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

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

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About the Music for All National Festival PRESENTED BY (*) YAMAHA

Congratulations to the musicians of the 2024 Music for All National Festival, presented by Yamaha!

The Music for All National Festival, presented by Yamaha, is a national showcase of the finest in scholastic music. The Festival features high school and middle school ensembles and is comprised of the National Concert Band Festival, the Orchestra America National Festival, the Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival, and the Chamber Music National Festival. The Festival also features national honor ensembles in 2024 – the Honor Band of America and Jazz Band of America.

The performing ensembles and honor ensemble members performing this week were selected through a recorded audition process. The listening panels included many of the most respected music educators in the country. Those selected were deemed to have achieved the highest level of musical performance and artistry.

The Festival premiered in 1992 with the debut of the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival, born from a dream to create and provide a national showcase for outstanding high school concert bands. This dream of Bands of America leadership was buoyed by the support of several icons in music education.

Dr. William D. Revelli, whose high school bands from Hobart, IN, won the National Band Contest of the 1920s and 30s several times, told stories about the positive impact on music education and how a national stage could bring together America's finest. John P. Paynter, the revered Director of Bands at Northwestern University, hosted the first two National Concert Band Festivals and was instrumental in the planning and design of the non-competitive festival. Many other leading conductors and educators were part of the creation and early years of the festival and continue today to share their wealth of musical knowledge with the performing ensembles.

The Festival for concert bands now includes two stages of experiences for high school bands, plus a stage featuring middle school concert bands.

The Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival provides a national forum for performance and recognition of America's outstanding concert percussion ensembles. Ensemble members perform and participate in the full festival experience. The festival is endorsed by the Percussive Arts Society and honors the legacy of the late Sandy Feldstein, former Music for All board member and a significant force in percussion education.

The Orchestra America National Festival launched in 2003, in cooperation with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, providing a significant and unique relationship. With

the Orchestra America National Festival, Music for All provides a national showcase and educational opportunity — and a positively life-changing experience — for string players and orchestras, including through the Honor Orchestra of America.

The Chamber Music National Festival is presented with the support of our National Presenting Sponsor, Yamaha Corporation of America, and features outstanding chamber ensembles from three to 16 members.

The Music for All National Festival provides a positive atmosphere that celebrates music-making. All ensembles participate in scheduled audience time, ensuring a sizable and knowledgeable audience for the concerts. Each ensemble receives written and recorded evaluation from a panel of renowned educators and conductors, and a post-concert clinic. Students also participate in workshops presented by world class music educators about topics important to young musicians.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT Holiday Music Reverse Parade

Keller H.S.; Keller, TX

Brought on by the need for socially distant performances during the pandemic, the Keller High School Band created a unique "reverse parade" where students performed simple holiday tunes in small ensembles around the school while families and community members drove through to enjoy the music. The campus was decked with thousands of lights and decorations, complete with a drive-up hot cocoa stand. This performance has become an annual favorite, with over 400 vehicles in attendance each year.

INNOVATIVE FUNDRAISING Golden Regiment Fireworks Super Store

Blue Springs H.S.; Blue Springs, MO

Prior to the 4th of July holiday each year, the Blue Springs H.S. band operates an annual fireworks tent for four days. The tent is operated with only 12 volunteers during a given shift — and because many parents volunteer for multiple shifts, a combination of about 40 students and volunteers are utilized throughout the entire event. Even with minimizing staffing and a short time frame, the event raises over \$30,000 of profit each year. The event doubles as an outreach initiative, with many costumers leaving donations after learning about the ensemble through volunteer interactions.

PARENT/BOOSTER SUPPORT It Takes a Village: Our No-Charge Trip to Grand Nationals

Moe and Gene Johnson H.S.; Buda, TX

In Spring 2022, the band directors at Moe and Gene Johnson H.S. were inspired to take their ensemble to Grand Nationals in the Fall of that year, but were concerned that it would not be possible with such short notice. Parents quickly got on board with the idea and started working on a plan to make it happen. For the plan to fiscally work, parents needed to take on the role of a travel agency. \$173,000 was raised in 6 months, allowing for the ensemble of 231 students to attend Grand Nationals at no cost. This marked the first time in the district's history that a band competed in Grand Nationals, all thanks to the booster & parent volunteers who committed their spare time to fundraising efforts.

MARKETING AND PROMOTION We Are Ayala 2.0

Ayala H.S.; Chino Hills, CA

In 2 just two months, a new website was launched for the Ayala H.S. ensemble, built without any prior knowledge of web-design. It is now the top result on Google, easy to navigate, and is the new location for important information and media for their boosters, students, staff, and fans. This process has allowed for continuity of the website as well, enabling future booster members the ability to now easily modify the website. The modernization of the website has led to increased student, parent, and community engagement at minimal financial cost to the program.

ELEMENTARY EXCELLENCE Cardio Drumming

Pecatonica Elementary School; Hollandale, WI

Through cross-departmental collaboration, a Cardio Drumming program was offered to all 4th and 5th grade students at Pecatonica Elementary School. This produced positive connections between students and the music and physical education subject areas, while building relationships with peers. The resulting performances were showcased to the community via a school concert, and the initiative was promoted through social media and the local newspaper.

DECISION-MAKER ENGAGEMENT Small-Town Music Program with Big Support

Bethel-Tate M.S.; Bethel, OH

A small-town music program transformed itself through targeted engagement with school administrators, the superintendent, school board members, and community members into a model for other small, rural districts to follow. This engagement was necessary to raise the profile of the ensemble in the community, and to allow more opportunities in music for students. After three years, the program grew to having 1/3 of the student population involved in music, and the ongoing engagement efforts culminated in a \$50,000 grant from the district.

STUDENT RECRUITMENT, ENGAGEMENT, RETENTION Modern Music Makers (M3)

Abington Sr. H.S. and M.S.; Abington, PA

Modern Music Makers (M3) created music industry programming for students in the Abington School District, designed to create extensive and culturally responsive opportunities through music for students. The program encourages students to create and produce music which resonates with them and develops a sense for the music industry as a whole – not just what is traditionally offered in schools. At the two-year mark, the high school program featured 100 total students in the extracurricular program, and another 140 in the middle school variation. There is continual incorporation of elements for an expanded music industry application, including artist management, music distribution, and mentorship of younger students.



Holtan's final command was as the 10th Leader and Commander of The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own" and he holds the distinction of being the only officer to command all three of the Army's premier bands, including the U.S. Army Field Band and the U.S. Military Academy Band at West Point.

Holtan graduated from Bismarck (North Dakota) High School and was formerly a school music educator

in Montana. A strong advocate for music education, Holtan serves as Artistic Director of the Maryland Winds, a professional concert band, and Director of the All-American D-Day Band. Holtan is in demand as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator, presenting concerts and clinics in all fifty states, Canada, Japan, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Europe.

Holtan's ensembles have been seen on many nationally televised broadcasts and diverse stages, such as the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, DAR Constitution Hall, Mormon Tabernacle, Myerson Symphony Center, and Meyerhoff Symphony Hall, as well as for the 2017 Presidential Inaugural Concert at the Lincoln Memorial. Under his leadership and after a 44-year absence, the West Point Band reestablished a partnership with the New York Philharmonic, which resulted in five Lincoln Center joint concert performances. Holtan also led the West Point Band in the Emmy-nominated "Marina at West Point" PBS production that has reached over 180 million viewers.





In this marimba solo based on the Japanese folk song, "Sakura, Sakura", the world of fantasy is caught in an expanse of continuously falling cherry blossoms.

Variations on Dowland's Lachrimae Pavana for Marimba - Keiko Abe

Originally composed as an instrumental under the name "Lachrimae pavane" in 1596, it is Dowland's most famous ayre and became his signature song.

This ultra-creative piece provides the performer with a great opportunity to display both technical prowess and musicality on the snare drum.

This quiet and melancholic composition was inspired by an original folk song from Finland called "Hili Karjalasta."

Postludes 1 – Elliot Cole

Postludes is a book of eight pieces for a familiar instrument played in a new way: four players, with eight double-bass bows, play interlocking lines on a single vibraphone. The interplay of bows and hands tapping, muting and touching harmonics, weaves an intimate and intricate counterpoint that is as beautiful to watch as it is to hear: fragile, tender and haunting.

The marimba solo is meant to reflect the predominantly dark harmonies as well as the virtuosic and technical nature of the piece. This piece is inspired by a combination of composers, most notably Beethoven, Chopin, Thelonious Monk, and Wayne Shorter.

Caritas, Mvt. 3, Majestic – Michael Burritt

Caritas by Michael Burritt is a 3-movement piece that employs a traditional harmonic throughout. The 3rd movement "Majestic" is a dance-like conclusion that has rapid arpeggiated figures in the left hand as well as octaves and sequential sticking patterns.

Nvack – David Friedman and Dave Samuels

Nyack is one of the more complex works by David Friedman for his Double Image vibraphone/marimba duo with Dave Samuels. One of the unique parts of this piece is the contrast between the improvised (or written) solos between the two instruments. Each "voice" is able to speak distinctly, while remaining within the framework of the piece.

Chega De Saudade – Jobim & Morales/arr. Gary Burton, trans. Errol Rackipov Also known as "No More Blues," Cheqa De Saudade is a bossa nova jazz standard. It is considered to be the first bossa nova song to be recorded.



THAD ANDERSON

Thad Anderson is an Associate Professor of Music at the University of Central Florida where he coordinates the Percussion Studies program, teaches applied lessons, and directs the UCF Percussion Ensemble. Joining the faculty in 2009, Anderson is also artistic director of the UCF New Music Ensemble and teaches courses in music technology. Anderson is a versatile performer and pedagogue with focused interests that involve contemporary music and technology. Active as a solo, chamber, and orchestral percussionist, Anderson frequently tours and makes appearances across the United States and as far as Bangkok, Thailand. He is active in the Percussive Arts Society community where he currently serves as President-Elect within the Executive Committee, is a member of the

Board of Directors, and contributes to the various publications. He is a frequent evaluator and faculty member at the Music for All National Percussion Festival and Summer Symposium. Dr. Anderson holds degrees from The University of Central Florida and The University of Texas at Austin. Anderson plays Yamaha instruments, Vic Firth implements,

Zildjian cymbals, and Remo drumheads.



GREG BIMM

Greg Bimm (Chicago Heights, Illinois) served as Director of Bands at Marian Catholic High School from 1977 through 2023. Under Bimm's direction, the Marian Band grew from 70 to over 280 members and built a reputation as one of the premier high school band programs in the U.S. Honors include 7 BOA Grand National championships, 21 BOA National class championships, and 34 consecutive BOA National Finalist appearances. Marian has won 42 successive Illinois State marching class championships. The concert bands at Marian performed at the first BOA National Concert Festival and at numerous other state and national conventions. They have been undefeated in Catholic school concert contests for 41 years. They've appeared in the Macy's, Presidential Inaugural, and Rose parades and are among the few to receive both the Sudler Flag for concert band excellence and the Sudler Shield for marching band by the John Philip Sousa Foundation.

Bimm has received numerous NBA Citations of Excellence, the national ASBDA Stanbury Award for young band directors (1983), and twice the Sudler Order of Merit from the John Philip Sousa Foundation. In 1995, Bimm was the first high school band director to conduct the Illinois All-State band. Bimm received the Mary Hoffman Award of Excellence from IMEA and received career recognition from the Illinois Alliance for Arts Education. He was named a Lowell Mason Fellow by the NAfME received the Distinguished Service Award from the Archdiocese of Chicago. Bimm was inducted into the inaugural class of the ISU College of Fine Arts Hall of Fame, the Distinguished Alumni at LaSalle-Peru Township High School, and the MFA-BOA Hall of Fame. Bimm received an honorary doctorate in music education from the Vandercook College of Music and the Chicagoland Music Educator John Paynter Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2019, Bimm was honored by the Midwest Clinic as a Clinic Legend and has been a member of the ABA since 1994.



DR. TRAE BLANCO

Dr. Trae Blanco (Indianapolis, Indiana) serves as Director of University Bands at Butler University, where he conducts the Wind Ensemble, teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting, and administers the band area. After completing his B.M.E. at New Mexico State University (NMSU), Blanco served as Director of Bands at Las Cruces High School. Blanco holds a D.M.A. in wind conducting from the Herberger Institute at Arizona State University and an M.M. in Wind Conducting from the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University. Before coming to Butler, Blanco served as Director of Bands at Murray State and the University of Southern Maine. In July 2015, Blanco was a quest conductor with the United States Army "Pershing's Own" Concert Band in Washington, D.C., and in both 2015 and 2016, Blanco was a finalist in the American Prize in Wind Conducting. Blanco has published articles with the N.B.A. and WASBE

journals and has been an invited presenter at the state conventions of West Virginia, Maine, Kentucky, Ohio, and New Mexico, The Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic, College Band Directors National Association Eastern Division and North Central Division, as well as the 2019 WASBE International Convention in Bunol, Spain, and the upcoming 2024 conference in Soul, Seoul, South Korea.



BRIAN BLOCKER

Brian Blocker (Highland, Indiana) has been a music educator in Indiana for nineteen years. Blocker earned his B.M.E. from Butler University's Jordan College of the Arts. While at Butler, Blocker studied with Professor Jon Crabiel and was a Kappa Kappa Psi National Band Fraternity Alpha Beta Chapter officer. Blocker is the Director of Bands for the School Town of Highland in Northwest Indiana. Blocker is an active Indiana Bandmasters Association and Indiana Music Educators Association member. He is a founding member of the Southshore Brass Band and performs with Windiana Concert Band when available.

Blocker and his wife, Jelena, have four kids under ten years old and look forward to a hopeful future in music-making!

Dorsey's commitment to community has been demonstrated by his participation on the board of directors for Music for All, the Midwest Clinic, and United Sound. He currently serves as the president of the Midwest Clinic. Dorsey is also an elected member of the American Bandmasters Association and most recently was named a Yamaha Master Educator.

As an avid supporter of music education, Mr. Bodony also serves as an educational consultant for Music For All, a national organization based in Indianapolis dedicated to the advocacy of music education for all people. Additionally, Mr. Bodony serves as a festival coordinator for Music For All's annual Orchestra America National Festival.

Mr. Bodony's previous posts include Associate Conductor of the Missouri Symphony Orchestra's Hot Summer Nights Music Festival (2013-2015), Artistic

Director of the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra (2014–2016), and Cover Conductor and Pre-Concert Lecturer for the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra (2014–2015). He has also worked with the Indianapolis Chamber Orchestra, Bohuslav Martinu Philharmonic Orchestra (Czech Republic), as well as several high school, college, and community ensembles throughout the world.

Mr. Bodony earned a bachelor's degree in both religious studies and trombone performance from DePauw University in 2008. He later received a master's degree in trombone performance from Indiana University in 2011, where his primary teachers were Jim Beckel and Carl Lenthe, respectively. Mr. Bodony also pursed conducting studies at the St. Petersburg Conservatory (Russia) and Indiana University. His primary conducting teachers include Arthur Fagen, Leonid Korchmar, and Kirk Trevor.

As a trombonist, Mr. Bodony has frequently performed with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra and can be heard playing 2nd trombone on two album releases under the Telarc label, conducted by Krzysztof Urbański and Jun Märkl, respectively.

In 2013, Mr. Bodony was honored with the Beckmann Emerging Artist Award given by the Arts Council of Indianapolis to a young professional with exceptional talent and promise in a given field.



SCOTT BOERMA

Scott Boerma (Portage, Michigan) is the Director of Bands at Western Michigan University. Before this appointment, Boerma was the Associate Director of Bands and Director of the Michigan Marching Band at the University of Michigan, the previous Director of Bands at Eastern Michigan University, and began his career teaching music in the Michigan public schools. Boerma earned his D.M.A. degree in wind conducting at Michigan State University and his M.M. degree in music education at the University of Michigan, where he studied composition with William Bolcom. Boerma received his B.M.E. from Western Michigan University.

Boerma is an elected member of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association, an active band/orchestra conductor, adjudicator, and clinician, and

serves as a guest conductor for several honor bands and community bands nationwide each year. Boerma also conducts the Detroit Chamber Winds Brass holiday concerts.

Many outstanding ensembles have performed Boerma's concert band works, including "The President's Own" Marine Band, the U.S. Navy Band, the Dallas Wind Symphony, the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra, and the M.F.A. Honor Band of America. His works have been featured in the popular G.I.A. series, "Teaching Music Through Performance in Band," and at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic.

Also, a prolific arranger, Boerma receives yearly commissions to write music for many university and high school marching bands and drum and bugle corps. Boerma has written arrangements for the Boston Pops and the Detroit Chamber Winds Brass. For twenty-four years, from 1989 to the present, Boerma has been the music arranger for the acclaimed Madison Scouts Drum & Bugle Corps. In addition to many ensembles nationwide, most Big Ten university marching bands have performed Boerma's arrangements.



MARY ELIZABETH BOWDEN

Mary Elizabeth Bowden (Winston Salem, North Carolina) is a highly in-demand classical trumpet soloist, praised for her "splendid, brilliant" playing (Gramophone Magazine) and her "pure, refined, and warm" tone (American Record Guide). A Gold Medal Global Music Award Winner, Opus Klassik Nominee, and Yamaha Performing Artist, Bowden works diligently to establish a new repertoire for the trumpet through creative, collaborative commissioning projects and award-winning albums.

This season, Bowden performs four world premiere concertos and makes debuts with the Chamber Orchestra of Philadelphia, the Austin Symphony Orchestra, and the Roque Valley Symphony. She premieres a new arrangement of Gala Flagello's Persist with the DuPage Symphony. Bowden also tours Vivian

Fung and Clarice Assad's trumpet concertos to the Anchorage Symphony Orchestra, Seattle Metropolitan Chamber Orchestra, Akron Symphony Orchestra, Lexington Philharmonic, and Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra and holds residencies at Oberlin College, Swarthmore College, the University of Michigan, Central Michigan University, Michigan State University, Western Michigan University, Haverford College, Grand Valley State University and the Fine Arts Center of Greenville, SC. International engagements bring Bowden to Argentina, Mexico, and Finland. Bowden's Chrysalis Chamber Players embark on a U.S. tour of trumpet and string quartet repertoire, presented by Live On Stage, and with Seraph Brass, Bowden is recording an album of new compositions for brass guintet for Tower Grove Records. A new solo album with the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra made up entirely of trumpet concerti by living composers set to release on Cedille Records in the summer of 2024.

JAMES CAMPBELL

James Campbell (Lexington, Kentucky) has received worldwide recognition as a performer, pedagogue, and author and is a respected figure in developing the contemporary percussion ensemble. Campbell has toured extensively throughout The Americas, Europe, and Asia. Currently Emeritus Professor of Music and Director of Percussion Studies at the University of Kentucky in Lexington, Campbell also holds the positions of Principal Percussionist with the Lexington Philharmonic and drummer with the Kentucky Jazz Repertory Orchestra.

Campbell also serves as Past President of the Percussive Arts Society (PAS) and received the PAS Lifetime Achievement in Education Award in 2019. He was inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame in 2021, an honor recognizing the contributions of the most highly regarded professional leaders in percussion.

As a performer, Campbell has appeared at the International Society of Music Education World Conference, International Patagonia Percussion Festival, Journèes de la Percussion, PercuSonidos Percussion Festival, Swedish Arts and Musicians Interest Organization, Australian Percussion Eisteddfod, MENC National In-Service Conference, Midwest Band & Orchestra Clinic, MusicFest Canada, All-Japan Band Clinic, The Music for All World Percussion Symposium, State MEA conventions across the country, and frequently appears as an artist at the Percussive Arts Society International Conventions.



SCOTT CASAGRANDE

Scott J. Casagrande was Director of Bands at John Hersey High School in Arlington Heights, IL for 22 years and retired in June 2021 after completing 33 years of teaching in Illinois Public Schools. He taught high school, middle school, and elementary students in suburban, urban, and rural settings over the course of his teaching career.

In addition to his role with Music for All, Mr. Casagrande is also a consultant with MusicFirst software, as well as an administrator for the Dr. William P. Foster Project serving bands in historically under-served and under-resourced communities. He is a Past-President of the National Band Association and served the NBA as a member of the Executive Committee for eight years. Mr. Casagrande has been nominated and inducted into the prestigious American Bandmasters

Association, Phi Beta Mu, and the American School Band Directors Association. He has received 22 Citation of Excellence Awards from the National Band Association and he has been recognized by former President Barack Obama, the US Senate, the US House of Representatives, the Illinois Senate, School District 214, Plainfield HS, Stephen Decatur HS, and John Hersey HS.

Under Mr. Casagrande's direction, the John Hersey Symphonic Band and Jazz Ensemble performed as a featured ensemble in the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic. Ensembles under Mr. Casagrande's direction were selected to perform in 24 Illinois Superstate Concert Band Festivals, two Illinois Music Educators Association Conventions, and four Music for All National Concert Band Festivals. The Hersey Symphonic Band was named the Illinois Superstate Concert Band Festival Honor Band four times and the band program was awarded the Sudler Flag of Honor by the Sousa Foundation.

Mr. Casagrande has published several articles in trade magazines and he has made presentations throughout the United States at state and national conferences. He maintains a very active clinician schedule throughout the year.



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DR. SHELBY R. CHIPMAN

Dr. Shelby R. Chipman (Tallahassee, Florida) is a professor of music at Florida A&M University (FAMU), teaching instrumental music education, conducting, coordinating student recitals, and managing student teachers. Chipman also serves as director of the Marching and pep Bands, Wind Symphony, Symphonic Band, and String Ensemble.

A Miami native, Chipman graduated from Miami Northwestern Senior High and received his B.S. degrees in Computer Science and Music Education from FAMU, studying conducting under the late Dr. William P. Foster and Dr. Julian E. White. Chipman completed his master's and Ph.D. in music education at the University of Illinois and Florida State University, studying with Dr. Bentley Shellahamer.

Previously, Chipman taught music in the Miami-Dade County Public School system for ten years and was named Teacher of the Year in 1993. Under his leadership, the Rocket Marching Band has performed for the King Orange Jamboree Parades, the Heritage Festival, FAMU's Homecoming Festivals, the MLK Parades & Festival, and Macy's Day Parade. The Miami Central High School Symphonic Band performed at the Bands of America National Concert Festival. During his tenure in Miami-Dade County Public Schools, he served as Florida Bandmasters Association (FBA) district secretary, chairman, ethics, all-state, clinics committee, and the executive board of FBA.

On the local level in Tallahassee, Chipman served as music director/conductor of the Tallahassee Big Bend Community Orchestra and as Orchestra Director at Bethel AME Church.

The FAMU Wind Symphony and Symphonic Bands perform regularly on campus and at divisional, national, and professional music conferences like FMEA conferences, Carnegie Hall, and the CBDNA National Convention. The FAMU Incomparable Marching "100" performed for the Summer Louis Vuitton Men's Fashion Show in Paris (2023), the Tournament of Roses Parade (2019), and the 46th Presidential Inauguration Celebration.

Under Covey's direction, the concert ensembles at LTHS have performed throughout the state and country. The Wind Symphony has become a nationally respected ensemble with performance highlights including the Illinois Superstate Festival at the University of Illinois (every year since 2004), the National

Association for Music Education National Conference (2008), the Illinois Music Education Conference (2001, 2010, 2022), The Music for All National Concert Band Festival (2006, 2008, 2016, 2018, 2023), The World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles International Conference (2009), and The Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic (2008, 2013, 2021). NATHAN DAUGHTREY

Nathan Daughtrey (Greensboro, North Carolina) is a composer and percussionist driven by curiosity, relentlessly seeking ways to meld his lifelong passions. As a performing artist and clinician for Yamaha percussion and Salyers Percussion mallets, his varied career has taken him worldwide, appearing as a keyboard soloist in Australia, Asia, Eastern Europe, and North America. Daughtrey has released two solo marimba albums – "Spiral Passages" and "The Yuletide Marimba" - and has appeared on many other albums, including Emma Lou Diemer's "Pacific Ridge," performing as a soloist on her marimba concerto with the Slovak Radio Symphony Orchestra.

Daughtrey first discovered and cultivated his compositional voice through percussion works, including solos, duets, and ensembles. After one too many experiences being a bored, young "drummer" in the back of a band room, he made it his mission to compose wind band music across all difficulty levels with engaging, independent percussion parts that add color and drive, making those players indispensable. Perhaps best known for his percussion ensemble pieces, like "Mercury Rising" and "Firefly," Daughtrey has also amassed an impressive catalog of chamber works combining percussion with woodwinds, brass, strings, and voice. He maintains a healthy commission schedule, composing works across genres for performers, ensembles, and directors worldwide.

In January 2020, Daughtrey took over as owner and president of C. Alan Publications after being with the company since 1998. To this new role, he brings the same curiosity and zeal to curate a catalog of music that is genuine, forward-looking, educational, and inspiring. Daughtrey lives a charmed life full of running, traveling, cooking, and concert-hopping with his wife, Katie, and daughter, Penelope, in North Carolina.



DR. RODNEY DORSEY

Dr. Rodney Dorsey (Tallahassee, Florida) is a Professor of Music at the Florida State University (FSU), where he conducts the FSU Wind Orchestra and guides the graduate wind conducting program.

Dorsey comes to FSU from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music (IU), where he conducted the IU Wind Ensemble and taught graduate conducting courses. Before his tenure at the Jacobs School, Dorsey served on the University of Oregon, University of Michigan, DePaul University, and Northwestern University faculties. He also gained extensive experience teaching in the Florida and Georgia public schools.

Dorsey studied conducting with Mallory Thompson, John P. Paynter, and James Croft. He was a clarinet student of Fred Ormand and Frank Kowalsky. During his conducting career, Dorsey has led performances at several prominent events, including the American Bandmasters Association Convention, College Band Directors National Conference North/Northwest Regional Conference, and the Bands of America National Festival. He is active as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator in the United States. International engagements include Hungary, Canada, and Bulgaria.

Dorsey has demonstrated his commitment to the community by participating on the board of directors for Music for All and the Midwest Clinic. He currently serves as the president of the Midwest Clinic. Other professional memberships include the College Band Directors National Association, National Association for Music Education, Florida Bandmasters Association, Kappa Kappa Psi, Tau Beta Sigma (honorary), Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Incorporated. Dorsey is also an elected member of the American Bandmasters Association. Most recently, Dorsey was named a Yamaha Master Educator.

Jennifer Drake (Boise, Idaho) draws inspiration from the power of music to connect people, ideas, and communities as a conductor, violist, teacher, clinician, and camp director. Drake is the music director of the Serenata Orchestra and the Boise Philharmonic Youth Orchestras and has served as the assistant conductor and principal violist for the Fairbanks Summer Arts Festival. Drake has been a guest conductor for the Idaho State Civic Symphony and Opera Idaho. Drake is the Boise Baroque Orchestra's principal violist and the Boise Philharmonic's section violist. He has conducted numerous all-state orchestras, as well as the Honors Performance Series at Carnegie Hall and Sydney Opera House, Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute, French Woods Festival of the Performing Arts, and an upcoming engagement with the Music for All Honor Orchestra of America. A talented violinist, Droste has performed with the orchestras of Indianapolis, Canton, Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Nashville, and the Lancaster Festival, among others. He is also skilled on viola, trumpet, and as a tenor. Droste holds degrees from The Ohio State University and Texas Tech University.



DR. CLIFTON EVANS

Dr. Clifton Evans (Arlington, Texas) currently serves as Director of Orchestras, Associate Professor of Music, Graduate Advisor, and String Area Coordinator at the University of Texas at Arlington (UTA). Evans has enjoyed a conducting career that has taken him to Hong Kong, England, China, Austria, the Czech Republic, and the United States. Highly sought after as a clinician and lecturer, Evans has conducted numerous regional orchestras and bands and given multiple lectures on conducting and rehearsal techniques.

In addition to his duties as a professor at UTA, Evans maintains an active schedule at festivals, conventions, and workshops. Evans was recently named Principal Conductor for the American Festival for the Arts in Houston with plans to return and conduct for the 2024 summer season. Previously, Evans has served

as a presenter multiple times for the Texas Orchestra Directors Association annual convention and recently became involved with the association's "Winter Clinic" program, a new initiative on rehearsal techniques. Evans recently presented two of these sessions at the annual convention in 2023 and presented another workshop this winter at UTA. Each summer at UTA, Evans serves as Executive Director and a faculty member of the Texas Conducting Workshop, a program he founded with the string faculty and Summer Strings, hosting roughly 350 students throughout the DFW Metroplex.

Evans' previous positions include Artistic Director of the Arlington Youth Symphony, Director of Orchestras and Chamber Music for the High School for the Performing and Visual Arts in Houston, Music Director for the Gilbert and Sullivan Society of Houston, Conductor for the Houston Youth Symphony, and Music Director and Conductor of the Houston Civic Symphony. Evans is an honorary member of UTA's Tau Beta Sigma and Kappa Kappa Psi chapters and also served as the faculty advisor to the Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia chapter for five years. Evans resides in Arlington with his wife, Christy.



RICHARD FLOYD

Texas State Director of Music Emeritus Richard Floyd is presently in his 60th year of active involvement as a conductor, music educator and administrator (2023). He has enjoyed a distinguished career at virtually every level of wind band performance and music education.

Mr. Floyd is a recognized authority on conducting, the art of wind band rehearsing, concert band repertoire, and music advocacy. As such, he has toured extensively including appearances in 44 American states and in nine other countries. The Austin Symphonic Band, under his leadership, performed at the Midwest International Clinic in Chicago on three occasions.

In 2002 he was the recipient of the prestigious A.A. Harding Award presented by the American School Band Directors Association. The Texas Bandmasters Association named him Texas Bandmaster of the Year in 2006 and in 2009 he was presented the Texas Music Educators Association Distinguished Service Award. In March of 2011, he was inducted into the Music for All Hall of Fame and awarded the prestigious Midwest International Clinic Medal of Honor for his distinguished and unique contributions to educational bands and orchestras. Most recently he was inducted into the National Band Association Academy of Wind and Percussion Arts, considered to be the Academy Award for wind music performance and Phi Beta Mu International Band Fraternity honored him with the Outstanding Contributor Award recognizing individuals for outstanding contributions to band music education.

In 2021 the College Band Directors National Association established the Richard Floyd CBDNA Distinguished Service Award in recognition of his decades of service to that organization. Floyd is a Yamaha Master Educator and is the author of the critically acclaimed book "The Artistry of Teaching and Making Music" published by GIA Publications. His latest book, "The Seven Deadly Sins of Music Making" also published by GIA was released in August 2020.

Shawn Galvin (Raleigh, North Carolina) is a percussionist, conductor, and producer known for his creativity and collaborative spirit. Glavin has appeared at venues including Carnegie Hall, Royal Albert Hall, and Elbphilharmonie, as well as countless art galleries and basement rock clubs.

Galvin has served as percussionist and timpanist with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra since 1996, with whom he won the 2018 Grammy Award for Best Orchestral Performance. Galvin founded New Music Raleigh, "the Southeast's most plugged-in musical collective devoted to the work of living composers" (Indy Week), which presents bespoke contemporary classical performances. Galvin has also served as percussionist and timpanist of the United States Navy Band, Washington, DC, and as a Tempus Fugit Percussion Ensemble member.

As a conductor, Galvin has led the Arizona Opera, Duke Performances, and North Carolina Opera productions. Galvin has produced events for the National Gallery of Art, the North Carolina Symphony, C.A.M. Raleigh, and the Hopscotch Music Festival and collaborated on projects with Big Star, R.E.M., Wilco, and Yo La Tengo members. Galvin has served on panels for New Music U.S.A., the Greater Baltimore Cultural Alliance, and the Opportunity Fund.

Galvin has presented at the Percussive Arts Society International Convention, Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, Music for All National Festival, and universities nationwide.

Galvin is an Artist-in-Residence at the Louisiana State University School of Music and is the Orchestra Manager at Spoleto Festival U.S.A. Galvin is an Artist/Educational Clinician for Yamaha Percussion.

William Galvin is the former Director of Instrumental Studies and Music Department Chair for the Trinity Area School District. A native of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, he received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Morehead (KY) State University and Master of Music Education degree from Duquesne University. Mr. Galvin has been awarded the National Band Association's Citation of Excellence and the Citation of Excellence presented by the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association. During his tenure at Trinity High School Mr. Galvin's ensembles earned 28 Superior Ratings and eight consecutive Pennsylvania Interscholastic Marching Band Association Class Championships. His ensembles performed for five Pennsylvania Music Educators Association (PMEA) State Conferences, one Music Educators National Conference Eastern Division Conference, and three Music for All National Festivals.

Mr. Galvin was cited as an Outstanding Young Educator in America and has been listed in "Who's Who Among American Teachers." Mr. Galvin is a Music for All Educational Consultant, coordinator of the Sandy Feldstein National Percussion Festival, and a Bands of America Contest Director. He has served on the board of directors of the Washington Symphony Orchestra, as a member of the Music for All Advisory Board, is a past PMEA District President, and a former chair of the PMEA Music Booster Affiliate. In 2022, Mr. Galvin was inducted into the Music for All Hall of Fame.

In his retirement Mr. Galvin continues to be active as a consultant, speaker, and quest conductor.



LINDA J. GAMMON

Linda J. Gammon (Lake Frederick, Virginia) is the Virginia Winds Academy Junior Band director. Before assuming this position, she directed middle school bands in Fairfax County, VA, for over 30 years. Gammon is a native of Dover-Foxcroft, Maine. Gammon received her B.S. in Music Education from Clarion University of Pennsylvania and an M.A. degree in Conducting from George Mason University.

Under Gammon's direction, her middle school bands enjoyed state, regional, and national recognition, including four appearances at the Virginia Music Educators Association (VMEA) Professional Development Conferences and the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic (1993) (2000). Gammon and the Robinson Middle School Symphonic Band received the prestigious John Philip Sousa Foundation Sudler Silver Cup Award (1997), the highest honor bestowed on a middle school band program.

Gammon is an active adjudicator, guest conductor, clinician across the country, and an elected member of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association (2023). Gammon is a Past President of the VMEA, Virginia Band and Orchestra Directors Association (VBODA), and Fairfax County Band Directors Association. Gammon also served as the VMEA State Executive for six years after retirement. Gammon also has received the James Madison University Dr. Gary K. Ritcher Outstanding Service in Music Education Award (2021) and the VMEA Lifetime Achievement Award (2021).



CARL GRAPENTINE

Carl Grapentine enjoyed a 46-year career in classical music radio. He was the host of the Morning Program on WFMT, Chicago's Classical music station, for 25 years. He joined WFMT in 1986 after serving as the morning host of WQRS, the classical music station in Detroit, for 13 years. Mr. Grapentine was the host for the very first National Concert Band Festival in Evanston, Illinois in 1992 and has been with Music for All ever since. He still presents pre-concert lectures for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and many other ensembles. He also hosts concerts for numerous community orchestras and bands.

An alumnus of the University of Michigan School of Music, Mr. Grapentine has been the "stadium voice" of the University of Michigan Marching Band since 1970 — his voice being heard on national telecasts of 16 Rose Bowls and numerous other bowl games. Corey LaMon Graves (Forney, Texas) is in his sixteenth year of teaching and is currently the head band director at Jackson Middle School in Forney ISD. Before this appointment, Graves served as the head director of Roma Middle School for eleven years. Graves received his Bachelor of Music Education degree as a Summa Cum Laude graduate from Stephen F. Austin State University and a Master of Music in Euphonium Performance from The Ohio State University as a graduate fellow.

Graves is a Bill and Melinda Gates Millennium Scholar. Bands under his direction earned high recognition at the state and national stage, receiving recognition as a National and Commended Winner in The Foundation for Music Education National Wind Band contest from 2013-2023. been consistent state finalists in the Texas Music Educators Association (TMEA) Honor Band Competition and were honored as the 2020 TMEA CC Honor Band. JEFFREY GROGAN

Jeffrey Grogan is an internationally-acclaimed conductor and teacher, currently serving as Director of Orchestral Activities at the Bass School of Music at Oklahoma City University and Artistic Director of the Oklahoma Youth Orchestras. Recent work includes conducting at the Musikverein in Vienna, Sydney Opera House, Harpa Concert Hall in Iceland, and in Bangkok and Singapore. Grogan serves as a Master Educator for the Yamaha Corporation of America and also on the Advisory Committees of the Midwest Clinic and Music for All. For several summers, he was invited by the LA Philharmonic to conduct alongside Gustavo Dudamel at Disney Hall, a part of the Youth Orchestras of Los Angeles National Festival. He previously served eleven seasons as Education and Community Engagement Conductor of the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, and as Conductor and Artistic Director of the NJSO Youth Orchestras, the InterSchool Orchestras of New York and the New Jersey Youth Symphony. He was founding Artistic Director of two El Sistema inspired program in New Jersey, CHAMPS and the Paterson Music Project. Grogan taught for over a decade at the University of Michigan, Ithaca College, and Baylor University. He is also the former Associate Director of Bands and Marching Band Director at the University of Michigan and Baylor University



COL. TIMOTHY J. HOLTAN

Col. Timothy J. Holtan (Sykesville, Maryland) retired 2017 as a senior military musician in the Department of Defense. Holtan's final command was as the 10th Leader and Commander of The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own" and holds the distinction of being the only officer to command all three of the Army's premier bands, including the U.S. Army Field Band and the U.S. Military Academy Band at West Point.

Holtan graduated from Bismarck (North Dakota) High School and was formerly a school music educator in Montana. A strong advocate for music education, Holtan serves as Artistic Director of the Maryland Winds, a professional concert band, and Director of the All-American D-Day Band. Holtan is in demand as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator, presenting concerts and clinics in all fifty states, Canada, Japan, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Europe.

Holtan's ensembles have been seen on many nationally televised broadcasts and diverse stages, such as the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, DAR Constitution Hall, Mormon Tabernacle, Myerson Symphony Center, and Meyerhoff Symphony Hall, as well as for the 2017 Presidential Inaugural Concert at the Lincoln Memorial. Holtan also led the West Point Band in the Emmy-nominated "Marina at West Point" PBS production that has reached over 180 million viewers.



BARRY L. HOUSER

Barry L. Houser (Champaign, Illinois) is the Director of the Marching Illini, Associate Director of Bands, Conductor of the Wind Orchestra, Director of the Fighting Illini Athletic Bands, Clinical Associate Professor, and Chair of the Conducting Area in the School of Music at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. Before Illinois, Houser served as the Associate Director of Bands, Director of Athletic Bands, and Director of Bands at Eastern Illinois University. A native of Indiana, Houser served as Director of Bands and Performing Arts Director at Northwood High School in Nappanee, Indiana, and was the Assistant Director of Bands at Buchholz High School in Gainesville, Florida.

Houser is a guest conductor and clinician for numerous All-State and District honor bands. He is the Artistic Director for the BRT Thanksgiving Parade of Bands at Walt Disney World and was on staff for the Macy's Great American Marching Band and the National Events Mass Band. Houser has contributed to the marching band textbook The System by Gary Smith and Teaching Music through Performance in Band series.

Houser has served as Governor of the North Central District of Kappa Kappa Psi (KKP) and is currently chapter advisor for the Nu Xi Chapter of KKP and Chapter Advisor for Phi Mu Alpha. Houser has served as the North Central Division Chair for NBA and Chair of the Athletic Band Committee and National Board for CBDNA. Houser is the Chair of the Athletic Bands for the Big Ten Band Directors Association, an MFA Educational Advisory Team member, and Director and President of the Smith Walbridge Clinics.

Houser has been honored by the Indiana General Assembly and the US House of Representatives. He receives the Indianapolis Star Academic All–Star Award, the WNDU Channel 16 Excellence in Education Award, Quinlan & Fabash Chicagoland Outstanding Music Educator, Illinois Leadership Center Jeffrey Moss Leadership Coach of the Year, and other recognitions. Professor Houser is a Yamaha Master Educator.



LARRY J. LIVINGSTON

Larry J. Livingston (Los Angeles, California) has appeared with the Houston Symphony, the Los Angeles Philharmonic Green Umbrella Series, at the Festival de Musique in France, with the Stockholm Wind Orchestra, the Leopoldinum Orchestra in Poland, the Enescu Philharmonic Orchestra in Rumania, and the Pan Pacific Festival Orchestras in Sydney. Burt Mason (New York, NY) is an associate musician of the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra and principal Trombone of the Chamber Orchestra of NY(CONY). Mason has performed with conductors such as Michael Tilson Thomas, Kurt Masur, Alan Gilbert, Mstislav Rostropovich, Esa-Pekka Salonen, Skitch Henderson, and Yannick Nézet-Séguin in venues such as Royal Albert Hall, Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, Walt Disney Concert Hall, and Radio City Music Hall.

Mason started trombone at age twelve but received formal lessons once he entered college at the Crane School of Music. DR. SARAH MCKOIN

Dr. Sarah McKoin (Lubbock, Texas) is an internationally highly regarded wind band conductor and music education advocate currently serving as Director of Bands, Professor of Music, and Chair of the Conducting and Ensembles area at Texas Tech University. Under McKoin's direction, the Symphonic Wind Ensemble has appeared at the Midwest Clinic, Texas Music Educators Association conferences (TMEA), North American Saxophone Alliance, College Music Society, and College Band Directors National Association conferences (CBDNA). Dr. Tonya Mitchell-Spradlin (State College, Pennsylvania) is the Director of Wind Band Studies and Assistant Professor of Music at Penn State University. With a diverse background as a conductor, clinician, adjudicator, educator, and speaker, Mitchell-Spradlin is frequent quest conductor with several regional honor bands, All-State bands, summer camps and clinics, and school & collegiate residencies. Mitchell-Spradlin conducts pedagogy actively, having served as a clinician for the UMKC Conducting Symposium and the President's Own Marine Band Conductor Training Program. She has shared musical and pedagogical ideas on several music podcasts, including Everything Band, Conn Selmer's Backstage with Dr. Tim, The Bandroom, and the Ictus Podcast. Presentations include invited sessions at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, College Music Society, the College Band Directors National Association,

SCMEA, KMEA, and NYSBDA, and keynote presenter for the NAfME Northwest conference. Mitchell-Spradlin has presented nationally in Australia and Austria. A proponent for advancing the wind ensemble medium, she led the consortium and premiere of Aaron Perrine's Beneath a Canvas of Green for wind ensemble and percussion guartet. She is active in commissions and premieres. Mitchell-Spradlin holds the Agnes Scollins Carey Professorship in music from 2024 to 2027. This professorship funds her travel and research in Ghana, where she will interview Griots - West African storytellers. The project will conclude with a restaging of Darius Milhaud's ballet, La Creation du Monde, with West African dance, instruments, and the added element of narration using primary material from Ghanaian storytellers. Under Mitchell-Spradlin's direction, the Penn State Symphonic Wind Ensemble has received several honors, including a performance at the prestigious Heinz Hall in Pittsburgh, PA, as part of Penn State's President's Concert, as well as an invitation to perform at the College Band Directors National Association Eastern Region Conference in Ithaca, New York.



GABE MUSELLA

Gabe Musella (Houston, Texas) serves as University Interscholastic League (UIL) Assistant Music Director in Austin, Texas. Before Musella's current position, he taught for 30 years in Texas, where his bands performed at The Midwest Clinic and Music for All National Concert Festival and placed as finalists in the Texas Music Educators Honor Band and at the UIL State Marching Contest. While at Spring H.S., the band program was designated a Grammy Signature School and an HSO Residency School and featured in THE INSTRUMENTALIST. Spring Band ensembles earned five invitations to perform at The Midwest Clinic between 2008 and 2016. Spring chamber groups received awards at the prestigious Fischoff, Coltman, and Houston Underground chamber music competitions.

Musella is an active composer and arranger whose works have been performed at The Midwest Clinic, PASIC, WIBC, and other conferences nationwide and abroad. The Goin' Band from Raiderland recently performed "Wreck 'Em Fanfare" at the 2023 Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, and The United States Air Force Band, the TMEA All-State Jazz Ensemble, the ATSSB All-State Band, and ensembles at the University of Texas-El Paso, Texas Tech University, and the University of Houston have premiered his works. His publishers include RBC, C. Alan, Boosey & Hawkes, Carl Fischer, Kjos, Row-Loff, TRN, ALRY, and MKT Music Publications.

Musella has received awards from The Texas Bandmasters Association and The Houston Symphony Orchestra. Musella holds a B.M. in Composition and an M.M. in Conducting from Texas Tech University, where he studied with James Sudduth. Memberships include ASCAP, ABA, TMEA, TBA, TMAA, Phi Beta Mu, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and serves as Chamber Coordinator for the Music for All National Concert Festival. Musella is President of the Foundation for Music Education and has been on the Texas Tech Band and Orchestra Camp staff since 1985. Musella and his wife, Alice, are very proud of their son Alex, an environmental consultant.



DR. DANIEL PARDO

Dr. Daniel Pardo (Houston, Texas) is an Assistant Professor of Flute at Prairie View A&M University and regularly works as a studio musician in orchestral and commercial settings, fusing Western Classical traditions with ethnic sounds and technology. Born in Bogota, Colombia, Pardo's performer/producer roles have led to unique collaborations in recordings and tours with producers and artists in Los Angeles, Nashville, Madrid, and London. As principal flute, Pardo recorded the 50-year commemoration CD of West Side Story for the Bernstein Estate and The Children of Eden for Stephen Schwartz.

Pardo won the 2016 U.N.T. Sherman-Barsanti Inspiration Award, a competition honoring creativity with a \$10,000 prize for his innovative World Fusion arrangements/performances with his group, From A Far Away. In addition to earning national leadership awards in Colombia and the U.S., Pardo has received

recognition for his contributions to the U.S. military music program with the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Army Commendation Medal, and the Colonel George Howard Citation of Musical Excellence.

Pardo holds music performance degrees from Texas State University (B.M.) and the University of North Texas (M.M. and D.M.A.) and music business and production certificates from the Berklee College of Music. Pardo's principal mentors include Fabio Londoño, Greg Patillo, Pedro Eustache, Adah Jones, and Mary Karen Clardy.

Pardo serves as an adjudicator for local and national flute competitions. He is the coordinator for the Houston Flute Club Young Artist Competition and the Frances Blaisdell Scholarship Competition for the National Flute Association (U.S.A.). Aside from recording flutes, Pardo works from his studio as a mixing and mastering engineer for choirs, big bands, and orchestral projects in the U.S. and Europe.

Daniel Pardo is a Yamaha Performing Artist & Clinician.



JOHN PHILLIPS

John Phillips (Indianapolis, Indiana) recently served as an Adjunct Professor at Florida Gulf Coast University and was also the Artistic Coordinator for the Southwest Florida Symphony Orchestra. Prior to moving to Florida, he was on staff at the University of Western Ontario where he conducted the Symphonic Band and taught conducting and music education classes. He has also been a faculty member at the University of Toronto and York University in the departments of music and education. In demand as an adjudicator and clinician, Phillips shares his unique brand of music education through workshops with State and Provincial Music Educators' Associations, the National Association for Music Education, and as a presenter at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic. Throughout his career, he has contributed to numerous initiatives with Music for All including the National Festival, the annual Summer Symposium, and the Bands of

America Grand National Championships. Phillips regularly guest conducts honor bands across Canada and the United States. JOHN POLLARD

John Pollard is the voice of the Texas State Marching Championships, Colorado State Marching Championships, BOA Fall Championships and National Percussion Festival. A lifelong music education advocate, he serves on the MFA Board of Directors and is a continuing Yamaha Corporation consultant. John is Senior Director of Education for the International Gemological Institute, the world's largest gemological organization, responsible for overseeing and expanding courses and diploma programs at the institute's 14 schools of gemology and training IGI clients, including some of the world's leading luxury brands. From 1997-2005 John was Associate Band Director at L.D. Bell High School. A two-time winner of the District's Award of Excellence, his groups were Texas State Marching Champions, PASIC National Drumline Champions, Sudler Shield recipients and medaled over 25 times at BOA Regionals, Super-Regionals, and

Grand Nationals. His percussionists performed at PASIC, Midwest, TMEA & TBA. John was a coordinator for Yamaha's Sounds Of Summer program, instructed MFA Summer Symposiums, National Festivals, Honor Bands and the first BOA Tournament Of Roses Band, chaired the UIL Percussion Committee, was TMEA All-State Music Selector, PASIC 2000 committee member and helped produce MTV's Super Bowl XXXVIII halftime show.

In 2005 John began a career in gemology. An ongoing consultant for diamond producers, sellers, and grading laboratories around the world, he's given seminars in Hong Kong, Beijing, Shanghai, Antwerp and locations across the USA for IGI, the American Gem Society, Jewelers of America, JCK Las Vegas, Women's Jewelry Association and Gemological Institute of America Alumni Association, among others.



DAN POTTER

Dan Potter (Tulsa, Oklahoma) is an award-winning journalist and radio host involved in marching bands and drum corps for over 40 years. He is an announcer and media personality for Bands of America and Drum Corps International and hosts popular marching arts podcasts, including BOA's "Break Ranks!"

Potter was a drum major in the high school marching band and drum corps. He has also instructed Indiana, Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas high school bands. Potter is a member of the Board of Directors of Zephyrus Performing Arts, the parent organization of Zephyrus Drum and Bugle Corps, and Zephyrus Independent World WGI Guard in Tulsa.

Potter is a veteran journalist, radio personality, and host of the KRMG Morning News with Dan Potter at KRMG Radio in Tulsa. In his decades covering

news in Texas and Oklahoma, Potter has witnessed many historic events first-hand, including a presidential inauguration, political conventions, and too many tornadoes to count. He receives numerous broadcast journalism awards, including the Radio Television News Directors Association's Edward R. Murrow award for best radio newscast in the US and the DuPont-Columbia University Silver Baton for excellence in broadcast journalism. In 2015 and 2020, Potter received the National Association of Broadcasters' Marconi Award for Medium Market Personality of the Year.

Every November, after BOA Grand Nationals, Potter hosts "Stories of Light," a three-day radiothon in Tulsa that has become Make A Wish Oklahoma's largest annual revenue source, raising over \$4,000,000 for the charity. In 2021, Make A Wish Oklahoma named its' yearly Volunteer of the Year the Dan Potter Community Service Award. Potter and his wife, Martha, reside in Tulsa with two spoiled dogs and lots of pictures of their kids and grandkids.



DANA PRADERVAND-SEDATOLE

Dana Pradervand-Sedatole (Lansing, Michigan) is in her 36th year of teaching and is currently the Associate Director of Bands at the University of Houston. Pradervand-Sedatole serves as Past President of the Texas Music Educators Association (TMEA). Before coming to the University of Houston, Pradervand-Sedatole was the Director of Bands at Oak Ridge High School in Conroe, TX. During her six-year tenure, the band received numerous awards, including 2nd Runner-Up in the TMEA 6A Honor Band Competition, UIL State Marching Contest qualifier, and a three-time National Wind Band Honoree.

Pradervand-Sedatole began her teaching career as the Assistant Band Director at Monterey High School in Lubbock, Texas, and later became the Director of Bands at Evans Junior High. Pradervand-Sedatole moved to San Antonio, Texas, in 1992 to become the Director of Bands at Wood Middle School. While at Wood

MS, her Wind Ensemble was a TMEA Honor Band Finalist twice. In 2001, Pradervand-Sedatole was named the Director of Bands at Judson High School in Converse, Texas. During her tenure at Judson, the band enjoyed many successes, including being named an Area Honor Band Finalist, performing at the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival, and performing at the National Youth Concert in Carnegie Hall.

Pradervand-Sedatole is a graduate of Texas Tech University and a student of Mr. James Sudduth. After completing her degrees, Pradervand-Sedatole began studying with Mr. Eddie Green. Pradervand-Sedatole is an active clinician and adjudicator throughout the United States and is currently the conductor of the Michigan State University Spartan Youth Wind Symphony. She maintains professional affiliations with the American Bandmasters Association, TMEA, Texas Bandmasters Fraternity, Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity, and Texas Music Adjudicators Association. She serves on the Board of Trustees for The Foundation for Music Education.



ALEX QUINTERO

Alex Quintero (Cooper City, Florida) is a public address announcer for the marching arts that can be heard by thousands of spectators each year. Quintero started his announcing career in 2014 with the Florida Marching Band Championships and, in 2018, began announcing with Bands of America.

When not announcing, Quintero records in his home studio as a professional voice actor. Quintero has been featured on TV, radio, and online commercials, promos, trailers, on-hold/IVR services, award videos and ceremonies, in-stadium broadcasts, and more.

Quintero participated in music through high school as a Saxophonist, Woodwind Choir Conductor, composer, arranger, Drum Major, and a performer in the highest honor band at the University of South Florida's Festival of Winds event. Quintero became a Marching Chief at Florida State University, where he earned his

degree in Professional Communication.

PABLO RIEPPI

Pablo Rieppi (New York, New York) is a native of Uruguay and lives in New York. He is a member of The New York City Ballet Orchestra, Percussion Dept. Coordinator and Instructor at The Juilliard School, Preparatory Division, and Adjunct Assistant Professor of Percussion at Hofstra University. Rieppi is a regular guest with the New York Philharmonic and frequently performs with the Mostly Mozart Festival, the American Symphony Orchestra, The

New York Pops, and the American Composers Orchestra, among others.

Rieppi was a member of numerous Broadway orchestras, including The King and I, Legally Blonde, and West Side Story. He has recorded many feature film scores, including Steven Spielberg's West Side Story, Salem's Lot, White Noise, Gemini Man, The Brave On, The Alamo, The Good Shepherd, II Postino, The

Goldfinch, and Zoolander 2.

Past teaching appointments include Oberlin Conservatory, SUNY Purchase, and Columbia University. Rieppi has presented numerous master's classes in percussion in the United States and abroad, most recently at the Percussive Arts Society International Convention. He created Percussion On The Sound (POTS!) and is a faculty member of Percussion Conservatory.

Rieppi's method book, Snare Drum Technique: Essential Basics for Daily Practice, was cited in the March 2015 issue of Percussive Notes as one of the 30 most utilized books. Rieppe's accompaniments for the 12 Etudes for Snare Drum by Jacques Delecluse, titled Accompaniment Music for Solo Snare Drum, Vol. 1, are available through Bandcamp.com. Most recently, 12 Modern Timpani Solos were released through Bachovich Publications, and videos of the pieces are available on the Percussion Conservatory platform and numerous other performances and educational videos online.

Rieppi has a Master's degree from The Juilliard School, a Bachelor's degree from George Mason University, and an Honorary Doctorate in Music from Five Towns College.



BETHANY ROBINSON

Bethany Robinson (Noblesville, Indiana) is a YAMAHA Performing Artist, 2022 GRAMMY Music Educator Award Finalist, NAfME Jazz Council Chair, previous Indiana Jazz Educators Association President, and serves on the Jazz Education Network Board. Robinson is the Jazz Band Director for Noblesville Schools in Noblesville, Indiana, where since 2010, the program has expanded from one to six jazz bands, with the top jazz ensemble qualifying for the Essentially Ellington Jazz Festival in 2021 and 2022 and was awarded the 2023 ISSMA Honor Jazz Band for Indiana.

Robinson was the 2014 Indiana Jazz Educator of the Year, 2015 Noblesville Teacher of the Year, 2016 Indiana Teacher of the Year Semi-Finalist, named a 2022 Jazz Hero by the Jazz Journalists Association, and the 2023 Indiana Outstanding High School Music Educator of the Year. Robinson is a 2-time Lilly Teacher

Creativity Fellow, receiving grants to study jazz and culture in the US (2011) and Brazil (2019). Each spring, Robinson helps to lead Indiana Jazz Girls Day, hosting workshops and side-by-side concerts for students around Indiana to elevate student leaders through jazz.

Robinson was a keynote speaker for the 2021 Australia National Band and Orchestra Conference and a presenter at the 2021 Indiana Music Educator Association Conference, the 2022 International Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago, and the 2023 Oklahoma and New York State Band Conferences. Robinson is a clinician and adjudicator independently and for Jazz at Lincoln Center. As an avid performer on upright bass, electric bass, and vocals, Robinson has performed over the years at the Indy Jazz Fest, Indianapolis Jazz Kitchen, The Center for the Performing Arts, Carmel Jazz Fest, the Indianapolis Zoo Jazz Series, Zoobilation and Irish Fest with many artists including Everett Greene, Sarah Scharbrough, Katherine Nagy, and has opened for YAMAHA artist Dave Koz.



RICHARD L. SAUCEDO

Richard L. Saucedo (Fishers, Indiana) retired in 2013 as Director of Bands and Performing Arts Department Chairman at the William H. Duke Center for the Performing Arts at Carmel High School in Carmel, Indiana. During his 31-year tenure, Carmel bands received numerous state, regional, and national honors in concert, jazz, and marching bands. Under his direction, Carmel's Wind Symphony I performed at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival three times (1992, 1999, and 2004) and was named the Indiana State Champion Concert Band most recently in 2013. The group also performed at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago in December 2005. The Carmel Marching Greyhounds finished in the top ten at the Bands of America Grand National Championship for 17 years under Saucedo. They were named BOA National Champions in the fall of 2005. Carmel became one of the few schools to win a BOA National

Championship and perform at the Midwest Clinic in the same year in 2005. The Marching Band was the Indiana Class A State Champion four times. The Indiana Bandmasters Association named Saucedo Indiana's "Bandmaster of the Year" for 1998-99, and he was named the "Outstanding Music Educator" in Indiana for 2010 by the Indiana Music Educators Association. Saucedo was inducted into the Music for All "Hall of Fame" in 2015 and recently was inducted into the Drum Corps International "Hall of Fame" (2022).

Saucedo is a freelance arranger and composer. Along with his work at Hal Leonard Publishing, he is the music ensemble coordinator for the Blue Devils Drum and Bugle Corps in Concord, California. He is the Brass Arranger/Composer for the Cavaliers Drum and Bugle Corps in Rosemont, Illinois. Saucedo is an Educational Consultant for "Music for All" and "Bands of America." He is a Conn–Selmer Division of Education member and currently serves as the Chief Judge–Team Leader for Bands of America marching band competitions.





MATT SAVAGE

Matt Savage, graduate of the Crane School of Music in Potsdam, New York and The University of Southern California, has taught at every level of public education from elementary to the college level. Along with teaching in public education, Matt also has twenty-five years of playing and teaching experience in the marching percussion field. This experience includes playing snare drum with the legendary Bayonne Bridgemen and serving as percussion director and arranger for drum and bugle corps such as the Anaheim Velvet Knights, the Dutchboy of Kitchener, Ontario and the Canton Bluecoats. Stan Schoonover has been Music Director of the Fairfax Wind Symphony since its founding in 1999. His thirty-two-year career in public school education included all levels, along with eleven years as Music Supervisor for the Fairfax County (VA) Public Schools. Ensembles under his direction have appeared three times at the Mid-West Clinic, the National Concert Band Festival, and at fifteen VMEA In-Service Conferences. The John Phillip Sousa Foundation awarded the Sudler Silver Scroll to the Fairfax Wind Symphony in December 2019. Mr. Schoonover has been an Adjunct Instructor at James Madison University and is a member of the Music for All Educational Advisory Team, and the Midwest Clinic Advisory Committee.

Mr. Schoonover received degrees from Gettysburg College, and West Chester University. He is an active Past-President of the Virginia Band and Orchestras Directors Association [VBODA], and an elected member of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association.



SUSAN SMITH

Susan L. Smith, has taught general, choral, and instrumental music at the elementary through collegiate levels in Florida, Virginia, and Alabama and has served as an author, clinician, conductor, and adjudicator across the United States. She is currently an Assistant Professor of Music Education at Troy University and the Southern Division President Elect of the National Association of Music Education. She is the Past President of the Alabama Music Educators Association and the current faculty advisor for the Troy cNAfME Chapter. Smith is the current Chair of the NAfME Collegiate Advisory Council and a member of the Professional Development Committee. Her previous appointment was as Director of Bands at the Saint James School in Montgomery AL. The Saint James Band consistently received Superior ratings in Concert, Jazz and Marching Band events including the Alabama Music Performance Assessment, Smokey Mountain Music Festival,

Smith has presented clinics at many state, national, and regional NAfME conferences. DR. MALLORY THOMPSON

Dr. Mallory Thompson (Evanston, Illinois) is the Director of Bands, Professor of Music, and Coordinator of the Conducting Program and holds the John W. Beattie Chair of Music at Northwestern University. Thompson was named a Charles Deering McCormick Professor of Teaching Excellence (2003). As the third person in the university's history to hold the Director of Bands position, Thompson conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting, and administers all aspects of the band program. She has made five recordings with the Northwestern University Symphonic Wind Ensemble on the Summit Records label, available for streaming on Spotify and Apple Music. In addition to her teaching duties at Northwestern, Thompson has been the Artistic Director of the Northshore Concert Band since 2003.

Thompson received her B.M.E. and M.M. degrees from Northwestern University, where she studied conducting with John P. Paynter and trumpet with Vincent Cichowicz. Thompson received a D.M.A. from the Eastman School of Music, studying with Donald Hunsberger.

While maintaining an active schedule as a quest conductor, teacher, and lecturer throughout the United States and Canada, Thompson has had the privilege of teaching and conducting thousands of undergraduate and graduate students and professional educators. Thompson is especially proud of her 58 graduate conducting students and the hundreds of outstanding Symphonic Wind Ensemble members with whom she has enjoyed making music at Northwestern. Thompson treasures her relationship with the Wildcat Marching Band and is honored to preserve and grow Northwestern's legacy.



DR. EMILY THREINEN

Dr. Emily Threinen (Minneapolis, Minnesota) is an Associate Professor of Music and has served as Director of Bands at the School of Music of the University of Minnesota-Twin Cities since 2016. 

LARRY WILLIAMS

Larry Williams (Washington, D.C.) has distinguished himself as a multifaceted performing hornist, recording artist, teacher, and administrator. Williams is currently the Hornist of the Gateways Brass Collective and Principal Horn of the Black Pearl Chamber Orchestra, Piedmont Symphony Orchestra, American Studio Orchestra, and Colour of Music Festival Orchestra. Williams is also a member of the Sphinx Symphony Orchestra, Gateways Festival Orchestra, Lyric Brass Quintet, and Rooftop Wind Quintet. Williams has performed with The New World Symphony Orchestra, Baltimore Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony, and San Francisco Symphony. BRIAN WORSDALE

Brian Worsdale (Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania) is the music director of Three Rivers Young Peoples Orchestras and professor of conducting at Duquesne University. Born and raised in Brooklyn, Worsdale attended public schools, the Manhattan School of Music (MSM) Pre-College Division, and received formal music training as a trombone student of David Finlayson (member of the New York Philharmonic). Worsdale is a conducting protégé of the late Maestro Jonathan Strasser (formerly on faculty at the Manhattan School of Music). Worsdale continued his professional studies working with Larry Livingston (faculty at the University of Southern California) and Anthony Maiello (faculty of George Mason University) and has recently returned to MSM as the Pre-College Division Symphony Orchestra conductor.




About James W. Robinson Secondary School

Under Mr. Payne's leadership, the Millbrook Wind Ensemble has been invited to perform at the 2022 North Carolina Music Educators Association Conference, the 2023 President's Cup National Concert Band Festival, the 2024 University of South Carolina Band Clinic, and the 2024 Music for All National Concert Band Festival. The Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, and Jazz Ensemble have all earned numerous

Superior ratings at the North Carolina Music Performance Adjudication and the Marching Band has been named Grand Champions at multiple NCBA sanctioned marching band competitions.

Mr. Payne was previously named the 2021-2022 East Central District "Band Director of the Year" by his peers in Wake County, was a recipient of the 2022 ASBDA Ed Rooker Encore Award honoring outstanding young band directors in North Carolina, and was the 2017 Forsyth Education Association's High School Teacher of PROMISE (WSFCS First Year Teacher of the Year). He has also served as a guest conductor of the UNCG Summer Music Camp Gold Band.

Professionally Mr. Payne is a member of the National Association for Music Education, the North Carolina Music Educators Association, the North Carolina Bandmasters Association, and of Kappa Kappa Psi, the National Honorary Band Fraternity. Mr. Payne is the current chair of the Central Region Jazz Section, hosts Jazz MPA at Millbrook, and is currently serving as Secretary of the East Central District Band Association. In his free time, Mr. Payne is an avid golfer and enjoys spending time with his partner Kelsey and their four pets, Aja, Rosie, Sadie, and Stewart.

About Millbrook High School

Established in 1922, Millbrook High School is the oldest continually operated high school in the city of Raleigh and one of the oldest high schools in the Wake County Public School System, the largest school system in North Carolina. Millbrook presently gives over 2,400 students a comprehensive high school education through

its diverse educational programming daily on an A/B block schedule. In 2009, Millbrook was granted International Baccalaureate status by the North Carolina Board of Education.

About the Ensemble

Millbrook's band program dates back to the 1930s and has been led by sixteen different directors since its founding. Presently, the Millbrook Band program provides a comprehensive music education for slightly over one hundred students through seven different performing ensembles. During the school day, students participate in the Percussion Ensemble, Symphonic Band, or Wind Ensemble. After school, many students elect to participate in the extracurricular Marching Wildcats, Jazz Ensemble, Winter Percussion Ensemble, and Winter Guard. The band program also supports the state champion basketball teams at Millbrook with a student run pep band and provides the drama program with a musical pit for the annual spring musical.

Individual Millbrook students consistently earn placements in various auditionbased Honors Ensembles across the state. In the past school year, multiple students from Millbrook earned seats in the East Central All-District Band, the Central Region Jazz Band, the All-State Band, and the All-State Jazz Band. Students at Millbrook often regularly participate in the UNCW Honor Band, the UNCG Carolina Band Clinic, and the North Carolina Governor's School. Outside of school, students take advantage of many local musical opportunities including the Triangle Youth Philharmonic, the Triangle Youth Jazz Ensembles, and the Triangle Brass Bands.

The Millbrook Wind Ensemble is the premier performing instrumental ensemble at Millbrook. Consisting of 9th—12th grade students, this audition-only ensemble meets daily on a block schedule. Since 2013, the Wind Ensemble has earned only Superior Ratings at the North Carolina Central and East Central District Music Performance Adjudication, all while performing Level VI and Masterworks literature. The Millbrook Wind Ensemble performed as a featured group at the 2022 North Carolina Music Educators Association in-service conference and were gold medalists at the 2023 President's Cup National Concert Band Invitational in Washington DC. Earlier in 2024, they were one of two high school ensembles to perform at the University of South Carolina Band Clinic.



Mrs. Nguyen earned her BMA and MA from the University of Texas at Arlington and graduated cum laude and summa cum laude, respectively.



The Union Wind Ensemble is comprised of 57 of the finest student musicians at Union who attain membership in the ensemble by audition. This advanced band class meets one hour per day and focuses on developing musicianship through the study and performance of advanced level wind literature. All students enrolled in Wind Ensemble also perform with the marching band and serve as musical leaders of the band program. The Union band program has garnered numerous awards and honors during its sixteen-year history. They include performances at the 2023, 2016, and 2012 Music For All National Festivals; the 2021, 2016, 2012, and 2010 Washington State Music Educators State Conferences; the 2022 Northwest NAFME Conference in Bellevue, Washington; and the 2010 Midwest Clinic. John J. Mallon • Director of Bands



John J. Mallon is the director of bands at United High School. Mr. Mallon was born and raised in Chicago, Illinois and is a 1988 graduate of VanderCook College of Music in Chicago. Mr. Mallon is in his 36th year of teaching in Laredo Texas. He taught for two years at Martin High School and has been teaching at United High School for 34 years. Mr. Mallon is the fifth director in the illustrious history of the "Mighty Longhorn Band" dating back to 1965.

About United High School Band

Since Mr. Mallon's appointment as Director in 1995, the United High School Band has earned a total of 21 consecutive sweepstakes awards, and 25 consecutive first division marching awards. The marching band has advanced to the Area marching contest fourteen times, most recently in 2023. The wind ensemble under his direction participated at the Region and Area Honor band contest over the past 25 years. In 2018, the Wind Ensemble was named Region Honor band placing first and advancing to the Area Honor band contest and placing fifth.

Mr. Mallon became the director of bands in 1995 and is now in his 29th year as the Director of the "Mighty Longhorn Band." Mr. Mallon presently holds the office of TMEA Region 14 Band Division Chairman. Mr. Mallon was inducted into the International School Bandmaster Fraternity Phi Beta Mu Alpha Chapter in February of 2017. Mr. Mallon has been a member of the Texas Music Adjudicator's association since 2019.

Mr. Mallon was the 2019 United I.S.D Secondary Teacher of the Year, the first Fine Arts recipient of this honor in the history of the United Independent School District.

Mr. Mallon has been married to Deborah Mallon for 30 years and has two lovely daughters: Katherine, 29 and Kristen, 27.

In 2022, the Wind Ensemble placed first at the Area G Honor band contest advancing to the State Honor band contest for the 1st time and placing 21st out of 30 bands in the state in class 6A.

The United High School Band has advanced to the Texas State Marching contest four times and the Texas State Wind Ensemble Festival six times.

The United High School Wind Ensemble was selected as one of nearly 60 ensembles to participate in the 2020 and 2024 Music for All National Festival in Indianapolis.

About Walsh Band Program

Walsh Middle School is located in Round Rock, Texas, a city within the Greater Austin Metroplex. The band program serves more than 300 students, with seventh and eighth graders enrolled in one of four performing bands and sixth grade beginning band classes in a homogenous setting. The Walsh Honor Band was chosen to perform at the 75th Annual Midwest Clinic: International Band and Orchestra Conference in Chicago, IL in 2021. The Walsh Bands have been consistent UIL Sweepstakes winners and have been well-represented at the TMEA All-Region Band and Region Orchestra auditions. The Walsh Band has earned distinction as a National Winner in the Foundation for Music Education's Mark of Excellence Competition consistently since 2018. In 2019, the Walsh Middle School Honor Band was a finalist in the TMEA Class CCC Honor Band contest. In 2018, the Walsh percussion ensemble was featured at the Percussive Arts Society International Convention as the middle school division winner of the International Percussion Ensemble Competition. The Walsh program prides itself on providing a variety of music making opportunities. In addition to the traditional concert band format, students have numerous opportunities to participate in small and large chamber ensembles and solo recitals throughout the year. Throughout the year, students participate in multiple mentoring programs including student-led rehearsals, sectionals, and tutoring of younger students. Through the dedicated work of many individuals, the program has built a tradition of excellence that has flourished within the school and community.
