NOTES FROM THE 2019 MUSIC FOR ALL NATIONAL FESTIVAL

I have recently returned from my first Music for All National Festival. It was a thrill for me to hear all of the remarkable performances and to feel like I was part of the larger music education universe.

In so many ways, my years in high school were the most important for my musical development. I was very lucky to attend the High School of Performing Arts, a New York City public school. I learned so much from the wonderful teachers there, but also from my fellow classmates, who like me, were passionately devoted to music. Even though I wanted to become a musician during my junior high school years, and my small New Jersey school system had an excellent music program, I did feel a little unusual in my passion for music compared to most of my friends. It was at PA where I found the musical community I so craved.

When I saw and heard the hundreds of musicians performing at Music for All, I felt that same passion for music and music making emanating from the students at the highest level. It was heartwarming to witness the positive impact of their shared musical community on the performances and overall educational experience.

My dear friends Bob Morrison and Jeff Grogan had often described Music for All to me, its educational mission, its power to change the lives of the students involved, but witnessing this firsthand was inspiring. Music for All's mission of exposure to great music, educational opportunities for all students in music as a life changing positive experience, is something to be admired, and admire it I did.

My first experience during this year's festival was attending a performance by the Seven Lakes Junior High School Honors Orchestra from Katy, Texas. After, they, like all the groups at Music for All, were evaluated by an outstanding group of excellent conductors. They were supportive of the excellent work of the head orchestra director from Katy, Texas, Catherine Urban. The comments to these young players by Jeff Grogan, Douglas Droste, Kirk Moss, and Orcenith Smith were not only sensitively presented, but made an immediate positive musical impact. Then Franz Anton Krager took Ms. Urban aside and made wonderful observations about her conducting, that I am sure she will employ as she continues her excellent work. In the end, the group and the conductor went on an expertly guided educational musical journey of possibility unlikely to be experienced anywhere else.

The concert by the Honor Orchestra of America led by Sey Ahn was a sensational example of great solo playing and outstanding ensemble playing producing a concert of commitment and passion.

Shelly Berg brilliantly led the Jazz Band of America in some very difficult and excellent works. It was remarkable to hear a high school jazz band with not only great ensemble playing, but with each member improvising at such an extraordinarily high level.

The Honor Band of America conducted by Ray Cramer was also sensational.

The level of these ensembles, the commitment of the students and their leaders, and the overall musical excellence left me inspired to do more for music education.

Those of us lucky enough to be part of the professional performing world of music can always do more to support our colleagues in the educational field. When I was music director of the Seattle Symphony, I was lucky enough to be actively involved with the Washington Music Educators Association, who work hard to increase the accessibility of music for every student. Being at Music for All was a powerful reminder of the remarkable work of the music teachers across our great country, who dedicate their lives to imparting this art form to the students. This work lasts a lifetime, improving lives, adding dimension, and understanding to the complex world in which we live. Music can be the great inspiration to a better world. I salute the great teachers, the great students, and thank everyone there for the inspirational performances that will stay with me forever.

It is my hope that Music for All continues to grow and influence education throughout our country. Wouldn't it be wonderful if Music for All's mission could become the mission for every school system in every state?

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ASSESSMENT PRACTICES OF SCHOOL ORCHESTRA DIRECTORS **AND STRING TEACHERS**

The assessment practices of school orchestra directors and string teachers have received very little attention in educational research literature. Recently, I had the opportunity to collaborate with two colleagues, Dr. Stephen Benham and Dr. Kristen Pellegrino, to co-author a book chapter on the topic. Our chapter appears in The Oxford Handbook of Assessment Policy and Practice in Music Education, Volume 2. Illuminating this topic and developing a baseline set of data that future researchers may use in their own analyses of assessment practice offered a worthy goal, and I hope you find this brief summary of our findings helpful to your teaching.

After discovering a small body of literature on the assessment practices of school orchestra directors and string teachers, our attention quickly shifted to conducting original research. First, we carried out a descriptive survey study to provide a sense of teacher priorities and frequency of assessment practice and types of assessment, using the eleven curricular categories identified in the ASTA String Curriculum as the basis of examples of what string teachers might assess.

We distributed the survey to more than 2,000 individuals who self-identified as K-12 string/orchestra teachers from ASTA's membership list. We received over 400 responses, for a response rate of 20%. Survey participants were asked to select which grade levels they currently teach, and our findings indicated that many participants teach at more than one level: 47% teach elementary school, 67% teach middle or junior high school, and 53% teach high school. Further, respondents indicated how many years they had taught music in public or private schools, and the data seemed to represent assessment practice among teachers with a wide range of experiences. Two

primary survey questions were developed from the curricular areas identified in the ASTA String Curriculum. The first question focused on forms of assessment used by teachers, and the next question focused on the frequency they assess each curricular area.

Performance-based assessments were, by far, the most frequently used form of formal assessment in the classroom to evaluate technique, musicianship skills, creative musicianship, and ensemble skills. Music literacy was nearly equally split between performance-based and written assessments, while evaluation of music and musical performances and historical and cultural elements tended towards written assessments and verbal feedback. Some teachers did not conduct any

assessment at all in every curricular area. Creative musicianship and historical/ cultural elements were the top two nonassessed areas, but were still assessed by the vast majority of teachers. The remaining nine curricular areas were all assessed by at least 96% of respondents.

Performance assessments and verbal feedback comprise over 70% of all assessments used by teachers.

Discussion points include:

1. String teachers/orchestra directors use multiple forms of assessment. 2. String teachers/orchestra directors depend heavily on performance-based assessments and verbal feedback.

3. Written forms of assessment are used less than 20% of the time and tend almost exclusively towards assessing literacy, historical and cultural knowledge, and evaluation of music and musical performances.

4. Creative musicianship, which is still relatively new to the string field, was not evaluated at all by nearly 16% of teachers. On the other hand, the fact that 84% of teachers do assess creative musicianship seems to indicate the topic is valued.

A majority of participants in this study place greater emphasis on executive skills/knowledge and musicianship skills/knowledge. A surprisingly large number of respondents indicated they formally assessed these skills on a daily basis. Further study would be needed to determine what this actually looks like in a classroom or if the question was misunderstood in some way.



Selected comments by survey participants are summarized here. Teachers indicated that:

1. Multiple assessments are used for all curricular areas with great frequency;

2. Limited instructional time (such as meeting only 1–2 times per week, having rotating classes with other electives, or having lessons before/after school) limit opportunities for formal assessment;

3. Informal assessment occurs at every lesson/class/rehearsal, but formal assessment is more challenging to accomplish; and

4. They would like to assess more, but feel pressure to prepare for concerts.

Overall, respondents to this survey seemed to place a high priority on assessment. Challenges continue to exist in the administration and record collection of assessment processes, but with additional support (time, resources), teachers could accomplish more.

Based on our findings, we believe:

1. Music performance assessment can lead the way for other academic disciplines that seek similar authentic forms of assessment;

2. Advances in technology may offer the most hope to assess performance-based individual learning more effectively and efficiently;

3. Aligning assessment practices to standards/curricula, such as the ASTA String Curriculum, can assist teachers in making assessment meaningful and relevant;

4. When administrators facilitate a system of teacher peer collaboration targeting assessment, and put resources of time and money behind such initiatives, teacher instruction improves, and students will benefit; and

5. Teachers must have leeway to make informed choices about assessment to improve student learning. Empowered teachers empower their students to learn.

2020 Application/Audition Deadline: Completed application form with audition recordings, administrator signatures, and application fee must be received by **JUNE 5, 2019**

The Music for All National Festival audition process offers a unique opportunity, as it is a tool you can use to take your program to the next level. All auditioning ensembles receive recorded and written evaluation from the evaluation panel. The evaluation is "blind"-ensembles are not identified in the audition process. Evaluators recommend ensembles that demonstrate an exemplary level of excellence to receive an invitation to perform at the Festival.

Application Fees

The application fee is \$250 for bands, orchestras, and choirs, and \$200 for percussion ensembles. Chamber Festival Application Fee is \$200 for the first chamber ensemble from a single school, and \$150 for each additional ensemble, capped at \$1,250 for up to eight chamber ensemble applications from a single school.

2019 Advocacy in Action Award Winners Announced

Music for All's Advocacy in Action Awards recognize music programs, schools, and communities across the United States that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide access to music education for all students. To qualify for the Advocacy in Action Award designation, schools and districts submitted detailed descriptions of their music programs and project entries. Submissions were reviewed by a national panel of educators, administrators, community leaders, and business leaders. You can read and be inspired by the detail of all of our award-winners online at advocacy.musicforall.org. **Here are some featured winners.**

Fundraising & Sponsorship "Blitz Boost" Rouse H.S., TX

The Blitz is a six-week online direct donation program that supplements the Rouse High School Band's budget each year. The booster organization hosts a Telethon Pizza Party for the students to call and text family, friends, and community members, and at the end of this year's Telethon, they had approximately \$12,000 pledged of their \$20,000 goal. Students texted, emailed, and shared links to the Blitz website on social media, and they increased momentum through student-driven incentives, such as free smart music passes for the student in each section with the highest donations. Overall, the Blitz raised \$26,000 for the Rouse High School Band program this year.

Marketing & Promotion

"Extended Community Building" Highland H.S., AZ

The goal of Highland High School's Extended Community Building is to market their orchestras to the large population of retired adults moving to retirement communities, encouraging them to come to performances by bringing the concert to them. The model begins with a one semester Strolling Strings class where students learn the "strolling" aspect of memorization and how to communicate and visit with the crowd – a large part of why people come to the show. During the second semester, they begin to travel, performing up to 10 gigs per year. After many years of relationship building, the program has grown substantially, with their holiday concerts selling out all three performances in a 900-seat auditorium.

Parent & Booster Involvement "Private Lesson Scholarships"

Princeton City School District, OH While it is not required to attend private music lessons at Princeton, many students desire to do so. In 1961, Princeton Music Boosters started awarding 2 scholarships allowing students to attend private music lessons. Today, they award 25 scholarships ranging in value from \$500-\$750. About two-thirds of the scholarships are named in memory or in honor of loved ones and are funded by private donations from alumni, staff, and supporters. The remaining are funded by the Princeton Music Boosters from their general budget and a variety of fundraising activities.

Recruitment & Retention "Knights of the Rock Table" Windsor H.S., NY

The Windsor High School Music Program works to ensure that every student can participate in a course or ensemble pertaining to their musical interests, offering exciting opportunities for non-traditional musicians in addition to Band and Chorus. This was the motivation behind the Knights of the Rock Table (KORT), a music program created based on the students' musical interests that has led to the creation of a variety of new courses such as Piano, Guitar, Bass Guitar, and Drum Set. By offering a "music education for everyone," participation in their ensembles skyrocketed and over 80% of incoming freshmen choose to fulfill their mandatory Fine Arts credit with a music course.

Decision-Maker Interaction

"Success Through Collaboration" Northbrook Jr. High School, IL The collaborative relationship between administration and music educators is a hallmark of Northbrook School District 28. At least two administrators attend every concert for performing groups, participate regularly and actively in booster meetings, and are involved in music productions at the elementary level. The music faculty set administrators up for success by providing them with data that allows the administration to approach the Board of Education fully prepared to speak to the needs of the music department from a factual and historical perspective.

Community Engagement

"Right Now (We Need One Another)" Charlottesville H.S., VA

In the wake of the deadly events of August 11-12, 2017, a group of five Metro Nashville Schools students showed their love and support for the Charlottesville community by recording a version of BeBe Winans's song "Right Now (We Need One Another)" and putting together a heartwarming video message that was emailed to teachers at Charlottesville High School. On Friday, September 15, the two groups of students came together to perform the song at a school-wide assembly at Charlottesville High School. Nine days later, the video of the combined performance was broadcast as part of the Concert For Charlottesville featuring musicians such as Dave Matthews, Pharrell Williams, and Stevie Wonder.
