



All my experiences in music have given me a greater appreciation for this art form than I could have ever imagined. Working with the band has given me a greater passion for working hard to achieve something great.





About Grand Nationals

Music for All's Bands of America Grand National Championships, presented by Yamaha and U.S. Marines, is America's premier national marching band event.

First and foremost, Grand Nationals is an educational performance opportunity. An expert panel of adjudicators not only rank and rate each band, they also provide commentary that participating band directors can use to bring their music program to the next level. Grand Nationals is also a spectacular music and pageantry event, one that band fans from across the nation and around the world travel to for the exciting and creative performances.

Music for All was founded in 1975 as "Marching Bands of America." Our first event, the 1976 Summer Workshop/Festival, was held at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, and included the first Summer National Championship for marching bands in UWW's famed Warhawk Stadium.


The first fall Grand National Championship was held in 1980 at the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Florida. Marching Bands of America became Bands of America in 1984, which was also the first year Grand Nationals was held in the newly opened Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. Bands of America held the first marching event in Lucas Oil Stadium in fall 2008 with a special "Sound Check," followed that fall with a Super Regional and the Grand National Championships.

Grand Nationals has been held at the Gator Bowl, East Tennessee State University, the Hoosier Dome (1984–1986, 1989–2007), Pontiac Silverdome (1987–1988) and Lucas Oil Stadium (2008–present).

2021 GRAND NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2021 Grand National bands come from 18 states, with more than 15,000 students performing. Grand Nationals includes an Expo on the concourse, special events like the Future Music Educators' Experience, Student Leadership Workshop with Dr. Tim Lautzenheiser, and recordings of "Teaching SEL Through Music" podcast sessions. This year, we have exhibition performances by the incredible marching bands from Miami University, Murray State University, and Rutgers University, as well as the Indianapolis Public Schools Music Showcase.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who can enroll in Bands of America events? Enrollment is open to all high school bands on a first-come, first-served basis.

How is performance order determined?

Preliminary performance times are scheduled based on a random draw. Applications received and paid for on or before February 28 (for 2021) are eligible for the initial draw, after which performance times are based on postmark of application, with earlier postmarks receiving the later performance times. The previous year's Grand National Champion has the option to choose its Prelims performance time. Semi-Finals and Finals performances are scheduled by a random pre-draw by each band's representative on site.

How is classification determined?

Classification in Bands of America Championships is determined by school enrollment, grades 10-12: Class A -600 students and fewer, Class AA — 601-1250, Class AAA — 1251-1750, and Class AAAA -1751 and above. Each band declares its school's 10th-12th grade enrollment on the event application. Each principal must verify enrollment at the start of fall and consider all those students in the 10th-12th grade population, utilizing the numbers used in reporting enrollment for state funding. Enrollment numbers to determine classification breakdown are examined and reset every three years based on the prior three years of Bands of America Championships bands. The current classification began with the Fall 2018 season. Using the data from 2019 and 2021 (BOA Championships did not operate in 2020), the next reclassification will occur effective Fall 2022.

Why are classifications by school enrollment? The Bands of America classification system is designed to separate participating bands into recognition groups, where the bands in "class" competition with each other have the same size general student population base from which to draw.

Why aren't the classifications

announced? By nature, appreciation of arts requires subjective reactions. We do not announce or publish band classifications, before or during events. Our intention is to not draw attention to classification, so as to eliminate expectations of a band's performance based on class, including those of the judges.

What are the Division Ratings? A division rating of I, II, III or IV is awarded to each band based on preliminary performances, with a division rating of "I" awarded to the highest scoring range. Division ratings do not play into the selection of finalists, which is based on overall score regardless of class.

How are finalist and semi-finalist bands selected? The top 12 scoring bands regardless of class are invited to perform in Grand National Finals. If a Class Champion is not among the highest scoring bands advancing to Finals, they will be invited to perform at Finals in exhibition. See page **76** for a detailed description of selection of Grand National Semi-Finalists.

What are the judges looking for? Bands receive recorded evaluation and scoresheets from each judge. The emphasis is on the input the judge offers to the band's program. It is the position of Bands of America that music is the more important aspect of the performance, with marching as the presentation and visual enhancement of the program. Likewise, greater emphasis is placed on general effect than on fine-line perfection of the performance. The weight of the numbers places 60% of the value on music and 40% on visual, as well as 60% on general effect and 40% on performance. Each judge is assigned a specific area on which they focus: ensemble and general effect judges are located at a vantage point from above (e.g., press box), and individual performance judges are located on the field. You can download the adjudication handbook from marching.musicforall.org for more information.

Who are the Bands of America

Adjudicators? Bands of America judges are well-established experts in the music education, marching, and pageantry fields, with their educational philosophy and background taken into consideration as much as their career accomplishments. Panel assignments are made by the Chief Judge and are reviewed by Music for All executive management. Before any assignments are made, each potential judge must complete an "affiliation form," listing all bands with which they have any kind of relationship. This enables Music for All to create BOA judging panels whose members are unaffiliated with any of the participating bands.

Is electronic recording allowed in the stadium? No video or audio recording is permitted in the stadium without the express written permission of Music for All, in advance of the event.

Camera Policy: Any still camera (making film or digital still pictures) is allowed into and may be used from the spectator seating area of any venue, as long as it does not interfere with or disrupt the viewing experience of any other spectator. Family, friends, and fans may take still photos of BOA events for personal use only. The images may not be sold or otherwise distributed without the written permission of Music for All. Cameras (of any kind) may not be used on the field. People with field passes or name badges must go into the stands to take digital or film pictures. Tripods or other similar equipment that obstruct the view or path of travel of others in seating areas are not allowed.

SCORE POINT BREAKDOWN

Music Performance scores are averaged —possible 20 points. Visual Performance scores are averaged—possible 20 points. The Music and Visual averages are added to the Music General Effect total (40) and Visual General Effect score (20) for a possible total of 100 points. Any penalties are then deducted to calculate the final score.







He would serve the band program at Norwin for decades and remained actively involved until his passing. Tom served as instructional staff, logistics and transportation director, chairman of the Norwin Band Festival and Winter Guard Show, and Norwin Band Aides President.

Through his years at Norwin, Tom earned the trust of five band directors as he worked tirelessly to support students. He knew the benefits of participation in music education and regularly advocated for its importance. Tom had a deep understanding and appreciation of the past, evidenced by his respect for tradition, which enabled him to help the band program grow and adapt to changing needs. A keeper of institutional knowledge, along with 2013 recipient Dick Zentner, he was always ready with a smile, encouragement, a listening ear—or even to pitch in himself to help solve the problem at hand. Whenever someone in the Norwin Band Aides had a question, the answer usually started with, "Let's ask Tom."

As executive director of the Three Rivers Winter Ensemble Association, Tom led the way for members of Western Pennsylvania's color guard and percussion community. He excelled at event planning and providing memorable opportunities for those who attended. Tom was glad to help band programs across Western Pennsylvania, stepping up to share best practices for their booster programs and offering suggestions on hosting successful events.

After a courageous fight against COVID, Tom passed away on April 28, 2021. PBS NewsHour referred to Tom as "an amazing American lost to the pandemic." Tom's lifelong dedication and commitment to the Norwin band and his community exemplify the attributes of an extraordinary music parent and booster. His caring personality and warm smile are proudly remembered by the thousands of people he positively influenced throughout his life.





Providing more than 25 years of continuous service, Eric L. Martin was the Chief Executive Officer of Music for All (MFA). Mr. Martin served first on Music for All's Board of Directors, followed by positions

as MFA's Associate Executive Director, then Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, until being appointed as CEO in 2010, a role in which he served until April 2020. He served as Interim President of ScholarshipAuditions.com until December 31, 2020.


During his tenure as Music for All's CEO, Mr. Martin championed initiatives that strengthened the organization's fiscal position, expanded its organizational capacity, and consistently increased the number of students, teachers, and others directly served by Music for All.

Mr. Martin is a member of several Indianapolis and Indiana boards of directors. He is an honors graduate of Dartmouth College. He also holds a Juris Doctor degree from the University of Michigan Law School and has been admitted by exam to the District of Columbia and State of Georgia bar associations.

A native of Greenville, MS, Mr. Martin participated in instrumental music programs throughout high school and college. In 1971, he was one of the first African Americans inducted into the Greenville High School Hall of Fame.

A two-time winner of the HEB Education Foundation's Award of Excellence, his groups were two-time Texas UIL State Marching Champions, PAS National Drumline Champions, Sudler Shield of Honor recipients and medaled over 25 times at BOA Regional, Super-Regional and Grand Nationals. 

John Alstrin

Prosper, TX

John Alstrin is the Director of Fine Arts for the Prosper Independent School District in Prosper, TX. Mr. Alstrin served as the Director of Bands at Prosper HS from 2014 –2019. During that time, the Prosper band surged from 180 to 380 members in five years and went from last place at their first contest in 2014 to Bands of America Grand Nationals Finalists in 2018. The Prosper Band advanced to the UIL 5A State Marching Contest for the first time in school history in 2017, and then returned to the UIL 6A SMC in 2018. The Prosper Wind Ensemble was named a Commended Winner in the Mark of Excellence National Wind Band Honors competition and was named the Overall Grand Champions of the 2017 and 2018 Dallas Winds Invitational.

Prior to serving in Prosper, TX, Mr. Alstrin served as an Associate Director at LD Bell High School, the University of Houston, and Lake Highlands High School. Mr. Alstrin is active across the United States as a quest conductor, clinician, consultant, and adjudicator. In the summer months, Mr. Alstrin has served as the director for several drum major camps across the state of Texas and has served on the brass staff for the Madison Scouts and Cavaliers Drum & Bugle Corps. His professional affiliations include the Texas Music Educators Association as a past TMEA Region 24 Band Chair, the Texas Bandmasters Association, Kappa Kappa Psi, Tau Beta Sigma (honorary), Texas Music Administrators Conference, Texas Music Adjudicators Association, and Phi Beta Mu (Alpha Chapter). Mr. Alstrin currently resides in Prosper, TX with his wife Christina, son Collin (12), and daughters Addison (9) and Harper (5).

George Boulden Richmond, KY

George R. Boulden holds the positions of Professor of Music and Associate Director of Bands at the University of Kentucky, where he serves as the conductor of the Symphony Band. Ryan Brittain Houston, TX

Ryan Brittain began his career as the Associate Director of Bands at Cedar Ridge High School in Round Rock, Texas. During his time at Cedar Ridge, he served as the marching band director and conductor of the symphonic band. Within a short timeframe, the Cedar Ridge Marching Band was a consistent Bands of America Regional Finalist and Caption Winner, a UIL 6A State Marching Band Participant, and a BOA Grand National Finalist in 2013. In the same year, the Cedar Ridge HS Low Brass Choir was invited to perform at the prestigious Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago. Concert Bands under his direction have been awarded consistent UIL Sweepstakes awards and best in class awards at state concert band festivals. After five years of teaching at Cedar Ridge, Brittain accepted a position as the Director of Bands at Wells Middle School in Houston, Texas. He helped the program achieve sweepstakes at UIL and grew the programs numbers substantially. 

The Legacy Wind Ensemble performed at the MFA National Concert Festival in 2014. He was the Associate Director of Bands at Westlake High School in Austin, Texas from the fall of 1991 through the spring of 2007. The Westlake Band performed at the Midwest Clinic in 2002, the Tournament of Roses Parade in 2003 and was a consistent finalist at the San Antonio Bands of America Super Regional and the UIL State Marching Contest.

Glenn is a sought-after clinician for Music for All and Yamaha. Glenn has been a judge for Bands of America since 1995 and a judge for Drum Corps International since 1992.



Mike Howard Leander, TX

Mike Howard is in his 12th year at Vandegrift High School and in his 17th year of teaching high school band. As the Vandegrift Marching Band Director, Mr. Howard's bands have been recognized with several high honors such as 2019 BOA Grand National Champion, BOA Regional Champion, BOA Super Regional Finalist, BOA Super Regional Class Champion, UIL State Marching Contest Finalist, 6A UIL State Marching Contest Bronze Medalist and 5A UIL State Marching Contest Silver Medalist. The Vandegrift Wind Ensemble was selected as the 2018 TMEA 6A State Honor Band Champion and performed at the 2019 TMEA Convention. Most recently, the Vandegrift Wind Ensemble was chosen as a feature ensemble at the 2020 Midwest Clinic in Chicago. Mr. Howard's concert bands are consistent UIL Sweepstakes Award winners and TMEA Honor Band State Finalists.

Before coming to Vandegrift, Mr. Howard was an assistant band director at James E. Taylor High School in Katy ISD. Mr. Howard, a native of Hondo, TX, started his teaching career as an Assistant Band Director at Morton Ranch High School, where he helped open the school in 2004. Before teaching at Morton Ranch, Mr. Howard was an instructor for the Cedar Park High School Band in Cedar Park, Texas and an instructor for the Madison Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps from Madison, Wisconsin. Mr. Howard's professional affiliations include membership in Phi Beta Mu, Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Music Adjudicator's Association and the Texas Bandmasters Association. He has served music education as TMEA Region 32 Band Chair and continues to serve as TMEA Area E Band Chair. Mr. Howard graduated from Texas State University in San Marcos, Summa Cum Laude, with a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education. He lives in Leander, Texas with his wife Amber, his daughter Madison, and his son Justin.

Nola Jones Nashville, TN

As a lifelong music educator, Dr. Nola Jones has garnered a national reputation as a devoted and effective leader in arts education. Previously, Dr. Jones was Director of Visual and Performing Arts for Metropolitan Nashville Public Schools in Nashville, Tennessee where her duties included instructional supervision of four hundred professional arts education specialists, curriculum planning, professional development, and implementation of Music Makes Us, a unique public/private music education partnership in Metro Nashville Public Schools.

Dr. Jones maintains an active schedule as a guest speaker, conductor, adjudicator, clinician, and program evaluator. She has served on the Board of Directors for the Tennessee Performing Arts Center and the Education Advisory Board for the Frist Center for Visual Arts. She has been a featured presenter at the prestigious Midwest Clinic and NAMM Music Education Days and frequently

serves as a clinician for Save the Music Foundation. At the request of the National Association for Music Education. She has served on the Executive Board of the Middle Tennessee School Band and Orchestra Association, as state chair for the National Band Association, and President of Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters' Eta Chapter. She currently serves on the Judge Administrative Team for Drum Corps International and has adjudicated numerous national championships for Bands of America. Drum Corps International, Drum Corps Japan, Winter Guard International, and Winter Guard International Percussion. Her professional affiliations include Tennessee Council of Visual and Performing Arts Supervisors, National Association for Music Education, Tennessee Music Educators Association, Tennessee Bandmasters Association, Middle Tennessee School Band and Orchestra Association, National Band Association, Phi Beta Mu, Sigma Alpha Iota, Tau Beta Sigma, and Kappa Kappa Psi. Dr. Jones received the Bachelor of Music Education degree from Mississippi State University and the Master of Music Education degree from Mississippi College. She received her Doctorate of Musical Arts from the University of South Carolina.

Jay Kennedy Ashland, MA

Mr. S. Jay Kennedy's career encompasses varied and successful experiences as a composer, arranger, producer, performer, educator, and administrative leader. He is Vice President for Academic Affairs/Vice Provost at Berklee College of Music in Boston. Kennedy received his Ph.D. from Boston College and Master of Music and Bachelor of Music Education degrees from Northwestern University.

Mr. Kennedy has composed, arranged, and produced music for hundreds of television and radio commercials, for which he has received numerous awards. His music has also been heard in feature films, including Wayne's World, Electric Horseman, Fast Break, and Lethal Weapon 2; and in a variety of television series, including One Tree Hill, Judging Amy, and Felicity. A veteran of the recording industry, Mr. Kennedy has written and produced music for Sheryl Crow, Siedah Garrett, James Ingram, Patti Austin, Little Richard, Stanley Clarke, Brenda Russell, Dave Grusin, and Singers Unlimited. Mr. Kennedy was a Grammy Award finalist in 2002 for arrangements on the recording of "Virtuosi" by Gary Burton and Makoto Ozone.

His published compositions include works for concert band, percussion ensemble, and marching band. Mr. Kennedy has been an active adjudicator for marching band, drum corps, and indoor percussion competitions for over 30 years, and has written for several drum and bugle corps. He has also composed the themes for the Drum Corps International (DCI) championship broadcasts and DVDs. He was elected to the DCI Hall of Fame in 2007 for longtime contributions as an adjudicator, judge administrator, arranger, and composer.

Chester Phillips Roswell, GA

Dr. Chester B. Phillips is the Associate Director of Bands and Director of Athletic Bands at Georgia State University. Under his leadership, the GSU Panther Band has received several honors and accolades including participation in the 2014 Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, marching in the 57th Presidential Inaugural Parade, participation in the Pepsi Halftime Show of Super Bowl LIII, and an invitation to march in the 2021 Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California.

As a clinician, Dr. Phillips has presented at numerous state music education conferences, the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic, the Music for All Summer Symposium, College Band Directors National Association Biannual Conference, and Drum Corps Japan. He is an active judge with Drum Corps International. Prior to his appointment at Georgia State University, Dr. Phillips taught for nine years in Georgia at the Cobb County and Gwinnett County public schools at the middle and high school level.

Ken Turner Apalachin, NY

Ken has extensive experience in music education. He has served as band director, music supervisor, clinician, music arranger, program coordinator, adjudicator, and guest conductor. His bands have won numerous local, state, and national honors.

Ken was Music/Brass Chairman for the New York State Field Band Conference, Drum Corps Associates, the New York Federation of Contest Judges, and Drum Corps International (DCI). He served as Judge Administrator for the New York State Field Band Conference as well as Drum Corps International. He has judged virtually every major state and national marching music event. - b) The next eight (8) highest scoring bands determined from all remaining scores from Prelims 1 and 2, regardless of class will advance; plus
- The two (2) highest scoring bands from each of the four classes from each Prelims, should they not already be among the bands selected based on criteria a) and b) above, will advance.

The announcement of Semi-Finalist bands will take place Friday during the 9:00 p.m. Awards Ceremony. Semi-Finals performance order will be posted online at **marching.musicforall.org/gn** as soon as possible after the schedule is available to publish.

Class Awards will be presented from among Semi-Finalist bands and announced at the end of Semi-Finals. The highest scoring band in each class will be named Class Champion.

The top 12 scoring bands from Semi-Finals, regardless of class, will be invited to perform in Finals. Class Champions not among the top 12 scoring bands will be invited to perform in exhibition.
