

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



Music for All's programmatic model is designed to mirror, supplement, and extend the classroom and performance model adopted in most American scholastic settings.

Music for All provides ensemble experiences, hands-on opportunities for individual student performance training, and student and teacher growth and development.

Music for All is also committed to informing and empowering students, parents, and teachers to be engaged advocates for the arts and music education in their communities and across the nation.

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

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About the Music for All National Festival

PRESENTED BY ANAHA

Congratulations to the musicians of the 2023 Music for All National Festival, presented by Yamaha!

The Music for All National Festival, presented by Yamaha, is a national showcase of the finest in scholastic music. The Festival features high school and middle school ensembles and is comprised of the National Concert Band Festival, the Orchestra America National Festival, the National Choir Festival, the Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival, and the Chamber Music National Festival. The Festival also features national honor ensembles in 2023 — the Honor Band of America and Jazz Band of America.

The performing ensembles and honor ensemble members performing this week were selected through a recorded audition process. The listening panels included many of the most respected music educators in the country. Those selected were deemed to have achieved the highest level of musical performance and artistry.

The Festival premiered in 1992 with the debut of the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival, born from a dream to create and provide a national showcase for outstanding high school concert bands. This dream of Bands of America leadership was buoyed by the support of several icons in music education.

Dr. William D. Revelli, whose high school bands from Hobart, IN, won the National Band Contest of the 1920s and 30s several times, told stories about the positive impact on music education and how a national stage could bring together America's finest. John P. Paynter, the revered Director of Bands at Northwestern University, hosted the first two National Concert Band Festivals and was instrumental in the planning and design of the non-competitive festival. Many other leading conductors and educators were part of the creation and early years of the festival and continue today to share their wealth of musical knowledge with the performing ensembles.

The Festival for concert bands now includes two stages of experiences for high school bands, plus a stage featuring middle school concert bands.

The Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival provides a national forum for performance and recognition of America's outstanding concert percussion ensembles. Ensemble members perform and participate in the full festival experience. The festival is endorsed by the Percussive Arts Society and honors the legacy of the late Sandy Feldstein, former Music for All board member and a significant force in percussion education.

The Orchestra America National Festival launched in 2003, in cooperation with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, providing a significant and unique relationship. With

the Orchestra America National Festival, Music for All provides a national showcase and educational opportunity — and a positively life-changing experience — for string players and orchestras, including through the Honor Orchestra of America.

The Chamber Music National Festival is presented with the support of our National Presenting Sponsor, Yamaha Corporation of America, and features outstanding chamber ensembles from three to 16 members.

The Music for All National Festival provides a positive atmosphere that celebrates music-making. All ensembles participate in scheduled audience time, ensuring a sizeable and knowledgeable audience for the concerts. Each ensemble receives written and recorded evaluation from a panel of renowned educators and conductors, and a post-concert clinic. Students also participate in instrumental master classes with world-class musicians and special events.

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

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The Status of Music Education in Public Schools

The Arts Education Data Project (AEDP), spearheaded by Bob Morrison, CEO of Quadrant Research, in partnership with the State Education Agency Directors of Arts Education (SEADAE), has provided the first-ever look at the status and condition of arts education in the U.S. using actual student participation data reported by school districts to their state education departments. On September 12, 2022, AEDP released the National Arts Education Status Report 2019 as a comprehensive look at access to and participation in arts education in the United States.

Many will find some of this data to be surprising, but it serves to amplify the call that educators, parents, decision–makers at every level, community members at large, and certainly the students themselves, must continue to insist that "a well–rounded education that includes music and the arts—as defined in the Every Student Succeeds Act—should be made available to every child in every U.S. public school."

The AEDP looked at data reported by school districts in 2019 and found that while 92% of public school students do have access to music education, more than 3.6 million students do not. Over 2 million students do not have access to any arts education (dance, music, theater or visual arts).

The study also noted that a disproportionate number of these students without access to arts education are concentrated in major urban or very rural areas where the majority of students are Black, Hispanic or Native American and at schools with the highest percentage of students eligible for free/reduced-price meals.

The report took information from 30,633 schools in 7,015 districts from 17 states. These states' 18 million students represent 36% of the total U.S. public school student population during the 2018–2019 school year. Taking the data collected along with numbers from the National Center for Education Statistics, the report was able to project the number of students and public schools across the United States that do not have access to music or the arts.

MUSIC EDUCATION IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Findings about music education in public schools from the report include:

- 92% of all students have access to music education during the school day.
- **49%** of all students **participate in music education** during the school day.
- 8% of all students have no access to music education during the school day.
- Music education is available from elementary through high school, with the **highest participation in elementary schools** because many states require participation at this level.



ARTS EDUCATION IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

When looking at access to arts education, the report found:

- 96% of all students have access to arts education during the school day.
- **67%** of all students **participate in arts education** during the school day.
- 4% of all students have no access to arts education during the school day.

SPREADING THE WORD

The report was released just prior to the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) Music Education Advocacy Hill Day in mid-September 2022, so members and advocates of arts education, as well as industry representatives, could share this data as they traveled to Washington, D.C., to talk to members of Congress and their aides about the need to support music and arts education.

Music and arts educators are encouraged to participate in the Arts Education Data Project (Yamaha.io/AEDPProject) and to work with their administration and district leaders to ensure that they apply for available Title I and Title IV Part A funds to support and expand music and arts programs.



As a Title 1 School, their music events are free and open to the public as a way of building community which has resulted in a historic standing-room-only capacity audience for this event. While this event is presented by the music department, collaboration with other areas in the school is what made the event so grand.

INNOVATIVE FUNDRAISING "MCHS Band Chicken Fundraiser"

Montgomery Central High School Band Cunningham, TN

With a goal of raising \$21,000 for new uniforms, the Montgomery Central High School Band held the "MCHS Band Chicken Fundraiser." Focused on their small, rural community in Cunningham, Tennessee, students were asked to pre-sell smoked whole chickens and tickets for a one-day event. Supporters were able to come to the event and picked up their chickens and could also purchase other items such as side dishes and desserts by donation, with customers donating whatever they felt appropriate. With support from parents and booster in planning the event and smoking the chickens, and assistance from students in selling chickens and tickets and helping bag them on the day of the event, the band was able to purchase their new uniforms.

PANDEMIC PERSEVERANCE "The Hamilton Project"

Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts Tarpon Springs, FL

The Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts (TSLCA), as with all other performing arts programs in the nation, was greatly impacted during the COVID-19 pandemic and cancellations of events for the safety of their students and their families. "The Hamilton Project" was an advocacy initiative created as an outdoor, on-field production which lasted 40 minutes with two acts, inspired by the Broadway musical. With performances two to three times a week over three months, "The Hamilton Project" gave students the opportunity to perform safely and involve their community by sharing their talents through this production. Being in the midst of COVID-19, precautions were written into the design of the production using all CDC and local county school guidelines.

"Virtual Community Concerts," "Round Rock ISD Band Classic," "Virtual Movie Night"

Pearson Ranch Middle School Band Austin, TX

With the loss of live performances, contests, social gatherings, and more during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Pearson Ranch Middle School Band was determined to continue providing rewarding and exciting opportunities through band. With virtual community concerts, a district wide performance contest for students, and virtual movie nights, the program did just that. With an intense time commitment from the program's directors walking in new territory regarding virtual concerts, driving to 30+ students' houses to deliver awards and yard signs, and figuring out how to make a movie night fun with 200+ kids at their homes, students were able to look at their band program as a safe and fun environment despite the uncertainty they were living in at the time.

PARENT/BOOSTER SUPPORT "TSLCA Booster Organization"

Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts Tarpon Springs, FL

Parents/Boosters are a crucial part to the success of the Tarpon Springs Leadership Conservatory for the Arts and its students. In this program, the boosters fill an essential role in the day to day running of operations during its marching season and its concert/winter season. TSLCA's main objective for their advocacy initiative is to inspire their parents to become part of the TSLCA Booster organization with fundraising to chaperoning and everything else in between that makes a strong booster organization. These year-round efforts are the backbone of the program as parents and boosters can see the positive impact the program continues to have on their students.

STUDENT RECRUITMENT, ENGAGEMENT AND RETENTION "January Recruitment Folder"

Rouse High School Band Rouse, TX

Every January, all 8th grade band students who will be going to Rouse High School the following school year receive a folder in the mail full of well-designed and thought-out material for parents and students. Within these sleek and branded folders, parents and students find materials outlining the benefits of continuing their scholastic musical career into high school and what to expect by being a member of the Rouse High School Band. With the goal to increase the program's numbers by showing both the social-emotional and academic benefits that have been found to be correlated with students who continue to participate in their scholastic music program, the Rouse High School band has been able to increase their numbers to now having 130 students in the program.

Remembering Gary Markham 1947-2022

Gary Markham, whose influence and educational insights helped shape Bands of America (BOA) and Music for All (MFA), died in Dallas, Georgia on July 11, 2022. Born Jan. 27, 1947, he was a dedicated professional, mentor, and dear friend to all who were in his life.

Gary is a member of Music for All's Bands of America Hall of Fame. As the Chief Judge of Bands of America, he was a dedicated mentor to adjudicators and instrumental in the development and refinement of the Bands of America adjudication system and others, including for Drum Corps International (DCI).

Gary was Music for All's Senior Educational Consultant and coordinator of the Director Academy at the Music for All Summer Symposium. His guidance and leadership contributed to the continued development of the Music for All Summer Symposium and Music for All's educational programs.

Gary devoted his professional life to music and the marching arts. A natural-born talent, he was inspired early in life by his Sicilian immigrant grandfather, Francesco Alfredo Giovanni Amoroso (Alfred Love), whose Love's Band Chicago toured the US in the 1920s. Gary started out playing the French horn at Montgomery Area High School and went on to become an accomplished musician, earning a bachelor of science in music education at Mansfield University in 1968. He received his master's degree in music education from Penn State University in 1976, and his Ph.D. (ABD) in music administration from George Mason University in 1998.

Gary's light shined through every experience of his life and his work. He took his first career assignment as Band Director at South Williamsport Area High School and, from there, went to lead the instrumental music program at Williamsport High School, guiding the Marching Millionaire Band to award-winning status. His 45-year career as a progressive music educator in Pennsylvania, Georgia (Newnan H.S. and Cobb County School District), and Fairfax County, Virginia (Robinson H.S.), culminated with his retirement in 2013 as the Supervisor of Instrumental Music at Cobb County School District in Georgia.

Gary worked internationally as a clinician, guest conductor, adjudicator, and consultant. In addition to Music for All and Bands of America, Gary was a longtime contributor and leader to several organizations with music-driven missions, including DCI, the Midwest Clinic, and several Metro Atlanta Arts Boards.

Gary's work with BOA since the 1970s and through the transition to Music for All helped set the standards for adjudication and competitive attributes of marching band competitions throughout the United States. His engagement with Drum Corps International (DCI) also spanned over four decades, joining the staff of the Blue Devils in the mid-1970s and later with Spirit of Atlanta as a music arranger and program coordinator. He became a judge for DCI in 1980 and ultimately was named Education Advisor for DCI's Rules and Systems Task Force. He continued to judge and participate



in activities with Music for All and DCI throughout 2021.

Gary was honored with a number of prestigious awards over the course of his career, including the Sudler Order of Merit from the

John Philip Sousa Foundation (1992), Music For All Hall of Fame (2006), Georgia Music Educators Administrative Leadership Award (2006), DCI and Coltrin & Associates Excellence in Music Education Award (2007), Music Educators' National Conference Excellence in Marching Music Education (2009), Conn-Selmer Institute Hall of Fame (2015), Music for All President's Award (2021), and was inducted into Drum Corps International's Hall of Fame (2022).

Gary's long and accomplished career in music and the marching arts was driven by his passion for excellence. Influenced by the many students that he had the privilege to lead, he recognized and nurtured their potential. His mentorship of instructors, administrators, and adjudicators worldwide will form his legacy and carry on his commitment to collaborative and effective leadership practices in education and adjudication.

One of the most respected and sought-after jazz composers and educators in the industry, he is director of the Grammy-nominated One O'Clock Lab Band at the University of North Texas. He previously served 20 years as Chief Arranger for the USAF Airmen of Note in Washington, D.C. The Alan Baylock Jazz Orchestra recorded three critically-acclaimed CDs and performed throughout the United States for 15 years. Mr.

Baylock graduated from Shenandoah University (B.M. '90, where he later became Jazz Composer-in-Residence,) and the University of North Texas (M.M. '94).

Mr. Baylock travels extensively as guest conductor and clinician, and has been featured with close to 100 professional, collegiate, high school (all-state and regional), and middle school jazz ensembles. He is on faculty at the National Jazz Workshop (NJW) and directed the NJW All-Star Big Band in performances on the East and West Coast. He is an active member of the Jazz Education Network and is a strong advocate for women in jazz. In 2022, he teamed up with composer/arranger Annie Booth to establish Brava Jazz Publishing, whose mission is to support and champion women composers and arrangers in the field of big band jazz by creating a platform for their music to be widely published and distributed.

Mr. Baylock lives in Denton, Texas with his wife, cellist Maria Baylock. In his spare time, he enjoys playing table tennis, and golfing with his UNT Jazz colleagues.

Maintaining an active schedule as a guest conductor, conducting teacher, and guest lecturer throughout the United States and Canada, Dr. Thompson has had the privilege of teaching conducting to thousands of undergraduates, graduate students, and professional educators. She is especially proud of her 57 graduate conducting students and the hundreds of outstanding Symphonic Wind Ensemble members with whom she has had the joy of making music at Northwestern. She treasures her relationship with the Wildcat Marching Band and is honored to preserve and grow Northwestern's legacy.

Moon is based on the Chinese mythological mid-autumn festival story of Chang'e and her husband Houyi, who was a famous archer. It is a tonal solo which has simple themes that are embellished as the piece progresses, building up to an emphatic climax in the middle with parallel octaves before whittling down to a quiet and poignant end.

On October 15th, 2022, thousands gathered at The Dome at America's Center in St. Louis, Missouri to witness the marching band performances at the Bands of America St. Louis Super Regional Championship, presented by Yamaha. Kaye Harrelson, Performing Arts Curriculum Specialist at St. Louis Public Schools, appreciated the introspective style of Loyde's presentation. Her biggest takeaway from the presentation was the "great value in teachers owning what the visual/audio experience is, or should be, in their

Similarly, Carolyn Kramkowski, instrumental music teacher at Shaw Visual and Performing Arts Elementary, felt empowered and equipped with the necessary tools to advocate for her programs at the district level.

Since 2011, she has served as Guest Conductor in Residence at Diamond Bar High School in California. The school's Symphony Orchestra has won national accolades at events such as the 2019 National Orchestra Cup in New York City, 2018 Sonoma Music Festival in Sonoma, California, and 2017 ASTA Orchestra Festival in Pittsburgh. Dr. Ahn is a frequent evaluator and clinician for all-state orchestra festivals, chamber music festivals, and the Music for All National Festival. She has served as Assistant Conductor of the Music for All Honor Orchestra of America since 2012.

He previously served 20 years as Chief Arranger for the USAF Airmen of Note in Washington, D.C. The Alan Baylock Jazz Orchestra recorded three critically-acclaimed CDs and performed throughout the United States for 15 years. Mr. Baylock graduated from Shenandoah University (B.M. '90, where he later became Jazz Composer-in-Residence,) and the University of North Texas (M.M. '94).

Mr. Baylock travels extensively as quest conductor and clinician, and has been featured with close to 100 professional, collegiate, high school (all-state and regional), and middle school jazz ensembles. He is on faculty at the National Jazz Workshop (NJW) and directed the NJW All-Star Big Band in performances on the East and West Coast. He is an active member of the Jazz Education Network and is a strong advocate

for women in jazz. In 2022, he teamed up with composer/arranger Annie Booth to establish Brava Jazz Publishing, whose mission is to support and champion women composers and arrangers in the field of big band jazz by creating a platform for their music to be widely published and distributed.

Mr. Baylock lives in Denton, Texas with his wife, cellist Maria Baylock. In his spare time, he enjoys playing table tennis, and golfing with his UNT Jazz colleagues.

Brian Blocker has been a music educator in Indiana for nineteen years. Mr. Blocker earned his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Butler University's Jordan College of the Arts. An avid supporter of music education, Mr. Bodony serves as an educational consultant for Music for All and as a festival coordinator for Music for All's Orchestra America National Festival.

His previous posts include Associate Conductor of the Missouri Symphony Orchestra's Hot Summer Nights Music Festival (2013–2015), Artistic Director of the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra (2014–2016), and Cover Conductor and Pre-Concert Lecturer for the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra (2014–2015). He also worked with the Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra, Bohuslav Martinů Philharmonic Orchestra (Czech Republic), as well as high school, college, and community ensembles throughout the world.

Mr. Bodony earned a bachelor's degree in both religious studies and trombone performance from DePauw University in 2008. In 2013, Mr. Bodony was honored with the Beckmann Emerging Artist Award, given by the Arts Council of Indianapolis to a young professional with exceptional talent and promise in a given field.

Scott Boerma is the Director of Bands at Western Michigan University. Previously, he was Associate Director of Bands at the University of Michigan and Director of Bands at Eastern Michigan University, Mr. Boerma earned his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in wind conducting at Michigan State University and his Master of Music degree in music education at the University of Michigan, where he also studied composition with William Bolcom. He received his Bachelor of Music degree in music education from Western Michigan University.

Mr. Boerma is an elected member of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association. He is active as a conductor, adjudicator, and clinician, also serving as a quest conductor for several honor bands and community bands throughout the nation. He often conducts the Detroit Chamber Winds Brass holiday concerts.

His concert band works have been performed by many outstanding ensembles, including "The President's Own" Marine Band, the Dallas Wind Symphony, the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra, and the Music for All Honor Band of America. His works have been featured in the GIA series,

Mr. Boerma receives yearly commissions to write music for university and high school marching bands and drum and bugle corps. He has also written arrangements for the Boston Pops and the Detroit Chamber Winds Brass.

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JON BUBBETT

Jon Bubbett is a native of Dothan, Alabama. He attended Dothan High School, graduating in 1977. He also attended Troy State University, graduating with a Bachelor of Music Education in 1981, and received a Master of Music Education from VanderCook College of Music in Chicago,

Mr. Bubbett retired from full-time teaching after 38 years. The last 26 were spent teaching at Thompson High School in Alabaster, Alabama. He is a six-time recipient of the NBA Citation of Excellence Award and the Phi Beta Mu, Rho Chapter 2015 "Bandmaster of the Year" Award. He remains active as a clinician, composer, and adjudicator.

As a teacher, he has been hailed as a "Talent Whisperer." As Associate Professor of Trumpet at Arizona State University, his dynamic studio comprehensively prepares students for the demands of today's music world, focusing on Artistic Development, Versatility, Entrepreneurship, and Career Growth. Every Monday morning, Burgstaller live-broadcasts his Trumpet Warmup Show to an audience that spans over thirty countries, combining warmup, routine, fundamentals, and pedagogy in a format best described as a "Trumpet Talk Show."

Joe's discography includes hit classical solo CDs (License to Thrill and The Virtuoso Trumpet) and three Top-10 Billboard hits with Canadian Brass and his crossover CDs (Bach's Secret Files and Mozart's Blue Dreams) were Top-50 on JazzRadio charts and the Roots Radio Report.

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






















































KENNETH CAPSHAW

He taught high school, middle school, and elementary students in suburban, urban, and rural settings over the course of his career.

In addition to his role with Music for All, Mr. Casagrande is a consultant with MusicFirst software and an administrator for the Dr. William P. Foster Project. He is a Past-President of the National Band Association and served as a member of the Executive Committee for eight years. He has been nominated and inducted into the American Bandmasters Association, Phi Beta Mu, and the American School Band Directors Association. He received 22 Citation of Excellence Awards from the National Band Association and was recognized by former President Barack Obama, the U.S. Senate, the U.S. House of Representatives, the Illinois Senate, School District 214, Plainfield High School, Stephen Decatur High School, and John Hersey High School.

Under Mr. Casagrande's direction, the John Hersey Symphonic Band and Jazz Ensemble have performed as featured ensembles at The Midwest Clinic. He prepared the band for centenary performances of Leonard Bernstein's Mass with Gustavo Dudamel and the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

Dr. Cross taught five years at Virginia Tech and four years at Edina (Minnesota) High School. He earned Doctor and Master of Music degrees in conducting from Northwestern University and a Bachelor of Music degree cum laude in vocal and instrumental music education from St. Olaf College. His principal teachers were Mallory Thompson and Timothy Mahr.

He wrote a chapter for volume four of Composers on Composing for Band and contributed to The Horizon Leans Forward: Stories of Courage, Strength, and Triumph of Underrepresented Communities in the Wind Band Field and The Future of the Wind Band: Philosopher and Practitioner in Dialogue, all available from GIA Publications. His more than 20 original compositions and arrangements are published by Boosey & Hawkes, Daehn Publications/C.L. Barnhouse, and Theodore Music. He has appeared as a guest conductor, composer, and clinician throughout the world; as featured band clinician at the Texas Music Educators Association Clinic/Convention; and at the Music for All National Festival and The Midwest Clinic.

Dr. Cross is a member of the Council of Korean Americans and a Yamaha Master Educator.

Douglas Droste is Director of Orchestral Studies at Baldwin Wallace University Conservatory of Music, where he conducts the Baldwin Wallace Symphony Orchestra and teaches conducting. An advocate of music education, Mr. Droste is active as a clinician and adjudicator, including Festival Disney, ASTA's National Orchestra Festival, and the Music for All National Festival. He has conducted numerous all-state orchestras, as well as the Honors Performance Series at Carnegie Hall and Sydney Opera House, Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute, French Woods Festival of the Performing Arts, and an upcoming engagement with the Music for All Honor Orchestra of America. Mr. Droste is a Yamaha Artist and Master Educator.

RICHARD L. FLOYD

Texas State Director of Music Emeritus Richard Floyd is in his 60th year of active involvement as a conductor, music educator, and administrator. He has enjoyed a distinguished career at virtually every level of wind band performance and music education.

Mr. Floyd is a recognized authority on conducting, the art of wind band rehearsing, concert band repertoire, and music advocacy. The Austin Symphonic Band, under his leadership, performed at The Midwest Clinic on three occasions.

In 2002, he received the prestigious A.A. Harding Award presented by the American School Band Directors Association. The Texas Bandmasters Association named him Texas Bandmaster of the Year in 2006, and in 2009 he was presented the Texas Music Educators Association Distinguished Service Award. In 2011, he was inducted into the Music for All Hall of Fame and awarded The Midwest International Clinic Medal of Honor for his distinguished and unique contributions to educational bands and orchestras. Most recently, he was inducted into the National Band Association Academy of Wind and Percussion Arts, and Phi Beta Mu International Band Fraternity

honored him with the Outstanding Contributor Award.

In 2021, the College Band Directors National Association established the Richard Floyd CBDNA Distinguished Service Award in recognition of his decades of service to the organization.

He is a Yamaha Master Educator and author of the critically acclaimed book The Artistry of Teaching and Making Music, published by GIA Publications. His latest book, The Seven Deadly Sins of Music Making, was released in August 2020.



ADAM FREY

Adam Frey travels the globe sharing his talents as a performer and advocate for live music. Dr. Frey is Associate Professor at the University of North Georgia. His website, www.euphonium.com, contains sound files, performance schedules, photos, and his recordings and publications.

He is a Yamaha Performing Artist and Guest Clinician.



WILLIAM GALVIN

William Galvin is the former Director of Instrumental Studies and Music Department Chair for the Trinity Area School District. A native of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, he received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Morehead (KY) State University and Master of Music Education degree from Duquesne University. Mr. Galvin has been awarded the National Band Association's Citation of Excellence and the Citation of Excellence presented by the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association. During his tenure at Trinity High School, Mr. Galvin's ensembles earned 28 Superior Ratings and eight consecutive Pennsylvania Interscholastic Marching Band Association Class Championships. His ensembles performed for five Pennsylvania Music Educators Association (PMEA) State Conferences, one Music Educators National Conference Eastern Division Conference. and three Music for All National Festivals.

In his retirement, Mr. Galvin continues to be active as a consultant, speaker, and quest conductor.



ARRIS GOLDEN

Dr. Arris Golden is the Assistant Director of Bands and Associate Director of the Spartan Marching Band at Michigan State University. She teaches courses in conducting, marching band techniques, conducts the Spartan Youth Wind Symphony, is coordinator of the MSU Performing Arts Camps, and assists with all aspects of the athletic band program.

Dr. Golden had a distinguished 18-year teaching career in the public schools of North Carolina. In her last public school assignment, she conducted the premiere of four commissioned works that have become standards in the middle school band repertoire: "Kitsune: The Fox Spirits," by Brian Balmages (2009), "The Machine Awakes" for young band and electronics by Steven Bryant (2012), "Freight Train," by Pierre LaPlante (2013), and "The Cave You Fear" by Michael Markowski (2014).

Dr. Golden maintains an active schedule with engagements throughout the United States and internationally as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator. She has shared presentations at The Midwest Clinic, Michigan Music Conference, North Carolina Music Educators Conference, and Virginia Music Educators Conference based in her research interests: undergraduate music education preparation, conductor decision-making, repertoire selection and programming, and the student teaching and mentorship experience. LARRY GOOKIN

Yamaha Master Educator

Larry Gookin is Distinguished Professor and Emeritus Professor of Music at Central Washington University in Ellensburg, Washington. He served for 34 years as Director of Bands before retiring from CWU in 2015. Prior to teaching at Central, he taught band for 10 years in Montana and Oregon public schools.

During his tenure at Central, the CWU Wind Ensemble performed at the College Band Directors National Association Conferences in Boulder and Seattle, the Music Educators National Conference in Minneapolis, the Western International Band Clinics in Seattle, the Western/ Northwestern CBDNA Division Conferences in Reno, the Northwest Division NAfME conferences, and numerous WMEA State Conferences. He was president of the Northwestern Division of the CBDNA, and Vice President of the Washington Music Educators Association. He is a

member of the American Bandmasters Association and the WMEA Hall of Fame and received the University of Oregon's School of Music Distinguished Alumnus Award. He is former principal trombone of the Eugene and Yakima Symphony Orchestras and Emeritus Artistic Director and Conductor of the Seattle Wind Symphony.

He received an MM in Music Education from the University of Oregon School of Music in 1977 and a BM in Music Education and Trombone Performance from the University of Montana in 1971.

Professor Gookin has appeared as clinician, adjudicator, and conductor in the United States and abroad. He is a Yamaha Master Educator. He resides in Ellensburg, Washington with his wife Karen, Emeritus Professor of English at CWU and former piccolo/flutist with the Yakima Symphony Orchestra.



CARL GRAPENTINE

Carl Grapentine enjoyed a 46-year career in classical music radio. He was the host of the Morning Program on WFMT, Chicago's Classical music station, for 25 years. He joined WFMT in 1986 after serving as the morning host of WQRS, the classical music station in Detroit, for 13

Mr. Grapentine was the host for the very first National Concert Band Festival in Evanston, Illinois in 1992 and has been with Music for All ever since. He still presents pre-concert lectures for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and many other ensembles. He also hosts concerts for numerous community orchestras and bands.

An alumnus of the University of Michigan School of Music, Mr. Grapentine has been the "stadium voice" of the University of Michigan Marching Band since 1970 — his voice being heard on national telecasts of 16 Rose Bowls and numerous other bowl games. In 2006, he also

assumed the responsibilities of game announcer at Michigan Stadium.

An accomplished conductor and singer, Mr. Grapentine has many years of experience as a church music director. He has also sung the national anthem for professional and collegiate sporting events at Wrigley Field, old and new Comiskey Park (now Guaranteed Rate Field), Tiger Stadium, the Pontiac Silverdome, and the University of Michigan's Crisler Center.



GARY D. GREEN

Gary D. Green is Emeritus Professor of Music and Director of Bands at the Frost School of Music at the University of Miami. At the Frost School of Music, in addition to supervising all band activities, he was conductor of the Frost Wind Ensemble, supervised all graduate conducting students in the wind and percussion area, and served as Chairman of Instrumental Performance for 17 years.

Before Miami, he served for 10 years as Director of Bands at the University of Connecticut. While there, he was influential in commissioning and recording new works, including Symphony No. 3 by David Maslanka and A Cornfield in July and The River by William Penn.

During his tenure at the University of Miami, Professor Green continued the commissioning and performance of new repertoire for winds and percussion. Under his direction, the Frost Wind Ensemble performed on two separate occasions for the American Bandmasters Association convention and twice for the College Band Directors National Association convention.

Recent commissions and consortia from composers include William Penn, Joel Puckett, Mason Bates, Michael Daugherty, David Maslanka, Paul Dooley, Steve Danyew, Steven Bryant, David Gillingham, James Stephenson, Christopher Theofanidis, John Harbison, James Syler, Eric Whitacre, Frank Ticheli, Thomas Sleeper, and Kenneth Fuchs. Urban Requiem by Michael Colgrass was commissioned by the Abraham Frost Commission Series and has become a standard in repertoire for wind ensemble. Among other new compositions written for winds and percussion was the commission of Christopher Rouse's Wolf Rounds for the Frost Wind Ensemble.



JEFFREY GROGAN

Yamaha Master Educator

Jeffrey Grogan is an internationally acclaimed conductor and teacher. He is currently Director of Orchestral Activities at the Bass School of Music at Oklahoma City University and Artistic Director of the Oklahoma Youth Orchestras. Recent work includes conducting at the Musikverein in Vienna, Sydney Opera House, Harpa Concert Hall in Iceland, and in Bangkok and Singapore. He is a Yamaha Master Educator and serves on advisory committees for The Midwest Clinic and Music for All.

For several summers, he was invited by the LA Philharmonic to conduct alongside Gustavo Dudamel at Disney Hall, as part of the Youth Orchestras of Los Angeles National Festival. Following his passion for performing and helping to create new music for orchestras, he has collaborated with many composers and soloists. Mr. Grogan worked in studio and on several projects with violinist and composer Mark

O'Connor. He recorded Mr. O'Connor's March of the Gypsy Fiddler with the Ahn Trio and New Jersey Youth Symphony on OMAC Records, which is played on classical music radio throughout the country.

He previously served 11 seasons as Education and Community Engagement Conductor of the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, and as Conductor and Artistic Director of the NJSO Youth Orchestras, the InterSchool Orchestras of New York, and the New Jersey Youth Symphony. He was founding Artistic Director of two El Sistema inspired programs in New Jersey, CHAMPS and the Paterson Music Project. Mr. Grogan taught for over a decade at the University of Michigan, Ithaca College, and Baylor University.



ABBY YEAKLE HELD

Dr. Abby Yeakle Held serves as The Ohio State University's Oboe Lecturer. She was appointed in 2021 and teaches Applied Oboe, Studio, Reed-Making, and Chamber Music. Prior to joining the faculty at Ohio State, Dr. Held served as Adjunct Professor of Oboe at Stephen F. Austin State University (Nacogdoches, Texas).

Outside of The Ohio State University, Dr. Held serves as Associate Principal Oboe of the West Texas Symphony. She has also performed with orchestras across the country, including the Colorado Symphony Orchestra and the Castleton Festival Orchestra under the baton of Maestro Lorin Maazel. Dr. Held has performed internationally in Austria and Belgium, including a recital at the United States Embassy in Vienna, Austria.

As a Fulbright Scholar, Dr. Held studied the Viennese oboe and conducted research surrounding its history, traditions, current status, and cross-application to the French conservatory oboist. She is the first to publish research of this kind in English, making her one of the foremost

scholars on the Viennese oboe outside of the instrument's native community.

He is also a Licensed Massage Therapist in the State of Florida.

He is a former News Anchor and Traffic Expert for Spectrum Bay News 9 as part of "Your Morning News" 2010 to 2022.

Emmy Nominated (2014) for his television work in Tampa, Mr. Henson was named "Best Local Traffic Reporter" in the 2014 Creative Loafing Best of the Bay Reader Poll. He was featured in the 2011 Winter/Spring issue of "Pete" Magazine and was a participant in the 2010 "Tampa Bay's Dancing with the Stars" Charity Event hosted by Julie Weintraub's Hands Across the Bay. ROBERT T. HERRINGS, III

Robert Tyrome Herrings, III is in his 19th year of teaching and has been at Artie Henry Middle School in Leander ISD since 2004. At Henry Middle School, Mr. Herrings conducts the Honors Band and assists with the Symphonic Band and Concert Band. He also teaches beginning clarinet, horn, and trumpet. His bands have consistently received UIL Sweepstakes ratings, as well as unanimous first division ratings, Best in Class, and Overall Outstanding Band honors at festivals around the state. From 2009–2022, the program earned distinction as a National Wind Band Honors Class AA winner. From 1983 to 2002, he was a conductor in the University of Michigan All-State Program at Interlochen. He was Conductor of the Festival Orchestra at Idyllwild Arts from 1989 through 2019. He served as Vice President and Music Director of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, where he was also Conductor of the Symphony Orchestra and, subsequently, became Dean of the Shepherd School of Music and Elma Schneider Professor at Rice University in Houston. From 1986 until 2002, Mr. Livingston was Dean of the USC Flora L. Thornton School of Music.



ANTHONY MAIELLO

Anthony J. Maiello conducts music festivals, adjudicates ensembles, and presents clinics, lectures, and workshops throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, the Bahamas, and Europe. He conducted musical activities for the Gold Medal Ceremonies at the 1980 Winter Olympics in Lake Placid, New York. He was appointed an Honorary Conductor of The United States Navy Band and was a participant in the National Conducting Institute with Leonard Slatkin and the National Symphony Orchestra in Washington, D.C. Prior to his current position, Mr. Lack was the Director of Instrumental Music at Clovis West High School from 2007 to 2017. Under his direction, the Wind Symphony was invited to perform at the Music for All National Concert Band

Festival in 2010 and the Clovis West Marching Band was a 16-time Bands of America Regional Finalist, 11-time Class AAA Champion, 2-Time Regional Champion, and a 2016 Grand National Semifinalist.

In early 2014, Mr. Lack was selected as a Clovis Unified School District Crystal Award Winner recognizing exceptional district employees. He was one of only 36 winners selected from close to 5,000 employees. Clovis West High School recognized him as Visual and Performing Arts Teacher of the Year for the 2012-2013 school year.

Mr. Lack graduated from Whitworth University with a Bachelor of Arts in Music Education and completed his master's degree in Conducting from American Band College of Southern Oregon University in 2005. He currently resides in the Fresno area with his wife Nicole, an elementary school vice–principal; his children Joanna, Christopher, and Salvador; and their dog Buddy.

Music at the Buchanan Educational Center

The Buchanan Educational Center Instrumental Music Program was founded in 1991 and serves 425 student musicians of Buchanan High School and Alta Sierra Intermediate in Clovis, California. The program strives to provide outstanding experiences in Band, Colorguard, Jazz, Orchestra, and Percussion. The Buchanan programs are known for excellence and consistently achieve superior ratings at festival. The Wind Symphony has performed at the Music for All National Festival, the Marching Band was a 2017, 2018 and 2022 Bands of America Regional Finalist, and the Orchestra is a 2023 Orchestra America National Festival Invited Ensemble.

The orchestra program is comprised of four string orchestras and symphony orchestra with 140 students participating, grades 7–12. Under the expert guidance

of founding director Mrs. Heidi Franklin, the string ensembles of Buchanan and Alta Sierra consistently received superior ratings at festival throughout the history of the program. After Mrs. Franklin's retirement in 2017, Mr. Lack assumed leadership of the program and has continued the Buchanan Educational Center Orchestra Program's strong tradition of excellence. The Buchanan Chamber Orchestra is deeply appreciative of the Buchanan Administrative Team and Clovis Unified School District for the tremendous support of our music program.

About the Band Program

The Central Junior High Band has a history of excellence. well-rounded academic and social experience, encouraging participation in an expansive activities program, including the performing arts.


Music at Chantilly

Music at Victor J. Andrew High School

The music department at Victor J. Andrew High School supports two wind ensembles, the Symphonic Band and Wind Symphony, as well as Percussion Ensemble. The Symphonic Band rehearses in two separate class periods, woodwinds and brass. The ensemble comes together during T-Bolt Time and after school rehearsals. Co-curricular ensembles include jazz band, pit orchestra, winter color guard and winter percussion ensemble. The Marching Thunderbolts are annually decorated in the state of Illinois as state finalists and class champions at Chicago area competitions. The Marching Thunderbolts are six time Bands of America Regional Finalists. The band placed second in class 5A at the Illinois State Championships in 2015, 2016, 2017, 2019, 2021, and 2022, advancing to finals each of those years. The band was 5th place overall in finals in 2019 and 2021 and 8th in 2022.

The Wind Symphony is a nationally respected ensemble with performances at the Illinois SuperState Concert Band Festival, the Midwest Music Festival, Chicagoland Concert Band

Festival, Illinois Music Education Conference, and the Music for All National Festival on the Featured Stage in 2017 and the Invited Stage in 2020 and 2023. The Wind Symphony was the winner of the 2015, 2019, and 2022 Midwest Music Festival. In 2018, 2019, and 2022, the ensemble was awarded with the Mark of Excellence Prize for Wind Band Honors in class 5A.

The mission of the Victor J. Andrew Music program is to promote and facilitate musical excellence in our ensembles, rehearsals and performances. The program works to establish a safe and encouraging learning environment, develop musicianship, and improve music literacy. The program develops a relationship between art and the everyday so that students leave the program with a critical sense of purpose, and a life-long infectious passion for music.

Music at Carl Sandburg High School

The band program at Carl Sandburg High School is home to a variety of ensembles including three concert bands, three jazz bands, two percussion classes, pep band, pit orchestra, competitive and non-competitive marching band and Symphony Orchestra. Students in Sandburg's band program each year perform in four concert band concerts, two full jazz concerts, percussion ensemble concert, and several area contests and festivals, including all band students performing in

solo and ensemble festival. Recent notable performances for the band program include appearances at the University of Illinois Superstate Festival, the Illinois Music Educators All-State Conference, the Jazz Showcase in Chicago, Illini Marching Band Championships, and as the pep band for Northwestern University men's basketball. The Sandburg Bands have recently completed performance tours to San Francisco, Anaheim, Hawaii, and Orlando.

About the Ensemble

The Incendio Saxophone Trio is made up of students from the Consolidated High School District 230 band programs from Victor J. Andrew High School in Tinley Park, and Carl Sandburg High School in Orland Park, Illinois. These communities are located in the south suburbs of Chicago. The performers in the trio are all students of Bryan Polacek. The group formed during the 2020–2021 school year under a different name and with Andrew senior, Evan Stanton, class of 2021 (baritone saxophone) as an opportunity for a small group to perform in an educational environment under Covid mitigations. The ensemble enjoyed a high level of success in virtual chamber music competitions during the year and decided to keep going into the next year. During the 2021–22 school year, Emma Phillips joined the group from Carl Sandburg High School

and the group began their journey towards a high level of musical achievement. They were silver medalists in the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition, placed first in the 2022 Chicago Chamber Music Competition, won second prize at the 2022 Rembrandt Chamber competition and were finalists at the Coltman Chamber Music Competition. They were named 2022 Rembrandt Young Artists and have been featured on 98.7 WFMT, Chicago's Classical Music Station. Music at Creekside Park

Creekside Park Junior High in Tomball ISD opened in 2016 and is located in The Woodlands, Texas. The principal of Creekside Park Junior High is Mr. John Vaglienty. Under the leadership of Fine Arts Director JD Janda, fine arts is a top priority in Tomball ISD. The district supplies students with high-quality wind and percussion instruments and state-of-the-art instructional and performance facilities. In addition to their involvement in band activities, Creekside Park Band students are also active in other activities, including National Junior Honor Society, Student Council, Leadership, Yearbook/Journalism, Athletics, Art, Cheerleading, Dance Team, Theater, and many more. The Creekside Park Band benefits from high levels of parental and community support. Through the dedicated work of many individuals, the program has built a tradition of success that has flourished within the school and in the community.

The Cuthbertson High School program has performed at the North Carolina Music Educator's Convention twice and presented professional development clinics at the state convention on two separate occasions as well. The Cuthbertson band has performed as a guest ensemble at the University of Georgia "JanFest," University of South Carolina Honors Band Clinic on two separate occasions, The Music for All Southeastern Regional two separate occasions, and twice as a Featured Ensemble at the Music for All National Festival. The CHS band was featured at the North

Carolina Honors Band Concert in 2017, and is a 6-year recipient of the NAMM Best Communities for Music Education Support Music Merit award.

In the fall of 2015 the band was awarded a residency with the John Lennon Educational Tour Bus. The music video which was created, performed, and produced by the Cuthbertson band students during this residency can be seen on the John Lennon Tour Bus website, the NAMM website, and YouTube. The Cuthbertson Band Program is also the recipient of the National Band Associations, Blue Ribbon of Excellence award for the Southeastern Division in 2014–2015 school year. Most recently in the fall of 2019 the Cuthbertson band program was awarded the Mark of Excellence Commended Award from the Foundation for Music Education.

The Fayetteville Marching Band is a 3-time 7A State Marching Bronze Medalist and a BOA Regional Finalist. The band has also performed for the Tournament of Roses Parade, Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, and the Walt Disney World Parade.

Some of his principal Suzuki trainers include Sandy Reuning from Ithaca Talent Education, and Ed Krietman. He taught orchestra for three years in Binghamton, New York, and performed with the BC Pops Orchestra, Binghamton Symphony

and Catskill Symphony Orchestras. After moving to Florida in 1993, Mr. Bossert taught orchestra/strings for the Hillsborough County school district. During this time, he co-wrote the el-ementary string curriculum for Hillsborough County, and recently co-wrote the high school orches-tra curriculum for the district. Mr. Bossert contributed to the 4th edition of "Teaching Music through Performance in Orchestra." His contributions included "Incantations" by Richard Meyer, and "Troika" by Prokofiev, arranged by Lavender.

Mr. Bossert has taught all levels from kindergarten through high school. He has been the orchestra director at H.B. Plant High School in Tampa since 2001. Over his tenure, the orchestra program has grown from 12 string students in one orchestra to over 150 string students in five orchestras. In 2012 the Plant Chamber Orchestra was selected to perform for the President's Opening Concert at the FMEA All–State Conference in Tampa. In March of 2018 the Plant Philharmonic Orchestra was

selected to perform at the ASTA National Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, where they were a place winner in the full orchestra division. In March of 2020, the Plant orchestras were invited to per-form in the Isaac Stern Auditorium at Carnegie Hall in New York City, but the COVID-19 pandemic led to the cancellation of this event. In 2021, the chamber orchestra was a place winner in the WorldStrides Virtual Heritage Festival. Ms. Liccioni is also a recipient of the 2022 Hofius PTO Teacher Grant.

In addition to teaching, Ms. Liccioni is an active professional bassoonist, a member of the Woodlands

Symphony Orchestra and the Woodland Winds Quintet. The Woodland Winds have been invited to perform at the Texas Music Educators Association Convention and the Trinity Lutheran Chamber Music Series.

Ms. Liccioni earned her Bachelor of Music Education from Louisiana State University. About the School and Community

Klein is a farming community developed 35 miles northwest of Houston, Texas, after a group of German immigrants settled in 1845. The settlement was later named for Adam Klein, who left Germany in 1849 and joined the California gold rush before settling with his wife, Fredericka, in 1854. The community's rural character began to change in the mid-1960's when developers began transforming the countryside into a Houston suburb. Today, the district is served by five high schools, ten intermediate schools, and thirty-three elementary schools, and has a total of over 53,000 students.

Hofius Intermediate opened in 2018 as the tenth intermediate campus in Klein ISD. The campus serves 1,250 sixth, seventh and eighth grade students. Beginners are placed in homogenous instrument classes for their first full year of band instruction. In their second year the students are placed in a full ensemble setting.

Jennifer Wren and Paige Liccioni have served as the band directors since the opening of Hofius. In the short time Hofius has been open, the students have already created a Tradition of Excellence in the program. The Beginner Band has placed as the Runner-Up Best in Class at the Klein Music Festival and students participate in a Solo Contest each year. Advanced Bands have received consistent Sweepstakes awards at the UIL Concert and Sightreading Evaluation. Students have also earned spots in the Klein ISD District Band and Region IX Bands, as well as earning top ratings at Solo and Ensemble Contests. The Non-Varsity Band has earned Superior Ratings at local festivals as well as Runner-Up Best in Class distinctions. The Symphonic Band was named Grand Champion of the Gator Music Festival as well as earning Superior ratings. The Symphonic Band was named a Commended Winner by the National Wind Band Honors Project in 2021 and a National Winner in 2022.

In the fall of 2022, the Cain Percussion won the Aldine Drumline Contest, High Percussion at the US Bands Webster and Houston Finale contests, and were 4A Class champions at the Lone Star Preview Marching Contest. About High School

Klein Cain High School is the newest high school in the Klein ISD, having opened in the fall of 2017. The Klein ISD is located in the northwest suburbs of Houston and has a rich tradition of musical excellence and support for all fine arts programs.

The Cain Band Program has a total enrollment of 240 students and has already established a reputation of excellence in all areas. Mr. Huff directs the KHS Honor Band, KHS Jazz Ensemble, the Marching Blue Brigade, and teaches beginner classes. Mr. Huff is a member of the Association of Texas Small School Bands, Texas Music Educators Association, and Texas Music Adjudicators Association. Mr. Huff resides in Corinth, Texas with his wife Amy and two daughters, Grace and Katie, and their rescue dog Mason. In his free time, Mr. Huff considers himself to be a backyard Pit Master where he smokes a variety of meats and cheeses.

About the Band

The Krum Band began in 1991 with a partnership between the University of North Texas and Krum ISD. Dr. Roger Warner, former Dean of Music and Carol Turner, UNT Teaching Fellow, started the program with 50 students in 7th and 8th grade. In the 30 years since, the Krum Band has grown to over 300 students. The Krum Band is a seven-time finalist in the Texas Honor Band Contest including four consecutive runner-up placements. The Krum Band has had success in the UIL Solo & Ensemble Contest advancing as many as 101 students to the state contest. The Krum Band program offers a Jazz Band and routinely places 8-10 students in the Region Jazz Band. The Krum Band has two ensembles, Symphonic Winds and Honor Band, which allow students to be grouped by ability and focus on music that can best display their abilities while still developing the musical talent of each student. The Krum Marching Blue Brigade was formed in 2012, in the first season of KHS Varsity Football. Since then, the Krum Band has received only Superior Ratings at the UIL Marching Contest. The Blue Brigade was named grand champion at the Aubrey Marching Classic in 2016, 2017 and 2022. In 2019 the Blue Brigade was named grand champion at the Ponder Marching Contest. The Krum Band has earned multiple classification awards including the Class A Champion at the 2016 Broken Arrow Marching Band Invitational and Class A Champions at the 2018, 2019, and 2022 Bands of America DFW Regional.

About the School and Community

Krum (population 5,483) is a growing community in the DFW Metroplex, 10 minutes west of the University of North Texas in Denton, with a strong tradition of supporting the Arts. About the School Krum High School enrolls 690 students in grades 9–12. Of those students, there are approximately 100 students that are enrolled in band. Krum High School offers a comprehensive fine arts education offering Art Classes, Theater and Technical Theater, Choir, Show Choir, Concert Band, Marching Band, Jazz Band, Percussion Ensembles, Color Guard, and Winter Guard



Music at McNeil



MAS Concert Jazz Band performed with Gloria Estefan in CNN's *The Fourth in America* Special on July 2022.

James Coviak • Director



James Coviak earned his Bachelor of Music Education from Central Michigan University and his Master of Music from the University of Akron. He was Director of Percussion at North Farmington High School from 1989–1996. Performances of note include winner of the 1993 Percussive Arts Society International Percussion Ensemble Competition, and a showcase concert at the 1994 Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago. He commissioned "Normandy Beach 1944" by David Gillingham, and "Time Stream" by David

Maslanka. James was the cover story of School Band and Orchestra magazine in November, 2003, and he presented at Kettering University's TedX Flint.

James has recorded on 5 albums with the Robert Hohner Percussion Ensemble on the DMP label, including recordings at the Hit Factory and BMG Studio 1A. Mr. Coviak founded the first college steel band in Michigan at CMU in 1990, and the first two high school steel bands in Michigan at North Farmington and Mott Middle College High School in 1993. In addition, he founded the Boys and Girls Club of Flint Steel Band in 2013. James taught 19 years at Mott Community College and is in his 21st year of teaching percussion at the University of Michigan Flint. He is a freelance musician in Southeast Michigan, and the house drummer for the "Soothing Tunes Room" jazz club. In his free time James enjoys biking and hiking with his wife and two children in northern Michigan.

Music at Mott Middle College

The Mott Middle College Steel Band and Percussion Ensemble, also known as the "Steelheads", was founded in 1993 by James Coviak. The band has become deeply woven into the Greater Flint community, providing hundreds of concerts at a wide variety of events. Performances of note include winner of the 2000 Percussive Arts Society International Percussion Ensemble Competition, a showcase concert at "Journees de la Percussion" at the Paris Conservatoire, and a showcase concert at the Music Educators National Conference in Nashville. The band has appeared twice at the Music for All Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival in Indianapolis, and earned highest score at WorldStrides Heritage Festivals in Toronto, London,

New York, and Chicago. The group has performed at international jazz festivals in Montreux Switzerland, Nice France, Vienne France, and multiple times at the Detroit International Jazz Festival and the Syracuse Jazz Fest. The Steelheads won gold at the Virginia International PANfest, and the group has performed numerous times with steel pan legend Andy Narell, who named them one of the best high school steel bands in the nation. The steel band program is a proud recipient of the Michigan Association of School Boards "Michigan's Best" Education Excellence Award. The band has appeared on television over a dozen times on ABC, NBC, FOX, CW, and PBS in Canada.



She graduated from the University of New Mexico where she received a double bachelor's degree in violin performance and string pedagogy. Music at Union



About the High School and Ensemble

The Conservatory of the Arts at Valley Christian School encourages students to advance their artistic endeavors through the continued exploration and pushing of creative boundaries, all done in a welcoming and supportive environment. This equips our high school students with real–world skills and prepares them to pursue their future creative endeavors.

The Chamber Ensemble first began in 2006 when the conservatory program was inaugurated. It is the highest-level honors string ensemble in the school, is limited in size, and is open only to those who audition and can pass the stringent requirements. Former students have studied music as a major at renowned schools such as the Juilliard School, Manhattan School of Music, New England Conservatory, Harvard University, Princeton University, San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and others. Highlights in the past include a weeklong invitation to participate in Shanghai, China, per-forming, playing in masterclasses, and having lessons alongside students at the Shanghai Conservatory of Music. The ensemble has won the highest ratings (Gold) at the Music Heritage Festival in Honolulu and consistently has won "Unanimous Superior" ratings at the California Music Educators Association (CMEA) Competitions. The group won the first prize twice at the Santa Cruz Youth Chamber competition. Students are active musically at school functions and participate in many outside organizations such as summer festivals, Heifetz Institute at Mary Baldwin University, the Philadelphia International Music Festival, and the National Youth Orchestra (NYO2) winning both concertmaster and principal positions. Most group members also regularly play for the California Youth Symphony and San Jose Youth Symphonies. In 2018, the group was the only high school ensemble selected to perform and be coached by members of the Parker Strings (Harvard University guartet in residence) at San Jose State University.

It is a true honor and privilege for the VCHSCE to perform and participate for the first time at the 2023 Music for All Chamber Music National Festival.

About the Junior High School and Ensemble

The Conservatory of the Arts at Valley Christian School encourages students to advance their artistic endeavors through the continued exploration and pushing of creative boundaries, all done in a welcoming and supportive environment. This equips our Junior high school students with real–world skills and prepares them to pursue their future creative endeavors.

The Junior High Chamber Ensemble (Strings III) first began in 2021 as an opportunity for Junior High advanced string players to be given the same opportunity of playing the great chamber music literature that their high school counterparts currently enjoy. It is the highest-level honors string ensemble in the Junior High school, is limited in size, and is open only to those who audition and can pass the stringent requirements. All string players of the piano trio concurrently also play in the larger advanced strings orchestra class as principals. Students are active musically at formal school functions as the premier Junior High ensemble. Post-COVID, members also lead busy musical lives by participating extensively in many outside organizations and garnering awards. These include first prizes at the US Open Music Competition and top prizes with the International Music Competition and Enkor International Music Competition, the Heifetz Institute at Mary Baldwin University, and the Summer Music Institute at Tateuchi Hall. Recently the students were selected and performed with the California All-State Orchestra and Northern California Youth Symphonies. It is a true honor and privilege for the VCJHCE to perform and participate for the first time at the 2023 "Music for All Chamber Music Festival."

Festival, the Virginia Music Educators Association Conference, the Virginia Band & Orchestra Directors Association Clinic, the Kentucky Music Educators Association Conference, the Midwest Clinic, the International Tuba & Euphonium Conference, the International Trombone Festival, the College Band Directors National Association Conference, and the International Society for Research and Promotion of Wind Music International Conference. He is an active performer, clinician, guest conductor, and adjudicator both regionally and nationally. Kevin lives in Louisville, Kentucky, with his wife Kaitlin and their daughter Katherine.

Jason Gregory • Associate Director of Bands



Mr. Gregory currently serves as the Associate Director of Bands and the Director of Percussion Studies for the Youth Performing Arts School. He also serves as the Director of Athletic Bands for duPont Manual High School which includes a competitive marching band, basketball pep band, and the winter color guard training program. This is his 22nd year of teaching and 15th year at duPont Manual/YPAS. Under his leadership, the duPont Manual HS Marching Band has grown to over 75 members, is a consistent KMEA state semifinalist group in class

4A and 5A and was a Mid-State Championships finalist. His concert ensembles have performed at the KMEA conference, the Music for All/Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival, and the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic. In addition, the YPAS percussion ensemble won the large ensemble division of the Black Swamp HS Percussion Ensemble competition in 2016 (1st) and 2022 (2nd). Mr. Gregory is a graduate of the University of Louisville School of Music (BME 2001). He earned his Master's in Education from Indiana Wesleyan University (MED 2008). His professional affiliations include the Kentucky Music Educators Association, the Percussive Arts Society, the Jefferson County Teachers Association, and NAfME. Jason currently resides in Louisville, Kentucky, with his wife Nikki, his son Cole, and his daughter Hope.

About the School

As the most comprehensive performing arts high school in Kentucky, the faculty, staff, and administration of the Youth Performing Arts School (YPAS) have the distinct opportunity to train educate, and nurture today's young talent to become tomorrow's artists. Students team with faculty, parents, professional artists, and community members to develop, perfect, and practice their craft in artistic experiences. YPAS has enhanced the cultural and educational environment of Louisville and beyond with students attending universities and conservatories throughout the nation and becoming teachers, arts administrators, and performing artists.

Music at Youth Performing Arts School

The YPAS Instrumental Music Program includes the following course offerings: Music Theory I, AP Music Theory II, Applied Piano, Full Orchestra, Pit Orchestra, Intermediate Brass, Intermediate Woodwinds, Percussion Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Wind Ensemble, Jazz Improvisation, Jazz Ensemble, and Chamber Ensemble. The Intermediate band courses are non-performing skill development courses in which all freshmen students learn to perform the full range of their instrument in all major and minor keys. They perform approximately 200 rhythmic patterns at assigned metronomic markings and complete three to four method books.

The Symphonic Band and Wind Ensemble perform six concerts a year concentrating on collegiate and professional literature. A student enrolled in both ensembles will have the opportunity to perform around 36 band compositions. Students are required to perform a solo convocation performance each semester and to submit etude performances every six weeks to build a repertoire list of 24 etudes and 8 solos in preparation for college auditions.

The YPAS Bands perform in adjudicated national festivals annually, and their recent trips have taken them to the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Orchestra Hall (Chicago), the Tobin Performing Arts Center, the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic (Full Orchestra 2015 and Percussion Ensemble 2016), and the Music for All National Festival (2008, 2011, 2016, & 2023).
