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



Q&A with composer John Mackey

Music for All asked what *you* would ask John Mackey and he graciously answered our questions. John will work with Concert Band Division students and directors at the MFA Summer Symposium. Read the full interview at www.musicforall.org/blog. Let's dive right in!

What was your inspiration for Foundry?

Asked by Brian Munoz via Facebook

This was my wife's idea. She said that if she were a percussionist, it would be fun to play a piece where she could hit stuff with hammers. She also thought it was cool that with percussion, just about anything you strike could be considered a percussion instrument, so she suggested I write a piece that used all kinds of non-traditional percussion, but things that students could find at hardware stores and junk yards — and you'd then strike those things, maybe, with a hammer. Fun, right? So it was her idea to write for "found" percussion. My take on it was to try to write something aggressive in tone, sort of a sibling to my piece "Asphalt Cocktail." The result — aggressive music with lots of found metal percussion — sounded like a steel factory. So the title is a play on that, because it sounds like a foundry, but the first five letters are "found," as in "found" percussion.

What inspired Undertow?

Asked by Banon University via Twitter

Tardiness. I was completely stumped about what to write, so I procrastinated. During the time that I should have been writing music, I was playing video games — or one specific video game: The Legend of Zelda: Phantom Hourglass on the Nintendo DS. In that Zelda game, you sail a ship from island to island (dungeon to dungeon), and while you sail, music plays — and it's good music. So I spent a great number of hours playing that game — and hearing that music - instead of writing what would become "Undertow." Eventually, though, I had no choice but to start writing "Undertow," because it was about to be due, but my brain was conditioned to hear the kind of music you hear in a Zelda video game, and in this case, a swashbuckling sea adventure. So that's what I wrote: my brain's idea of new Zelda music. An "undertow" is a spinning current that pulls ships underwater — ships like I sailed in that Zelda game.

With my school, we've played *Undertow, Foundry, Sheltering Sky* and *Night on Fire*. I love them all... how do you find your inspiration?

Asked by Lindsay Elizabeth Frees via Facebook

Wow, your directors are my favorite people in the world! The thing that helps me to keep each piece fresh is to approach each one differently, whether that's a unique scoring ("Night on Fire" uses three or more hand drums; and "Foundry" uses 12 percussionists, many of whom play "found" percussion), an unusual rhythmic pattern ("Undertow," which is mostly in alternating 7/8 and 4/4), or something as seemingly straight forward as the desire to write a lyrical piece that sounds like it contains old folk songs, when in fact the tune is new ("Sheltering Sky"). It's hard to come up with a new

idea for each piece. That's really the hardest part of writing something — it's not picking the notes, but deciding ahead of time what the reason is for the piece to exist at all. It takes a long time to figure out those things — time I spend walking, or jogging, or biking. I get my best ideas while exercising, not while staring at the computer monitor.

Aurora Awakes is my favorite of your pieces. What inspired you to incorporate U2's Where The Streets Have No Name?

Asked by David Bowen via Facebook

The 80s station on Sirius XM radio. We were driving to dinner one night, and that US song came on the radio. It starts and ends with that 6 note riff in the guitar, on top of sustained synth chords. In the middle, the song itself happens, but it's all bookended by that intro and outro with those six notes on top of those chords, and I think those outer sections are the best part of the song. So my idea was, why not make a whole piece just about those six perfect notes? I changed the key, and I changed the chords, but you'd still recognize them. So I wrote the fast part of the piece, or at least most of it, but then I got stuck. So I asked my wife, Abby, what I should do. She said she thought the fast music sounded like it was getting brighter and brighter, so the piece made her think of sunrise. She suggested that if it's a piece about sunrise, why not write an opening for it that's slow and still, like the start of the day right before the sun first peeks above the horizon? So, that's what I did.

What would you like band directors to know when performing your music?

Asked by Tom Cox via Facebook

That I'm still alive, so you can ask me a question if you need to! Or you can try to schedule a clinic with me so I can work with you and your band in person on my music. I love working in person with students and their conductors.

What inspires you every day?

Asked by Kristen Popovich via Facebook

Coffee, mostly.

What was your favorite piece to compose?

Asked by Kaytee Parker via Twitter

I have favorite pieces that I HAVE composed, but while actually writing, the process is normally so slow and so difficult that I wouldn't use the word "favorite." For example, "Asphalt Cocktail" is one of my favorites to listen to, but writing it was extremely slow and challenging. I think that's



one thing I like about it — that it sounds, to me, sort of effortless, but in reality, it was a real slog to write.

Do you think you'll write more extensively for middle level groups?

Asked by Michael Filla via Twitter

Absolutely! I have one fairly easy piece, "Foundry," which is considered a "grade 3" level of piece, but I want to write a "grade 2 – 2.5," maybe even this spring. Writing for mid-level groups is very challenging —

much harder than writing difficult music, because you can't fall back on flashy performance techniques like fast runs or percussion licks. There are fewer notes, and every note has to be perfect.

Where do you find inspiration? Do you seek it out or let it happen organically?

Asked by Michael Filla via Twitter

Deadlines are inspiring, and I'm not kidding. Writing music is hard work, and I think it gets harder with each new piece, because you don't want to repeat yourself and do the same thing you did in an earlier piece. I rarely write music just for fun — it's always for a commission, and if there was no deadline, I'd spend all of my time just playing video games and watching TV.

What parameters do you give yourself in the initial stages of a piece (e.g. grade level, instrumentation, unique features)

Asked by Michael Filla via Twitter

The answer varies depending on the commission. For a university or military band commission, grade level isn't normally a consideration, but for a middle school commission, it has to be, so that's the starting point for the piece. Difficulty level also determines instrumentation (to a point), but that challenge can also lead to unique features, like in Foundry, where the normally limited instrumentation challenges of a middle school band could be overcome by asking the percussionists to play non-traditional "found" percussion, so that's a case of the difficulty level leading to the most interesting element of the piece. For a universitylevel piece like "The Frozen Cathedral," I was encouraged by the commissioning organization to add extra players, and I took that to mean "extra instruments" as well, so I included things like alto flute, bass flute, English horn, and 10 percussionists. I figured out the scoring before I started any sketches, and that greatly influenced the overall sound of the piece.







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Knitting is WAY better than Band!

By Scott Lang

Suppose I told you that knitting was WAY better than band. Imagine an impassioned, articulate, and fact-based plea for all things knitting. Included in the presentation would be such salient statistics as:

- Knitters are significantly less likely contract smallpox than non-knitters.
- No knitter has ever been convicted of being a serial killer (that we know of).
- + Knitting is less likely to cause brain damage when compared to huffing lead paint.
- Wearing of crocheted shawls has been shown to significantly reduce the frequency of teen pregnancies.
- · Knitting is eco-friendly and will help you to live a longer, happier, and warmer life.

(Three of the five of these are actually true!)

Are you sold? Are you ready to go get a big ball of yarn and some metal chop-sticks? Are you ready to hunker down with your cats and make yourself a scarf? My guess is NO.

Why not? After viewing my salient and impressive array of data, why would you not want to be involved in this life-changing activity?

Because you do not accept the initial premise that knitting is, in fact, going to make your life better.

Without that premise, all information is filtered out as meaningless.

Don't get me wrong. You don't dislike knitting. You may even know and call a knitter your friend. You are not hoping that knitters impale themselves in a serious loop one-pearl two accident. But that doesn't make you a believer or knitting advocate. You simply don't care about knitting and no amount of data or information is going to change that.

The Bands of America Hall of Fame recognizes individuals who have had a positively life-changing impact on Music for All's Bands of America programs and music education. The 2014 members will be inducted during a ceremony at the Music for All National Festival, held March 6-8 in Indianapolis.



Eugene Migliaro Corporon is the conductor of the Wind Symphony and Regents Professor of Music at the University of North Texas. Mr. Corporon has been a cornerstone of the Music for All National Festival

as a member of the non-competitive festival's evaluation team and conductor of the Honor Band of America, which he will

conduct for the second time in 2014. Mr. Corporon is a graduate of California State University, Long Beach and Claremont Graduate University. Mr. Corporon, a frequent guest conductor at the Showa University of Music in Kawasaki City, Japan, has also served as a visiting conductor at the Julliard School, the Interlochen World Center for Arts Education and the Aspen Music Festival and School. He is also the principal conductor of the Lone Star Wind Orchestra, a professional group made up of musicians from the Dallas and Fort Worth metroplex.



Fred and Marlene Miller's Fred J. Miller, Inc. is a leader in pageantry uniform design and manufacturing, outfitting many of the world's best marching bands, drum corps and winter guards. Norwin H.S., PA booster receives Patrick John Hughes Parent/Booster Award

Music for All presented the 2013 Patrick John Hughes Parent/Booster Award to Dick Zentner, a long-time booster of the Norwin High School bands in North Huntingdon, Pennsylvania, Friday, November 15, during the Grand National Championships in Indianapolis.

The Patrick John Hughes Parent/Booster Award annually recognizes the extraordinary commitment, dedication, support and sacrifice of music parents and boosters around the world by shining a spotlight on an individual who exemplifies these qualities.

Mr. Richard "Dick" Zentner first became involved with the Norwin Band Boosters in the 1980s. He began his booster parent journey on the pit crew and when it became known that he had his commercial driver's license, he was quickly recruited to drive one of the equipment trucks.

The award is named in honor of Patrick John Hughes, the father of Patrick Henry Hughes, a remarkable young man who, despite physical challenges that would seem overwhelming to many, excelled as a musician and student.

ensembles invited; those ensembles can reapply for Final Decision deadline) or September 15, 2014 (Final Decision deadline). The Application Fee is \$100 for the first ensemble from a single school or individual, and \$75 for each additional ensemble, capped at \$500 for up to eight applications from a single school.

Invited chamber ensembles are obligated to stay at the Festival hotel and participate in the Festival Packages. The cost of attendance will vary depending on the per-person Festival Package selected (see Festival Package sheet for participation package costs and inclusions).

Because of the major commitment to programming and providing resources to support a complete chamber music experience, chamber ensemble musicians should not be members of ensembles accepted for the Festival's other Featured ensembles or honor ensembles.

NAMM Foundation research project ties language skills improvements to music training among at-risk youth

research project supported by SupportMusic.com co-presenter and Music for All Strategic Advocacy Partner, the NAMM Foundation, released initial findings that display improvements in language skills among at-risk youth who participated in music training. The NAMM Foundation partnered with Northwestern University's Auditory Neuroscience Lab led by neurobiologist Dr. Nina Kraus to present the study. In July, the research project studied language skills of at-risk youth at the Harmony Project, a non-profit organization providing free musical training to children in gang reduction zones in Los Angeles.

"A group of Los Angeles gang members stopped to listen to a little kid playing Brahms on a tiny violin in a farmer's market. They had tattoos, shaved heads and gang clothing. After five or six minutes without saying a word to one another, I watched those gang members pull out their own money and put it gently into the little kid's case. Those gang members were teaching me that they would rather be doing what that kid was doing than what they were doing, but they never had the chance."

Inspired by what she saw, Dr. Margaret Martin founded the Harmony Project in 2001 to promote positive youth development through year-round music training. The program provides musical instruments and at least five hours of training each week to disadvantaged youth aged 8-18. The Harmony Project also promotes service learning through a peer mentor program. "Thousands of children have demonstrated that they would rather spend their afterschool hours in challenging music classes and rehearsals than join gangs or get into trouble," noted Dr. Martin. Beyond Los Angeles, the Harmony Project has expanded its programs to at-risk youth in Ventura, Calif., Miami and New Orleans. Dr. Martin reported that over the past six

years, 96% of Harmony Project high school seniors have graduated in four years and gone on to college.

Dr. Kraus has pioneered multidisciplinary research on how music affects brain function across the lifespan. Dr. Kraus brought her Auditory Neuroscience Lab to Los Angeles and observed at-risk elementary school students who had participated in Harmony Project music training as well as a control group of students who did not participate in Harmony Project programming until the following year. According to Dr. Kraus: "Music education is an important investment in teaching a child all kinds of skills."

In the research study, Dr. Kraus acknowledged that the educational gap widens over the first four years of school and asked in her experiment if music can offset the academic gap between rich and poor. The project



observed that at-risk children in the Harmony Project improved reading skills from second to third grade, where reading skills dropped in students who did not participate in music training. One student in the Harmony Project study observed: "I believe music has helped me focus more. I'm not sure how, but I am able to concentrate more easily with loud noises around. It's a great skill to have, especially in hectic situations."

According to Dr. Kraus, "musicians have biological advantages in hearing speech and noise." Just as musicians must find a melody or rhythm from a complex soundscape, students must be able to pay attention to a teacher

while there are many distractions in the classroom.

Dr. Kraus & the Harmony Project's research findings were featured in a National Endowment for the Arts webinar and a PBS Weekend NewsHour segment in January. "The NAMM Foundation is honored to support Dr. Kraus in these studies, which we believe will push the boundaries of knowledge about the effects and impact of music learning," said Mary Luehrsen, executive director of the NAMM Foundation. "Over time, these and other studies will continue to substantiate that music education is essential to learning for every child."

Although many studies have demonstrated the correlation between music training and student success, the initial findings of this NAMM Foundation-funded project have begun to prove that it's not just the smart kids that

are in music, but it's music that makes the smart kids. Dr. Kraus and the NAMM Foundation have also partnered with Chicago Public Schools in the first study of its kind to explore the impact of music education in public schools. According to the NAMM Foundation, the project attempts to answer two key questions in music research: what are the effects of music training on the brain and how does it cause these changes?

Over the past decade, the NAMM Foundation has invested nearly \$80 million in promoting the benefits of music making, including the groundbreaking "Mozart Effect" study. Site Tentative Clarification:

Site Tentative indicates that Bands of America has a commitment in the area on the listed date. The stadium is pending final schedules.



Schedule Changes and Refund Policy

Because Bands of America uses a large number of collegiate facilities, certain dates on this schedule cannot be finalized until affected conferences issue final fall football and television schedules. Any schedule changes will be communicated to all participating bands. "Postmark" dates and Participation Cooperative Fees will be "protected" should a site or date change require you to transfer to another BOA Regional date/site, or withdraw. If a change occurs, you will have until an announced date to make a change and still protect your postmark date and Participation Cooperative Fee. **Participation Cooperative Fees are not otherwise refundable or transferable from one event to another.** Bands that withdraw from an event will not receive Cooperative tickets and will only be entitled to a refund per the refund policy. We reserve the right to cancel a Regional if 18 bands are not registered by May 13, 2014.

Housing Bureau for Super Regionals and Grand Nationals

All Competing bands and their booster groups utilizing hotel accommodations for their stay during the event are REQUIRED to make their hotel reservations through the BOA Housing Bureau for the respective event. The Housing Bureau has been set up to secure enough hotel rooms at the lowest block prices to accommodate all the bands' needs for the event. Housing Bureau forms and information will be sent separately. Bands that violate this policy will not be permitted to perform and forfeit all Participation Cooperative Fees.

Parking

Surrounding stadium parking lots are not necessarily included in rental of facilities used by BOA. A Parking Pass Request form will be included in your May mailing that will designate which Championships require a payment for buses/trucks. Most BOA events have bus/truck parking that is free to the participating bands including Grand Nationals; however, some Regionals require a parking pass. Parking passes have been approximately \$15 – \$30.

Regional Championships

Fees for Early Season Regional Championships will be \$650 per band, per event. Fees for Regular Season Regional Championships are \$800 per event. Some Fall Regional Championships will have a parking fee of up to \$30 per bus/truck. Amounts will be communicated in your May mailing. With the BOA Regional Championship Participation Cooperative program, your band will receive:

Early Season Regional:

- **25 Field Passes*** for Preliminaries (Note: All bands performing in Finals automatically receive 25 Finals Field Passes at no charge.)
- 15 Day Passes* (Day Pass includes one general admission Prelims and Finals ticket.) (Minimum face value \$360)
- Up to 6 Director / Staff Badges good for admission to Prelims and Finals
- All bands will receive a High Camera Instant DVD of your preliminary performance. (Bands that perform in Finals will also receive an instant copy of their Finals performance.)
 - * Face value of tickets and passes: at least \$815

Regular Season Regional:

- **25 Field Passes*** for Preliminaries (Note: All bands performing in Finals automatically receive 25 Finals Field Passes at no charge)
- **20 Day Passes*** (Day Pass includes one general admission Prelims and Finals ticket.)
- Up to 6 Director / Staff Badges good for admission to Prelims and Finals
- All bands will receive a High Camera Instant DVD of your preliminary performance. (Bands that perform in Finals will also receive an instant copy of their Finals performance.)
 - *Face value of tickets and passes: at least \$922.

Super Regional Championships

Fees for Super Regional events will be \$800 per band, per event. All Super Regional events will have a parking fee of up to \$30 per bus / truck. Parking fees will be communicated in your May mailing.

With the BOA Super Regional Championship Participation Cooperative program, your band will receive:

- 25 Field Passes* for Preliminaries (Note: All bands performing in Finals automatically receive 25 Finals Field Passes at no charge.)
- 20 Combo Tickets (Combo ticket includes general admission to each session Friday Prelims, Saturday Prelims and Saturday Finals.)
- Up to 6 Director / Staff Badges good for admission to Prelims and Finals
- All bands will receive a High Camera Instant DVD of your preliminary performance. (Bands that perform in Finals will also receive an instant copy of their Finals performance.)
 - *Face value of tickets and passes: at least \$1,619.

Day of Performance will be based on a participant's choice of day of performance and distance from the event criteria.

• The day of performance and prelims performance draw (performance block assignments) will be made on April 30, 2014.

The structure/procedure (in order of consideration) for Day of Performance is as follows:1,2

- Any 2013 BOA Regional Champion, the 2013 Grand National Champion or the 2013 Grand National Class Champion enrolled in the event may choose its day of performance (Friday or Saturday).
- Bands that request a Friday performance draw slot on their enrollment application will be assigned to perform on Friday.
- The 30 bands that are the farthest distance from the performance venue will be given priority for a Saturday Prelim performance time. Additionally, after Saturday slots have been filled, the remaining participating bands (those geographically closest to the performance venue), will have a Prelim performance time on Friday. Friday performances will begin no earlier than Noon and be completed by 8 p.m., and consideration will be given to create a workable schedule to allow bands to perform and still participate in their school commitments on Friday night.
- In the event that performance spots remain in the show, bands that apply after the postmarked date of Jan. 31 will be placed in the earliest prelim times on Friday.
- From time to time, bands (for whatever reason) withdraw from events, creating opportunities for "waitlist" or other new entrants.

Number of Bands in Finals and Judging Panels:

- Twelve (12) or fourteen (14) bands will advance to finals, depending on the total number of bands in the show (12 finalists if less than 45 bands are enrolled, 14 finalists if 45 or more enroll).
- One panel of judges will evaluate the event if less than 50 bands enroll by May 13. If more than 50 bands are enrolled by May 13, a new panel of judges will evaluate finals.

Grand National Championships

Fees for Grand National Championships will be \$900 per band.

With the BOA Championship Participation Cooperative program, your band will receive:

- 25 Field Passes* for Preliminaries (on the day your band performs) (Note: Bands will receive 25 field passes for Semi-Finals and Finals as they respectively advance.)
- 20 Semi-Finals Tickets*
- All bands will receive an Instant Video copy of their Preliminary performance. (Bands that perform in Semi-Finals will also receive an instant copy of their Semi-Finals performance.)

All Bands 325 Miles or Further from Indianapolis

There will be two preliminary events—Prelims 1 and Prelims 2—with up to 45 bands each. Each prelims contest will have a separate adjudication panel. Bands of America recognizes that the travel distance for some bands will necessitate missing one to two days of school just for travel time. In order to retain the integrity of Grand Nationals as a national championship and enable bands from across the nation to participate, BOA will allow bands traveling from schools located more than 325 miles (one way) from Indianapolis to choose to either be part of the regular performance time draw OR choose to participate in a special draw for the first block of times in the Prelims 2 contest. Bands from schools more than 325 miles (one way) from Indianapolis must select their preference on the application form.

Thursday Prelims Volunteer Opportunity:

It is feasible for groups within an approximate 200 mile radius of Indianapolis to perform on Thursday, return home for a full day of school on Friday, then return to Indianapolis Friday after school or Saturday morning for the Semi-Finals and Finals shows. Some bands may find this preferable to an extra night's housing. Bands that volunteer will be assured performance times prior to 8:30 p.m. Bands can select this option on the application form.
