






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DIFFUSION LEADS TO IMPROVEMENT:

HOW YOUR STUDENTS' SUMMER CAMP EXPERIENCE CAN HAVE A POSITIVE IMPACT THROUGHOUT YOUR BAND

Do you remember anything about diffusion from your high school biology or chemistry classes? (Shout out to all the great high school science teachers out there!) Diffusion is when something spreads out from an area of high concentration to an area of lower concentration – like what happens when you place a drop of food coloring in a glass of water.

The Music for All Summer Symposium presented by Yamaha is like diffusion in that when a student attends the Symposium there is a very high concentration of other students who value hard work, excellence, positivity, and are fired up to learn. When those students return home, those traits diffuse out into the rest of their own bands, color guards, and friend groups. This fall I had the opportunity to observe and help with some rehearsals of the Indianapolis Public Schools All-City Marching Band. When I walked up to one of their practices it was immediately obvious which students attended the Summer Symposium! They had the best posture, they marched the best, and most-importantly they were clearly being the leaders of their individual sections. Other students were clearly looking to them to determine what the ultimate standard should look and sound like.

Many students at camp start the week early with the **Leadership Weekend**, where they take a deep-dive into learning about how they can be the best leader possible. But even those that do not join us for the weekend will experience leadership lessons and activities all week! We are all about building leaders and those leaders will return to their home programs with the skills to serve, lead, help, and even teach their peers!

At the **DMI** (**Drum Major Institute**), students learn so much more than how to conduct a piece of music. They learn how to better communicate with their peers and adults. They learn how to be better teachers, so they can help with sectionals at

home. They learn how to lead by example and serve. These skills will permeate out to the students in their own bands, creating a richer experience for everyone.

In the Marching Band Division, students learn the fundamentals of marching and body movement from some of the best teachers in the country and they get to perform with the world-class drum corps, Carolina Crown. They learn why they are taught various skills and how to sequence that teaching into a system that works for any program. They will feel so much more confident helping their fellow students to improve visually. Additionally, marching band students learn instrumentspecific fundamentals and music ensemble skills and why each is important. That knowledge of how and why will diffuse into their sections and ensembles at home.

Students who attend the Color Guard Division will noticeably improve individual skills in both body movement/dance and equipment skills, such as flag, rifle, and sabre. When they go back to their home programs they can share the positively life-changing experiences that they've had at camp, but they can also show off their new skills and improved fundamentals. This is bound to make the other guard members around them better and the ensemble as a whole. Skills learned at camp not only transfer to the fall color guard, but also to winter guard as well!

The Marching Percussion Division at the Summer Symposium offers students of all ability levels an opportunity to increase their achievement level in playing the snare drum, tenor drum (quads), or bass drum. They learn sticking techniques, dynamics, and body movement/marching. Students prepare a performance piece that is seen and heard by the audience at the DCI show, too, but what is most important are the ensemble skills they learn. This is what can really diffuse from that single percussionist to the rest of his or her section at home.

Another exciting division of the Summer Symposium is the Music Production Boot Camp. This division features a state-of-the-art facility and cutting edge hardware and software. Many students who attend this division are not members of their high school bands, but rather are interested in video game sound design, music production, studio mixing and placement of microphones. Imagine how impactful it could be for that student to leave camp and teach his or her friends at school on the topics learned at camp.

The **Director Academy** at the Summer Symposium is a great place for adults to get professional development during the summer. It is the only place where high school band directors, middle school band directors, guard instructors, percussion specialists, marching and movement instructors, and college music majors can get together and learn collaboratively. Under the leadership of Nola Jones, the Director Academy will measurably impact entire school districts of music students through attendance by even a handful of district music educators! Some school districts send entire staffs, others encourage directors and staff to attend in alternating years. Either way, this should be something that all school administrators encourage and promote! The ripple effects are truly staggering!



Directors receive quality evaluation and feedback on their band's performance from national Bands of America adjudicators.

2023 Participating Bands of America Championships bands receive:

- The best in adjudication and feedback from a national panel of judges

- Participating band students are admitted free to watch Regional and Super Regional Prelims and Finals, Grand Nationals Prelims and Semi-Finals (Excluding Grand Nationals Finals which is reserved seating only.)

Clinic with BOA Adjudicators

ELIGIBILITY AND HOW TO APPLY

All high school bands are eligible to enroll in Bands of America Championships. All events are open on a first-come, first-served basis. Bands may choose competitive or **INPUT ONLY participation. Applications** must be signed by both the director and the school principal or superintendent and must be accompanied by the participation cooperative fee to be considered a complete registration. An unfulfilled Purchase Order is NOT considered payment. Preliminary performance times are assigned on a firstcome, first-served basis based on completed registration for that show, if space is available. Please review the cancellation policy online at marching.musicforall.org prior to completing your registration.

Registration fees for 2023

All one-day Regionals will have an enrollment fee of \$875. Super Regional Championship enrollment fee is \$925 and the Grand National enrollment fee is \$975.

Classification System

Bands are classified by school enrollment, grades 10-12 only: Class A -600 students and fewer, Class AA -601-1325, Class AAA -1326-1850, and Class AAAA -1851 and above. For purposes of determining enrollment, your principal must certify the number of students in grades 10-12 as reported on fall state and/or FTE funding reports.



The Advocacy in Action Awards recognize and celebrate the commitment of school administrators, community leaders, teachers, and parents who believe in music education and are advocating to ensure that it is a part of comprehensive education for all children. COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT "Our Tribute to the USO Big Band Show" Leyden High Schools Music Department-Northlake, IL

Every other year, the Leyden High Schools Music Departments presents "Our Tribute to the USO Big Band Show," creating opportunities to empower their music students to realize the great things they can do when they use their time and talents for worthwhile causes. In a community that has a strong legacy of military service, a project which celebrates the American heritage and salutes Veterans is meaningful. While this event is a performance opportunity for all students within the music department, it is also a chance for them to connect with community veterans, raise money for the Wounded Warrior Project and the USO, and continue the program's ongoing collaboration with active service organizations like the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars. As a Title 1 School, their music events are free and open to the public as a way of building community which has resulted in an historic standing-room-only capacity audience for this event. While this event is presented by the music department, collaboration with other areas in the school is what made the event so grand.

INNOVATIVE FUNDRAISING "MCHS Band Chicken Fundraiser" Montgomery Central High School Band-Cunningham, TN

With a goal of raising \$21,000 for new uniforms, the Montgomery Central High School Band held the "MCHS Band Chicken Fundraiser." Focused on their small, rural community in Cunningham, Tennessee, students were asked to pre-sell smoked whole chickens and tickets for a one-day event. Supporters were able to come to the event and picked up their chickens and could also purchase other items such as side dishes and desserts

by donation, with customers donating whatever they felt appropriate. With support from parents and booster in planning the event and smoking the chickens, and assistance from students in selling chickens and tickets and helping bag them on the day of the event, the band was able to purchase their new uniforms.

PANDEMIC PERSEVERANCE "The Hamilton Project" Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts-Tarpon Springs, FL

The Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts (TSLCA), as with all other performing arts programs in the nation, was greatly impacted during the COVID-19 pandemic and cancellations of events for the safety of their students and their families. "The Hamilton Project" was an advocacy initiative created as an outdoor, on-field production which lasted 40 minutes with two acts, inspired by the Broadway musical. With performances two to three times a week over three months, "The Hamilton Project" gave students the opportunity to perform safely and involve their community by sharing their talents through this production. Being in the midst of COVID-19, precautions were written into the design of the production using all CDC and local county school guidelines.

"Virtual Community Concerts," "Round Rock ISD Band Classic," "Virtual Movie Night" Pearson Ranch Middle School Band-Austin, TX

With the loss of live performances, contests, social gatherings, and more during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Pearson Ranch Middle School Band was determined to continue providing rewarding and exciting opportunities through band. With virtual

community concerts, a district wide performance contest for students, and virtual movie nights, the program did just that. With an intense time commitment from the program's directors walking in new territory regarding virtual concerts, driving to 30+ students' houses to deliver awards and yard signs, and figuring out how to make a movie night fun with 200+ kids at their homes, students were able to look at their band program as a safe and fun environment despite the uncertainty they were living in at the time.

PARENT/BOOSTER SUPPORT "TSLCA Booster Organization" Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts-Tarpon Springs, FL

Parents/Boosters are a crucial part to the success of the Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts and its students. In this program, the boosters fill an essential role in the day to day running of operations during its marching season and its concert/winter season. TSLCA's main objective for their advocacy initiative is to inspire their parents to become part of the TSLCA Booster organization with fundraising to chaperoning and everything else in between that makes a strong booster organization. These year-round efforts are the backbone of the program as parents and boosters can see the positive impact the program continues to have on their students.

STUDENT RECRUITMENT, ENGAGEMENT AND RETENTION "January Recruitment Folder" Rouse High School Band-Rouse, TX

Every January, all 8th grade band students who will be going to Rouse High School the following school year receive a folder in the mail full of well-designed and thought-out material for parents and students. Within these sleek and branded folders, parents and students find materials outlining the benefits of continuing their scholastic musical career into high school and what to expect by being a member of the Rouse High School Band. With the goal to increase the program's numbers by showing both the social-emotional and academic benefits that have been found to be correlated with students who continue to participate in their scholastic music program, the Rouse High School band has been able to increase their numbers to now having 130 students in the program.

FROM: GUIDING PRINCIPLES OF CONDUCTING

I believe that most of the music an ensemble performs should be well within their technical limitations. Just like the conductor, if players have to put out too much thought and energy in order to solve the technical obstacles, they won't have very much left for the music listening to each other, matching pitches, and watching the nuances coming from the podium.

Try conducting something that's extremely difficult. The players pay practically no attention to you, because they have too many problems of their own. But do a chorale, particularly if it is memorized, and immediately you'll feel them latch on to even the minor nuances of your conducting, allowing you to make the most music possible.

The main purpose of a band in an educational institution is to educate the students musically. Our job as music educators includes helping players to achieve more technical ability, but it certainly does not stop there. We teach technique to serve the music, so we can engage the students in heightened and deeper musical experiences. In my estimation, the goal is best achieved when the music is not too difficult.

At the same time, I firmly believe that there should be some music in the folder that stretches students technically, because we are responsible for the broad aspect of their musical education. But let's not get hung up on the idea that if a composition is very difficult, that alone makes it worth doing. Some of the easiest pieces are the most musically satisfying.




