ABOUT GRAND NATIONALS

Music for All's Bands of America Grand National Championships, presented by Yamaha, is America's premier national marching band event.

First and foremost, Grand Nationals is an educational performance opportunity. An expert panel of adjudicators not only rank and rate each band, they also provide commentary that participating band directors can use to bring their music program to the next level. Grand Nationals is also a spectacular music and pageantry event, one that band fans from across the nation and around the world travel to for the exciting and creative performances.

Music for All was founded in 1975 as "Marching Bands of America." Our first event, the 1976 Summer Workshop/Festival, was held at the University of Wisconsin–Whitewater, and included the first Summer National Championship for marching bands in UWW's famed Warhawk Stadium.

The first fall Grand National Championship was held in 1980 at the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Florida. Marching Bands of America became Bands of America in 1984, which was also the first year Grand Nationals was held in the newly opened Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. Bands of America held the first marching event in Lucas Oil Stadium in fall 2008 with a special early season "Sound Check," followed that fall with a by the Indianapolis Super Regional and the Grand National Championships.

Grand National Championship Venues have included the Gator Bowl (1980), East Tennessee State University (1981–1983), the Hoosier Dome (1984–1986, 1989–2007), Pontiac Silverdome (1987–1988), and Lucas Oil Stadium (2008–present).

2022 Grand National Championships presented by Yamaha

The 100 bands competing at the 2022 Grand Nationals come from 20 states with more than 15,000 students competing. Grand Nationals includes an Expo on the concourse and special events like the Future Music Educators' Experience and the IPS School Music Showcase. This year, we have exhibition performances by outstanding marching bands from Northern Alabama University, Ohio University, and Western Carolina University.

IMPORTANT EVENT REMINDERS

Music is designed for all the senses. For everyone to fully enjoy the performances, we ask that you please adhere to the following. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

- Please turn off or silence all cell phones, pagers, watches, and other personal electronic devices.
- Video or audio recording is not permitted in the stadium without the express written permission of Music for All.
- Do not leave or return to your seat during performances.
- Keep all aisles clear.
- Please do not carry on conversations during performances or talk in a manner that disturbs your neighbors.
- No smoking in the stadium.
- Anyone exhibiting inappropriate behavior that disturbs the performances or the enjoyment of those around them may be asked to leave the stadium at the discretion of the contest director.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Who can enroll in Bands of America events?

Enrollment is open to all high school bands on a first-come, first-served basis.

How is performance order determined?

Preliminary performance times are scheduled based on a random draw. Applications received and paid for on or before January 31 (for 2022) are eligible for the initial draw, after which performance times are based on postmark of application, with earlier postmarks receiving the later performance times. The previous year's Grand National Champion has the option to choose its Prelims performance time. Semi-Finals and Finals performances are scheduled by a random pre-draw by a representative from each band on site.

How is classification determined?

Classification in Bands of America Championships is determined by school enrollment, grades 10–12: Class A – 600 students and fewer, Class AA – 601–1325, Class AAA – 1326–1850, and Class AAAA – 1851 and above. Each band declares its school's 10th–12th grade enrollment on the event application. A school administrator must certify enrollment and consider all those students in the 10th–12th grade population, utilizing the numbers used in reporting enrollment for state funding. Classifications are examined and reset every three years by a procedure that considers the composition of Bands of America Championship participation using three years of data. The current classification began this Fall (2022), and the next reclassification will occur effective Fall 2025.

Why are classifications by school enrollment?

The Bands of America classification system is designed to separate participating bands into recognition groups, where the bands in "class" competition with each other have the same size general student population base from which to draw.

Why aren't the classifications announced?

By nature, appreciation of arts requires subjective reactions. We do not announce or publish band classifications, before or during events. Our intention is to not draw attention to classification, so as to eliminate expectations of a band's performance based on class, including those of the judges.

What are the Division Ratings?

A division rating of I, II, III or IV is awarded to each band based on preliminary performances, with a division rating of "I" awarded to the highest scoring range. Division ratings do not play into the selection of finalists, which is based on overall score regardless of class.

How are finalist and semi-finalist bands selected?

The top 12 scoring bands regardless of class are invited to perform in Grand National Finals. If a Class Champion is not

among the highest scoring bands advancing to Finals, they will be invited to perform at Finals in exhibition. See the Semi-Finals Schedule page for a detailed description of selection of Grand National Semi-Finalists.

What are the judges looking for?

Bands receive recorded evaluation and scoresheets from each judge. The emphasis is on the input the judge offers to the band's program. It is the position of Bands of America that music is the more important aspect of the performance, with marching as the presentation and visual enhancement of the program. Likewise, greater emphasis is placed on general effect than on fine-line perfection of the performance. The weight of the numbers places 60% of the value on music and 40% on visual, as well as 60% on general effect and 40% on performance. Each judge is assigned a specific area on which they focus: ensemble and general effect judges are located at a vantage point from above (e.g., press box), and individual performance judges are located on the field. You can download the adjudication handbook from marching.musicforall.org for more information.

Who are the Bands of America Adjudicators?

Bands of America judges are well-established experts in the music education, marching, and pageantry fields, with their educational philosophy and background taken into consideration as much as their career accomplishments. Panel assignments are made by the Chief Judge and are reviewed by Music for All executive management. Before any assignments are made, each potential judge must complete an "affiliation form," listing all bands with which they have any kind of relationship. This enables Music for All to create BOA judging panels whose members are unaffiliated with any of the participating bands.

Is electronic recording allowed in the stadium?

No video or audio recording is permitted in the stadium without the express written permission of Music for All, in advance of the event.

Camera Policy: Any still camera (making film or digital still pictures) is allowed into and may be used from the spectator seating area of any venue, as long as it does not interfere with or disrupt the viewing experience of any other spectator. Family, friends, and fans may take still photos of BOA events for personal use only. The images may not be sold or otherwise distributed without the written permission of Music for All. Cameras (of any kind) may not be used on the field. People with field passes or name badges must go into the stands to take digital or film pictures. Tripods or other similar equipment that obstruct the view or path of travel of others in seating areas are not allowed.

SCORE POINT BREAKDOWN

Music Performance scores are averaged —possible 20 points. Visual Performance scores are averaged—possible 20 points. The Music and Visual averages are added to the Music General Effect total (40) and Visual General Effect score (20) for a possible total of 100 points. MINDY PATTON

Mindy Patton is the embodiment of the phrase "above and beyond" when it comes to the William Mason High School Marching Band and the greater Mason, Ohio area. When band director Edward Protzman arrived at William Mason, he could tell right away that Mindy was dedicated to ensuring the continued success of the band.

Over the years, Mindy has been responsible for arranging travel opportunities, coordinating and implementing medical and mental health programs for the students, planning meals and snacks, and securing monetary and in-kind donations for the band. However, that doesn't even touch on half of the tasks and responsibilities she takes on. Mindy has built the booster program into a welcoming and professional organization for all that wish to serve the students and staff of the Mason Band program. In his 27 years of teaching, Protzman has not worked with "a more devoted, professional, caring, and innovative parent organizer."

In 2020, in the midst of COVID, Mindy rented out a drive-in movie theater so the kids could have a socially distanced and safe, but fun, show theme reveal. She was integral in planning other COVID-safe events like Family Showcase, History Night, and more. On top of all that, Mindy pulled off perhaps the best William Mason Band event yet: organizing a road trip to Lucas Oil Stadium to replicate a Grand Nationals experience in a year when there wasn't one. Kim Bishop, recording secretary of the 2021 Mason Band Boosters described Mindy as "an incredible, selfless human being with a heart of gold. She devotes endless amounts of time and energy to our program which I will forever be grateful for the rest of my life."

REMEMBERING GARY MARKHAM 1947-2022

Gary Markham, whose influence and educational insights helped shape Bands of America (BOA) and Music for All (MFA), died in Dallas, Georgia on July 11, 2022. Born Jan. 27, 1947, he was a dedicated professional, mentor, and dear friend to all who were in his life.

Gary is a member of Music for All's Bands of America Hall of Fame. As the Chief Judge of Bands of America, he was a dedicated mentor to adjudicators and instrumental in the development and refinement of the Bands of America adjudication system and others, including for Drum Corps International (DCI).

Gary was Music for All's Senior Educational Consultant and coordinator of the Director Academy at the Music for All Summer Symposium. His guidance and leadership contributed to the continued development of the Music for All Summer Symposium and Music for All's educational programs.

Gary devoted his professional life to music and the marching arts. A natural-born talent, he was inspired early in life by his Sicilian immigrant grandfather, Francesco Alfredo Giovanni Amoroso (Alfred Love), whose Love's Band Chicago toured the US in the 1920s. Gary started out playing the French horn at Montgomery Area High School and went on to become an accomplished musician, earning a bachelor of science in music education at Mansfield University in 1968. He received his master's degree in music education from Penn State University in 1976, and his Ph.D. (ABD) in music administration from George Mason University in 1998. Gary's light shined through every experience of his life and his work. He took his first career assignment as Band Director at South Williamsport Area High School and, from there, went to lead the instrumental music program at Williamsport High School, guiding the Marching Millionaire Band to award-winning status. His 45-year career as a progressive music educator in Pennsylvania, Georgia (Newnan H.S. and Cobb County School District), and Fairfax County, Va. (Robinson H.S.), culminated with his retirement in 2013 as the Supervisor of Instrumental Music at Cobb County School District in Georgia.

Gary worked internationally as a clinician, guest conductor, adjudicator, and consultant. In addition to Music for All and Bands of America, Gary was a longtime contributor and leader to several organizations with music-driven missions, including DCI, the Midwest Clinic, and several Metro Atlanta Arts Boards.

Gary's work with BOA since the 1970s and through the transition to Music for All helped set the standards for adjudication and competitive attributes of marching band competitions throughout the United States. His engagement with Drum Corps International (DCI) also spanned over four decades, joining the staff of the Blue Devils in the mid-1970s and later with Spirit of Atlanta as a music arranger and program coordinator. He became a judge for DCI in 1980 and ultimately was named Education Advisor for DCI's Rules and Systems Task Force. He continued to judge and participate



in activities with Music for All and DCI throughout 2021.

Gary was honored with a number of prestigious awards over the course of his career, including the Sudler Order of Merit from the

John Philip Sousa Foundation (1992), Music For All Hall of Fame (2006), Georgia Music Educators Administrative Leadership Award (2006), DCI and Coltrin & Associates Excellence in Music Education Award (2007), Music Educators' National Conference Excellence in Marching Music Education (2009), Conn-Selmer Institute Hall of Fame (2015), Music for All President's Award (2021), and was inducted into Drum Corps International's Hall of Fame (2022).

Gary's long and accomplished career in music and the marching arts was driven by his passion for excellence. Influenced by the many students that he had the privilege to lead, he recognized and nurtured their potential. His mentorship of instructors, administrators, and adjudicators worldwide will form his legacy and carry on his commitment to collaborative and effective leadership practices in education and adjudication.

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ALL CHILDREN DESERVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO LEARN AND GROW WITH MUSIC

The Arts Education Data Project (AEDP), spearheaded by Bob Morrison, CEO of Quadrant Research, in partnership with the State Education Agency Directors of Arts Education, provides the first-ever look at the status and condition of arts education in the U.S. using actual student participation data reported by school districts to their state education departments. On September 12, 2022, AEDP released the National Arts Education Status Report 2019 as a comprehensive look at access to and participation in arts education in the United States.

It's a matter of equity. The data in the report reveals the following (Morrison et al., 2022):

- 3,609,698* students in U.S. public schools do not have access to music education, and
- 2,095,538* students do not have access to any arts education (defined as dance, music, theater or visual arts).

The disciplines most available to students and therefore those which have the greatest participation rate are music and visual arts. In fact, most schools (80%) offer two or more of the arts disciplines. However, while 92% of students do have access specifically to music education during the school day and 49% of all students participate in music during the school day, 8% of all students (projected as more than 3.6M students) have no access to music education during the school students without access to music and arts education are concentrated in schools in major urban communities; have the highest percentage of students eligible for free/reduced price meals; and are either majority Black, Hispanic, or Native American. In addition, many of these students without music and arts education attend public charter schools.

For those who have participated in school-based music and arts education programs, the benefit is clear. Research shows that learning music results in educational, cognitive, social, emotional and physical benefits. For example, pioneering research conducted by neurobiologist Nina Kraus offers insight into how musical experience affects brain function across the lifespan. Findings to date indicate that tapping into the brain's potential for music learning supports overall learning and is most critical for disadvantaged and under-served students. This is why the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) recognizes music and the arts as part of a well-rounded education for all students. Yet, despite progress made in recent years to keep music and the arts in schools, millions of U.S. public school students still did not have access to these programs in the 2019 school year.

The intent of this research is for it to be used to enforce that a well-rounded education that includes music and the arts — as defined in the Every Student Succeeds Act — should be made available to every child in every U.S. public school.

So what can I do? We already have music education in our schools.

First, congratulations for insisting that music education remains central to a wellrounded education. It's important, however, to remain ever vigilant by ensuring the life-changing benefits of music education for future generations by:

- Where needed, working with school principals and district leaders to:
- tap available federal Title I funds that can be used to support student instruction in the arts and meet the learning needs of our nation's most vulnerable children.
- use federal Title IV Part A funds available to every U.S. school district to expand music and arts learning opportunities.
- Continuing to support music and arts educators in your school and community by: • volunteering for concerts, performances, and art shows.
- letting school board members and district and school administrators know that providing a well-rounded education that includes music and art is a priority for your community.
- sharing good news about school music and arts happenings with local media.

DAVID CARBONE

Bluffton, South Carolina

David Carbone has over 30 years of experience in music education in Florida, Ohio, Texas, and South Carolina. Carbone holds a master's degree in Wind Band Conducting from the University of South Florida and bachelor's degree in Music Education from the University of Miami.

Ensembles under Carbone's leadership have received superior ratings on the concert and sight-reading stages, advanced to finals contests at Bands of America Regional and Super Regional Championships, and finished top 20 at the BOA Grand National Championships Semi-Finals. Carbone led Bellbrook High School to two BOA Grand National Class Championships and the indoor percussion ensemble to a WGI Bronze Medal. At May River High School, Carbone grew the program from 26 members to over 100 in less than two years and was a recipient of the South Carolina Band Directors Association Outstanding Performance Award in Spring 2019.

Carbone previously served as Director of Bands at James Martin High School in Texas where his concert ensembles earned the Texas UIL "Sweepstakes" Award and an invitation to perform at Carnegie Hall in 2015. Carbone also served as visiting professor and interim band director at the University of Texas at Arlington.

Carbone enjoys an active schedule as a composer and arranger and is Artistic Director/Conductor of the Lowcountry Community Concert Band. As an active adjudicator for Bands of America and Drum Corps International, he has served on numerous national and world championship judging panels since 2002. Carbone is also in demand as a band consultant, concert festival judge, and guest conductor nationwide.

WAYNE DILLON Dunedin, Florida

Wayne Dillon holds a master's degree in Jazz performance/pedagogy from The University of Miami (FL). He completed both his Honors Fine Arts and Education degrees from York University in Toronto, Canada. Wayne is currently the Director of Bands at the Frank J. Ciccarell Academy in Elizabeth, New Jersey. In 2008, Wayne was awarded the State of New Jersey Governor's teacher recognition award for his work with the music program at Elizabeth High School.

His teaching responsibilities include Music Technology, along with Jazz, Symphonic, and Marching Bands.

The Elizabeth High School Symphonic and Jazz bands have consistently earned superior ratings during Wayne's tenure. The Marching Band was awarded three consecutive State Championships from 2005–2007. From 2011 to 2013, the marching band was named USSBA State and National Champions in group VA.

Wayne is an active adjudicator for Drum Corps International, Bands of America, and Winter Guard International. He has judged the prestigious National championships for all three organizations over the past thirty years. He is currently a DCI judge liaison and is responsible for judge assignments and training. Wayne has served as the brass caption head with the Boston Crusaders Drum and Bugle Corps and with The Cadets as the music supervisor in 2002. In 2010-2011, Wayne served as a staff member for the US Army All-American Marching Band.

GLENN FUGETT San Antonio, Texas

Glenn Fugett is a retired music educator whose career spanned 37 years in Texas and Tennessee. From 2019 to 2022, he worked in Instructional Support for Metro Nashville Public Schools. From 2015 to 2019, he was the Director of Bands and Orchestras at the Nashville School of the Arts whose wind ensemble received the Award of Distinction in Concert Performance from the American School Band Directors Association in 2019. Fugett's Chamber Orchestra and Wind Ensemble were both selected to participate in the Music for All National Festival in 2017.

From 2007 to 2015, Fugett was the Director of Bands at Legacy High School in Mansfield, Texas and was a finalist at numerous Bands of America Regional Championships and UIL State Marching Contest. They were the 3A Class Champions at the 2011 Arlington and 2013 Allen BOA Regional Marching Band Championships. Prior to his time at Legacy High School, Fugett was the Associate Director of Bands at Westlake High School in Austin, Texas from 1991 to 2007. The Westlake Band performed at The Midwest Clinic in 2002, the Rose Parade[®] in 2003, and was a consistent finalist at the Bands of America San Antonio Super Regional Championship and the UIL State Marching Contest.

Fugett has been an adjudicator for Bands of America since 1995 and Drum Corps International since 1992. Fugett was the DCI Percussion Judge Caption Head from 2003 to 2008 and served as DCI Judge Liaison from 2012 to 2015.

MARTIN GRIFFIN

Toms River, New Jersey

Martin Griffin has been a Band Director in New Jersey for 32 years and is currently the Director of Bands

and Coordinator of Fine Arts at Monroe Township High School. His responsibilities include directing the Marching Band, Wind Ensemble, Jazz Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble, and teaching AP Music Theory. The MTHS Marching Band was crowned New Jersey State and National Champions in 2013 and were selected to represent New Jersey at the 75th anniversary of Pearl Harbor in 2016. The MTHS Wind Ensemble has received multiple Gold and Superior ratings and was selected to perform at Carnegie Hall and the NJ Performing Arts Center.

Griffin performed for five seasons with the Hawthorne Caballeros Drum and Bugle Corps. He has been a percussion arranger for high school bands throughout New Jersey since 1987. Griffin currently judges for Bands of America, Drum Corps International, Winter Guard International, and more. In 2006, Griffin was selected to judge for the Drum Corps Japan Championships in Yokohama, Japan. He is the Percussion Caption Head for Drum Corps Associates and is the judging coordinator for The Mid Atlantic Percussion Society. Griffin has served on the Winter Guard International Percussion Advisory Board and was on staff for the Bands of America Honor Band in the 2022 Rose Parade[®].

Griffin received his bachelor's degree in music from William Paterson University, where he performed with the New Jersey Percussion Ensemble and the New Jersey New Music Ensemble. Griffin also has a master's degree in Educational Leadership from Kean University.

MARK HOSKINS Marietta, Georgia

Mark Hoskins recently retired as Director of Bands at Wheeler High School in Marietta, Georgia after 25 years of teaching in the Cobb County (Georgia) School District. He oversaw the entire band program, consisting of three concert bands, marching band, jazz ensemble, jazz combo, woodwind and brass choirs, winter guard, and percussion ensembles.

A graduate of East Tennessee State University, Hoskins is in constant demand as an adjudicator, clinician, and conductor in the marching band, jazz, and concert band arenas. His program at Wheeler is regionally and nationally recognized in those fields as well, consistently receiving superior ratings and best in class awards. He is a brass adjudicator for Drum Corps International, as well as a member of Phi Beta Mu Honor Music Society (2020), the Georgia Music Educators Association (GMEA), NAfME (National Association for Music Education, formerly MENC), Jazz Education Network (JEN), and a founding member of MBDNA, the Minority Band Directors National Association.

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Hoskins says, "Music education, by itself, has been a life-long and life-giving endeavor for me. It has simultaneously brought much joy to me and others in the 36 years I've been involved in teaching. Watching and listening to the musical development of the youth of today brings me much happiness and reaffirms my faith that what we do as educators is the most important thing we can do for our future leaders of tomorrow."

NOLA JONES Nashville, Tennessee

Dr. Nola Jones is a devoted, effective leader in arts education and possesses broad skills in leadership development, program design and implementation, curriculum writing, advocacy, and partnership building. She served as Director of Visual and Performing Arts for Metropolitan Nashville Public Schools, supervising over 400 professional arts educators, curriculum planning, professional development, and implementation of a unique public/private music education partnership called Music Makes Us.

Dr. Jones has appeared in the United States, Canada, Japan, the Netherlands, and Singapore as a guest speaker, conductor, adjudicator, clinician, and program evaluator. In 2017, she participated in the Yale University Symposium on Music in Schools and has been a featured presenter/clinician at the Midwest Clinic, NAMM Music Education Days, and the Save the Music Foundation. Dr. Jones also facilitated the NAfME Collegiate Advocacy Summit, directed the U.S. Army All-American Marching Band, and presented at the U.S. Army All-American Marching Band Directors' Academy.

She is on Drum Corps International's Judge Administrative Team, Bands of America's Chief Judge Team, and Music for All Summer Symposium Director Academy Leader. Dr. Jones has adjudicated for Bands of America, Drum Corps International, Drum Corps Japan, Winter Guard Netherlands Percussion, Winter Guard International, and Winter Guard International Percussion.

Dr. Jones received a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Mississippi State University, Master of Music Education degree from Mississippi College, and Doctorate of Musical Arts from the University of South Carolina.

JAY KENNEDY

Chicago, Illinois

Mr. S. Jay Kennedy's career encompasses varied and successful experiences as a composer, arranger, producer, performer, educator, and administrative leader. He is Vice President for Academic Affairs/Vice Provost at Berklee College of Music in Boston. Kennedy received his Ph.D. from Boston College, and Master of Music and Bachelor of Music Education degrees from Northwestern University.

Mr. Kennedy has composed, arranged, and produced music for hundreds of television and radio commercials,

for which he has received numerous awards. His music has also been heard in feature films, including Wayne's World, Electric Horseman, Fast Break, and Lethal Weapon 2; and in a variety of television series, including One Tree Hill, Judging Amy, and Felicity. A veteran of the recording industry, Mr. Kennedy has written and produced music for Sheryl Crow, Siedah Garrett, James Ingram, Patti Austin, Little Richard, Stanley Clarke, Brenda Russell, Dave Grusin, and Singers Unlimited. Mr. Kennedy was a Grammy Award finalist in 2002 for arrangements on the recording of "Virtuosi" by Gary Burton and Makoto Ozone. His published compositions include works for concert band, percussion ensemble, and marching band.

Mr. Kennedy has been an active adjudicator for marching band, drum corps, and indoor percussion competitions for over 30 years, and has written for several drum and bugle corps. He has also composed the themes for the Drum Corps International (DCI) championship broadcasts and DVDs. He was elected to the DCI Hall of Fame in 2007 for longtime contributions as an adjudicator, judge administrator, arranger, and composer.

ALLAN KRISTENSEN Clovis, California

Allan E. Kristensen is a retired music educator and arts supervisor, currently working part time as an arts consultant with the Fresno County Office of Education.

He earned his Bachelor of Arts Degree from San Jose State University where he studied percussion with Anthony J. Cirone. He also credits Fred Sanford, Robert Kalkofen, and Ralph Hardimon for his percussion development. He has performed with various symphonies and artists, as well as having marched with, and taught, the Santa Clara Vanguard Drum and Bugle Corps.

Mr. Kristensen is a highly recognized music adjudicator and clinician worldwide and has judged both the Bands of America Grand Nationals and the DCI World Championships several times each, and travels throughout the country judging for various indoor percussion circuits. Loyde continues his professional impact by serving as a nationally recognized adjudicator, clinician, and conductor appearing at The Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic; Music for All Summer Symposium; numerous state music educator conferences and marching championships; and many Bands of America Regional, Super Regional, and Grand National Championship events. Most recently, he was a faculty member for the Bands of America Honor Band in the 2022 Rose Parade[®] and serves as an Adjudicator for Bands of America and Drum Corps International. Loyde is grateful for the opportunity to continue to share his experiences and perspectives with educators, students, and community members who are passionate about personal growth, student achievement, and leadership.

MARK MCGAHEY Keller, Texas

Mark McGahey is in his 34th year as a music educator. He has been Director of Bands at Keller High School in Keller, Texas for 25 years. He also directed bands at South Grand Prairie High School in Grand Prairie, Texas, and Shawnee High School in Shawnee, Oklahoma.

McGahey is an active clinician and guest lecturer in many states including Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, Missouri, Florida, Illinois, and Ohio. He is an adjudicator nationwide, most notably with Drum Corps International (DCI) and Bands of America (BOA).
