted to make it as an orchestral player, which is what I had decided to do. But at the same time, I was playing in the Atlanta Symphony Youth

Orchestra and in the Cobb Youth Orchestra and I ended up performing some newer music there. But I wasn't incredibly exposed to new 20th Century music until I went to Eastman.

At one point my teacher gave me a recording of a John Adams piece—maybe "Harmonium" or "Harmonielehre" and said "we just played this, I want to see what you think of it" but it wasn't what I was listening to on a regular basis.

I think it would have been really beneficial, much better for me in the long run. When I went to school I had never seen a trumpet part like Richard Danielpour might have written or John Adams might have written. I didn't know that there was stuff like that, so the first time I had to perform it was a bit of a shock.

## What would you suggest that a high school student with aspirations to play professionally listen to?

When I look at what it takes to be a professional player these days, I think it has become even important to have a diverse background. That's really the key for students and is one thing a lot of students don't get. They think, like I thought, "I can learn these audition pieces and that will be great." I even met guys in graduate school who thought that. "All I need to do is be able to play 'Pictures at an Exhibition' really well and I'll get a gig one day." They need to be listening to new musicthere are new composer competition programs going on all the time. Students should be aware of what's going on and where music is

Something I didn't realize

until I got to college is the need to be aware of jazz. Many students who are from strong concert programs think they don't need to bother with jazz. But even at orchestra auditions for major orchestras they throw up music that shows that you have an understanding of jazz style. Major orchestras are having to program things like that these days.

More pieces are featuring brass and wind players. Most of the brass players I knew at Eastman who ended up getting a job either in the Air Force Band (for example) or an orchestra had a solid understanding of jazz. Even if they weren't fantastic improvisers, at the very least they knew the style and could read. Students need to be fluent in a style. These days everything's getting closer, all the styles are sort of melding together and no matter what type of ensemble you end up playing in you need to understand those basic styles. No one really told me that when I was a kid and I wish they had.

#### What other advice for students?

Now that I'm 28, I think of myself at 16 and my friends that were really into music, and all we did was listen to music. Whatever you put into your brain is what you get out of it. As I look back I think that a gigantic part of why I've been successful as a performer is because I programmed my brain with great sounds. I listened to the best musicians I could find and the best musicians that my teachers told me about. I looked on my own to find the best trumpet players-the best musicians, period...the best singers. I

was really fortunate that I was surrounded by a lot of knowledgeable people who were able to guide me. So I think for kids that want to be performers the biggest thing they can do is to listen to great music and musicians and at the same time listen to themselves and try and match those sounds.

I was very fortunate in that I've been able to do that, to hear something, pick out what I like and sort of add it to my own style. The earlier a student can do that, the better. Not just listen and think "man, that's great, I wish I could play that way," but to listen and think "ok, that's a great player and I'm going to figure out how to sound like that." Sort of a proactive attitude instead of just sitting back and wishing.

Really listen to somebody and say "this is a great player and I respect that," and break it down—"I like the articulation of this guy, I like how this player phrases so beautifully in the soft passages." Identify those things and think how you can use it. Be analytical while you're listening about how you can do it yourself.

## You and many of your colleagues are products of school music programs...

Both of my colleagues who have recently joined the ASO, Mark Hughes (trumpet) and Colin Williams (principal trombone), I think they both did concert band in school and marching band and a little bit of orchestra, but mainly came out of the concert band programs. Even at Eastman, I only played in 2-3 orchestra concerts a year at most and everything else was in the Wind Ensemble or the New Music Ensemble.

Most of my friends who

were fantastic players at Eastman and other schools, most who are working now, are working in military bands. One of my friends, Matthew Harding, is the solo cornet player with "The President's Own" U.S. Marine Band. He always wanted to be an orchestral player, and figured that's what he'd do. Then he got into "The President's Own" and he has just signed on again after his first 4 years, because he's having a great time. I heard them recently and they're a great ensemble. He's soloing all the time and they're playing great music. I think the military bands are stronger than they've ever been, and more and more classically trained musicians are going that route. It's great for the band tradition and it's great for music because music is being written for those bands that probably never would have been written before.

#### I read in the Atlanta Constitution-Journal that you recently turned down the principal chair with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. You must be happy at Atlanta.

I am. Its a really strong ensemble and every year we've added some really key players that help to bring the level up. Robert Spano, our Music Director, is really excited about the music. We have a couple of commissions coming out in the next two years. We're always performing things that are really exciting and not in the norm. Things here are fresh and vibrant.

## Twelve incredible bands stage a BOA Grand National Finals to Remember

he 28<sup>th</sup> Bands of America Grand National Championships featured one of the tightest races for finalist spots ever witnessed.

Some very excellent bands did not place in finals this year; such was the quality and depth of the competing bands.

For the first time, only the champion band was announced. This decision was reached unanimously by the committee of competing band directors, hoping to make the event more a celebration of excellence. The scores and other placements were not announced during the Indianapolis festivities. Finals results were subsequently released in December and are available for registered online members at www.bands.org.

The Finals awards ceremony featured the presentation of National Finalist Medallions to all of the finalist band members who were on the field. The Grand Finale included the premier of a piece commissioned by BOA for the 2003 Grand Nationals, More Than The Music, performed live by the co-composer and a choir of Indianapolis area students.

Winning its first BOA Grand National Championship, **Westfield High School, Houston, TX** was the Grand National runner-up three times before, in 1985, 1990 and 1995.

## 2004 BOA Hall of Fame inductees announced

Three persons to be inducted into the BOA Hall of Fame were nominated and selected at the BOA Advisory Board meeting, January 18-19 in Indianapolis.

**Tim Lautzenheiser, Kenneth Snoeck** and **Dr. Tom McLeRoy**will be inducted into the BOA Hall

## On the future of band music and the new adaptation, "Ballet for Band" by Cindy McTee

n recent years, conductors and performers of band music have shown unprecedented enthusiasm for the composition of new works. The result is a large body of substantive pieces written for an ensemble that promises even greater riches as we composers continue to mine the depth and breadth of the band's unique sound.

The future of band music depends upon the kind of collaboration supported by Bands of America when it commissions new works for performance by young people. As a composer, educator, and former saxophonist, I am very grateful for the opportunity to participate in this process of growth and discovery, and anticipate an excellent première of my Ballet for Band by some of America's best!

Ballet for Band (adapted from my Symphony No. 1: Ballet for Orchestra) was commissioned by The Revelli Foundation and its affiliate, Bands of America, for first performance by the BOA Honor Band of America this February 28 at the National Concert Band Festival, Eugene Migliaro Corporon, conductor.

Music is said to have come from dance–from the rhythmic impulses of men and women. Perhaps this explains my recent awareness of the inherent relationships between thought, emotion, and action - that the impulse to compose often begins as a rhythmical stirring and leads to a physical response - tensing muscles, gesturing with hands and arms, or quite literally, dancing.

In *Music and the Mind*, Anthony Storr observes that "the designation 'movement' for a section of a symphony, concerto, or sonata attests the indissoluble link between music and motion in our minds . . ." There is also much pleasure to be gained from observing the gestures of a conductor, or from seeing the coordinated bowing of the string sections within an orchestra.

Composer Roger Sessions writes eloquently on the subject as well in The Musical Experience of Composer, Performer, Listener: The basic ingredient of music is not so much sound as movement. I would even go a step farther, and say that music is significant for us as human beings principally because it embodies movement of a specifically human type that goes to the roots of our being and takes shape in the inner gestures which embody our deepest and most intimate responses.

My Ballet for Band emerged out of a similar kinesthetic/emotional awareness and a renewed interest in dance music. I first explored this approach to composition in a work entitled *Circuits* (1990) which reviewer Charles Ward described as follows:

Circuits...was a charging, churning celebration of the musical and cultural energy of modern-day America.

Although I have never made a conscious attempt to create or reflect an "American" sound, I would agree that my musical style generally does reflect my American roots more than my European-based training. European writers, however, continue to shape my thinking, especially the Swiss psychologist, Carl G. Jung, who felt that creative energy sprang from the tension between the oppositions of conscious and unconscious, of thought and feeling, of objectivity and subjectivity, and of mind and body. So too have the integration and reconciliation of opposing elements become important aspects of my work. The frequent use of circular patterns, or ostinatos, offers both the possibility of suspended time and the opportunity for continuous forward movement. Carefully controlled pitch systems and thematic manipulations provide a measure of objectivity and reason, while kinetic rhythmic structures inspire bodily motion. Discipline yields to improvisation, and perhaps most importantly, humor takes its place comfortably along side the grave and earnest. To quote Lord Byron: "On with the dance! Let joy be unconfined . . ."
