



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








WELCOME FROM THE CHAIRMAN

ABOUT GRAND NATIONALS

Music for All's Bands of America Grand National Championships, presented by Yamaha, is America's premier national marching band event.

First and foremost, Grand Nationals is an educational performance opportunity. An expert panel of adjudicators not only rank and rate each band, they also provide commentary that participating band directors can use to bring their music program to the next level. Grand Nationals is also a spectacular music and pageantry event, one that band fans from across the nation and around the world travel to for the exciting and creative performances.

Music for All was founded in 1975 as "Marching Bands of America." Our first event, the 1976 Summer Workshop/Festival, was held at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, and included the Summer National Championship for marching bands in UWW's famed Warhawk Stadium.


The first fall Grand National Championship was held in 1980 at the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Florida. Marching Bands of America became Bands of America in 1984, which was also the first year Grand Nationals was held in the newly opened Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. Bands of America held the first marching event in Lucas Oil Stadium in fall 2008 with a special early season "Sound Check," followed that fall by the Indianapolis Super Regional and the Grand National Championships.


Grand National Championship Venues have included the Gator Bowl (1980), East Tennessee State University (1981–1983), the Hoosier Dome (1984–1986, 1989–2007), Pontiac Silverdome (1987–1988), and Lucas Oil Stadium (2008-present).




113 bands with 17,000 students representing 20 states will compete. Grand Nationals includes an Expo on the concourse and special events like the Future Music Educators' Experience and the IPS School Music Showcase. This year, we have exhibition performances by outstanding marching bands from The Ohio State

University, University of Michigan, Missouri State University, and special guests from United Sound.


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


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DUR AUDIENCE:

The commentary offered by the Bands of America judges provides educators and students with comments and meaningful assessment — much more than simply selecting a winner or placement. The commentary provides information on how directors and students are doing and what they need to do to improve. Each judge has a slightly different responsibility in this, but all point to the same mission: to create, provide, and expand positively life-changing experiences. Your applause, your encouragement, and your standing ovations will make this an unforgettable experience for the thousands of young people performing today.

THE VALUE OF COMPETITION

Competition is woven into the very fabric of America and has helped to foster the development of the strongest nation on Earth. Bands of America and Music for All believe that competing is a great motivator and provides amazing opportunities for learning life lessons. The essence of competition is in the striving for performance excellence and being held accountable for learning. If the focus is on the learning, the competitive climate will be a source extremely valuable in life. On the other hand, the negativity associated with "winning at all costs" will be a detriment to personal growth. Winning is certainly a monumental benchmark, as is any measurement in the competitive arena. Performing your very best in competition is also a benchmark, as is competing with the very best programs. By choosing to participate in competition, individuals and groups have already "won" simply by being highly motivated.

The competitive arena provides a very precious opportunity to practice quality sportsmanship and sincere appreciation for the hard work of others. It also is the place where the very best models in our activity can be displayed and celebrated. All performers need models to demonstrate possibility at the highest levels of performance and artistry. IMPORTANT EVENT REMINDERS

Music is designed for all the senses. For everyone to fully enjoy the performances, we ask that you please adhere to the following. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

- Please turn off or silence all cell phones, pagers, watches, and other personal electronic devices.
- Video or audio recording is not permitted in the stadium without the express written permission of Music for All.
- Do not leave or return to your seat during performances.
- Keep all aisles clear. Please do not enter or exit the seating area or move within the seating area during performances. Respect the performers and your fellow spectators.
- Please do not carry on conversations during performances or talk in a manner that disturbs your neighbors.
- No smoking in the stadium.
- Anyone exhibiting inappropriate behavior that disturbs the performances or the enjoyment of those around them may be asked to leave the stadium at the discretion of the contest director.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Who can enroll in Bands of America events?

Enrollment is open to all high school bands on a first-come, first-served basis.

How is performance order determined?

Preliminary performance times are scheduled based on a random draw. Applications received and paid for on or before January 31 are eligible for the initial draw, after which performance times are based on postmark of application, with earlier postmarks receiving the later performance times. The previous year's Grand National Champion has the option to choose its Prelims performance time. Semi-Finals and Finals performances are scheduled by a random pre-draw by a representative from each band on site.

How is classification determined?

Classification in Bands of America Championships is determined by school enrollment, grades 10–12: Class A -600 students and fewer, Class AA -601–1325, Class AAA -1326–1850, and Class AAAA -1851 and above. Each band declares its school's 10th–12th grade enrollment on the event application. A school administrator must certify enrollment and consider all those students in the 10th–12th grade population, utilizing the numbers used in reporting enrollment for state funding. Classifications are examined and reset every three years by a procedure that considers the composition of Bands of America Championship participation using three years of data. The current classification began fall 2022 and the next reclassification will occur effective fall 2025.

Why are classifications by school enrollment?

The Bands of America classification system is designed to separate participating bands into recognition groups, where the bands in "class" competition with each other have the same size general student population base from which to draw.

Why aren't the classifications announced?

Appreciation of arts requires subjective reactions. We do not announce or publish band classifications, before or during events. Our intention is to not draw attention to classification, so as to eliminate expectations of a band's performance based on class, including those of the judges.

What are the Division Ratings?

A division rating of I, II, III or IV is awarded to each band based on preliminary performances, with a division rating of "I" awarded to the highest scoring range. Consistent with other scholastic measures of educational achievement, BOA's rating system intends to provide a summary measure of achievement and the participants' progress towards achieving excellence. The ratings system in no way affects the judges' adjudication process.

How are finalist and semi-finalist bands selected?

The top 12 scoring bands regardless of class are invited to perform in Grand National Finals. If a Class Champion is not

among the highest scoring bands advancing to Finals, they will be invited to perform at Finals in exhibition. See the Semi-Finals Schedule page for a detailed description of selection of Grand National Semi-Finalists.

What are the judges looking for?

Bands receive recorded evaluation from each judge. The emphasis is on the input the judge offers to the band's program. It is the position of Bands of America that music is the more important aspect of the performance, with marching as the presentation and visual enhancement of the program. Likewise, greater emphasis is placed on general effect than on fine-line perfection of the performance. The weight of the numbers places 60% of the value on music and 40% on visual, as well as 60% on general effect and 40% on performance. Each judge is assigned a specific area on which they focus: ensemble and general effect judges are located at a vantage point from above (e.g., press box), and individual performance judges are located on the field. Who are the Bands of America Adjudicators?

Bands of America judges are well-established experts in the music education, marching, and pageantry fields, with their educational philosophy and background taken into consideration as much as their career accomplishments. Panel assignments are made by the Judge Administration Team and are reviewed by Music for All executive management. Before any assignments are made, each potential judge must complete an "affiliation form," listing all bands with which they have any kind of relationship. This enables Music for All to create BOA judging panels whose members are unaffiliated with any of the participating bands.

Is electronic recording allowed in the stadium?

No video or audio recording is permitted in the stadium without the express written permission of Music for All, in advance of the event.

Camera Policy: Any still camera (making film or digital still pictures) is allowed into and may be used from the spectator seating area of any venue, as long as it does not interfere with or disrupt the viewing experience of any other spectator. Family, friends, and fans may take still photos of BOA events for personal use only. The images may not be sold or otherwise distributed without the written permission of Music for All. Cameras (of any kind) may not be used on the field. People with field passes or name badges must go into the stands to take digital or film pictures. Tripods or other similar equipment that obstruct the view or path of travel of others in seating areas are not allowed.

SCORE POINT BREAKDOWN





CONSIDER A CAREER IN MUSIC

Did you know that nationally, 673,656 businesses are involved in the creation or distribution of the arts, and they employ 3.48 million people? The good news is that this career field is growing exponentially with career opportunities that include creating and performing music. Music is an exceptionally dynamic industry that demands a combination of creativity, technical expertise, organizational skills, and teamwork and there is a high demand for individuals with exactly these types of experiences and qualifications.

For those so inclined, teaching music in schools and being a resource for music learning in a community continues to be one of the most rewarding and sustainable career choices for musicians. Music educators are musical leaders in their communities; many will attend higher education to earn required teaching certifications. Others gain teaching credentials along the way as active musicians, leading to a creative life as the joy and impact of musicmaking is shared with others. A recent survey by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) found extremely high job satisfaction for K-12 music educators, regardless of where, what or which grade levels they teach. Simply stated, music teachers love what they do and those students graduating college with teacher credentials in music education experience a 100% placement rate! Communication

Marching Band members must communicate effectively, both verbally and non-verbally, to coordinate movements and maintain synchronization during performances.

Teamwork

Success in a music ensemble relies on members working harmoniously toward a common goal, fostering collaboration and mutual dependence.

Adaptability

Music students learn to adapt to changing environments, routines, or music, enhancing their flexibility and ability to perform under pressure.

Problem-Solving

Music students face unexpected challenges during performances, such as equipment issues or timing errors, which they learn to solve in real time.

Leadership

Leadership opportunities, such as being a section leader or drum major, teach individuals how to guide and motivate others.

Emotional Intelligence

Working closely with peers helps young musicians develop empathy and emotional management, key elements of emotional intelligence.

Time Management

The demanding schedule of practice and performances helps music students learn to balance multiple responsibilities.

From 1997–2005 John was Associate Band Director at L.D. Bell High School. A two-time winner of the District's Award of Excellence, his groups were Texas State Marching Champions, PASIC National Drumline Champions, Sudler Shield recipients and medaled over 25 times at BOA Regionals, Super-Regionals, and Grand Nationals. His percussionists performed at PASIC, Midwest, TMEA & TBA. John was a coordinator for Yamaha's Sounds Of Summer program, instructed MFA Summer Symposiums, National Festivals, Honor Bands and the first BOA Tournament Of Roses Band, chaired the UIL Percussion Committee, was TMEA All-State Music Selector, PASIC 2000 committee member and helped produce MTV's Super Bowl XXXVIII halftime show.

In 2005 John began a career in gemology. An ongoing consultant for diamond producers, sellers, and grading laboratories around the world, he's given seminars in Hong Kong, Beijing, Shanghai, Antwerp and locations across the USA for IGI, the American Gem Society, Jewelers of America, JCK Las Vegas, Women's Jewelry Association and Gemological Institute of America Alumni Association, among others.

DAN POTTER



An award-winning journalist and radio host, Dan Potter has been involved in marching band and drum corps for over 40 years. He is an announcer and media personality for Bands of America and Drum Corps International and is also the host of popular marching arts podcasts, including BOA's "Break Ranks!"

Dan was a drum major in both high school marching band and drum corps. He has also instructed high school bands in Indiana, Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas. He is a member of the Board of Directors of Zephyrus Performing Arts, the parent organization of Zephyrus Drum and Bugle Corps and Zephyrus Independent World WGI Guard in Tulsa.

Dan is a veteran journalist, radio personality, and host of the KRMG Morning News with Dan Potter at KRMG Radio in Tulsa.

In his decades covering news in Texas and Oklahoma, Dan has witnessed many historic events first-hand, including a presidential inauguration, political conventions, and too many tornadoes to count. He is the recipient of numerous broadcast journalism awards, including the Radio Television News Directors Association's Edward R. Murrow award for best radio newscast in the US and the DuPont-Columbia University Silver Baton for excellence in broadcast journalism. In 2015 and 2020, Dan received the National Association of Broadcasters' Marconi Award for Medium Market Personality of the Year.

Every November, right after BOA Grand Nationals, Dan hosts "Stories of Light," a three day radiothon in Tulsa that has become the largest annual revenue source for Make A Wish Oklahoma, raising over \$4,000,000 for the charity. In 2021, Make A Wish Oklahoma named its annual volunteer of the year recognition, the Dan Potter Community Service Award.

MARK AND KATHLEEN MENG

2024 RECIPIENTS

Though the last of Mark and Kathleen Meng's children have already graduated from the Blue Springs Band program, you wouldn't know it. With the Mengs' continued support, the Blue Springs Band is forever indebted not only to their dedication to volunteering but also the great human beings they are on and off the field.

Mark is instrumental in overseeing prop construction, the prop team, and driving the truck. Often called the "dream maker," Mark makes the impossible possible. Mark also coordinates the setting up and moving of props for rehearsals, games, and performances and works to make sure every volunteer understands their role. Mark also leads training sessions for parents about how to provide information to students and best encourage them before performances.

Blue Springs Director Tim Allshouse shared a story in which he found Mark sanding props — Mark worried they were too rough and wanted to make sure the students' hands wouldn't get scratched. When asked if someone had raised the issue to him, he replied, "No. My job is to think about all the 'what ifs' so you don't have to worry about them. By the way, I built this ramp too, to make it easier to go over the curb."

Mark is described as being able to uniquely balance the skills of a fearless leader with compassion, ingenuity, and the ability to unite volunteers from various backgrounds to come together for a common goal.

Dr. Kathleen Meng serves as the band's physician, traveling with the band for every event, prepared to treat anything and everything for band and staff members. Dr. Meng's calm and caring demeanor has helped countless kids over the years... often with non-band related



issues but with life's issues. Kathleen also serves as a band photographer, organizes the band's senior night reception, and creates decorative photo buttons for senior families for free.

In 2020, Dr. Meng used her knowledge and contacts at Johnson & Johnson to offer guidance to keep students safe while finding a way for Blue Springs to keep doing band. Dr. Meng spent countless hours researching the relationship between Covid and wind instruments. Dr. Meng provided daily recommendations and provided PPE for band members. All while balancing her practice and taking care of her own family while the world was living in such uncertainty.

The Mengs model the idea that we are all stronger together. It is common for Kathleen to be found in the equipment truck helping Mark move equipment, or for Mark to be holding a cold compress to a students' head while Kathleen provides medical attention. They show the students that everyone's role is important, and anybody can help anybody. They continue to serve with

In 1992, Grapentine hosted the first National Concert Band Festival and has been the Master of Ceremonies at almost all of the Music for All National Festivals. An alumnus of the University of Michigan School of Music, he has been the "stadium voice" of the University of Michigan Marching Band since 1970 and game announcer in Michigan Stadium since 2005. Grapentine's 46-year career in classical music radio included hosting the Morning Program on Chicago's classical music station and as the morning host for the classical music station in Detroit. He also presented pre-concert lectures for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. As a church music director, he is an accomplished singer and conductor and has performed the national anthem at numerous professional and collegiate sporting events.



NOLA JONES

Nola Jones currently serves on the Chief Judge Team for Bands of America and is the Division Coordinator for the Sweetwater Director Academy at the BOA Summer Camp. Jones maintains an active schedule as a guest speaker, conductor, adjudicator, clinician, and program evaluator. She has appeared nationally in 43 of the United States and internationally in Canada, Japan, the Netherlands, and Singapore. She was the Director of Visual and Performing Arts for Metropolitan Nashville Public Schools and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Tennessee Music Education Association. She has been a featured presenter for the Midwest Clinic, NAMM Music Education Days, the National Association for Music Education, and Save the Music Foundation. Jay Webb recently retired as the Director of Bands at Avon High School after 29 years, and currently serves as an adjudicator for Bands of America. Webb also led the Avon Band as they won the Sudler Shield in 2007, performed in the Tournament of Roses parade in 2012, and performed at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in 2015. 

They have appeared in the Super Dome for the New Orleans Saints, in the TransWorld Dome for the St. Louis Rams, at Arrowhead Stadium for the Kansas City Chiefs, and at Mile High Stadium for the Denver Broncos. In December 2005 the Pride Band traveled to London, England. In addition to being the honor band in the London New Year's Day parade, the group also performed at St. Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Central Hall.

ABOUT THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

The Ohio State University Marching Band performs for all home football games, selected away games, postseason bowl games and additional events during the autumn semester. The nationally recognized, 228-piece "Pride of the Buckeyes" is one of the few college all-brassand-percussion bands in the U.S. and is acknowledged as the largest of its type in the world.

Many marching band innovations were first tried and developed at Ohio State. Among them are floating and animated formations, measured-step marching, script writing, the fast cadence with a high knee lift, and the enhancement of rehearsals and performances through the implementation of new technologies. Brass instruments especially designed for marching bands were also first used at Ohio State. In 2013, the band garnered national attention for using iPads, a sustainable alternative to paper charts and music, to facilitate its rehearsal process.

More recently, the band cheered the Buckeyes on to victory at the first-ever College Football Playoff National Championship game in January 2015, took its talents abroad in October 2015 for a performance at an NFL International Series game at Wembley Stadium in London, performed at Fiesta Bowls to conclude the 2015, 2016 and 2019 seasons and at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic to conclude the 2017 season. The band also marched in the 2018 Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City along with the 2019 and 2022 Rose Parade and Rose Bowl Game in California.

Grounded in tradition yet propelled by innovation, The Ohio State University Marching Band, year in and year out, lives up to its nickname: The Best Damn Band in the Land.

ABOUT MICHIGAN MARCHING BAND

From its origins as a grassroots student effort in the Fall of 1896, the University of Michigan Marching Band (MMB) emerged as one of the greatest college traditions in the country. The MMB is a beloved staple of athletic events at the University of Michigan, performing "The Victors" for millions of excited spectators each week. Using new technologies, innovative halftime show concepts, and a willingness to take risks, the MMB continues to make headlines and set trends.

The Michigan Marching Band is comprised of students from every College and all three campuses at the University of Michigan. Today's MMB has evolved from its original membership of 22 players in 1896 to averaging 400 members annually. MMB alumni number in the tens of thousands and can be found all over the globe.

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

MARCHING MIZZOU DRUMLINE

The Southeastern Conference has long been known for fielding many of the finest marching bands at the collegiate level, and the University of Missouri, one of the leading educational and research institutions in the world, is no exception.

Marching Mizzou, also known as the "Big'M' of the Midwest," has grown over its 139-year history to become the most visible ensemble in the School of Music under the College of Arts and Science. Although many of its core members are music majors, Marching Mizzou boasts an even higher number of students representing nearly every discipline across campus. On average 84% of the membership in Marching Mizzou consists of non-music majors, representing over 75 different majors within nearly every college at Mizzou. Whether you are pursuing a degree in the College of Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources, Arts and Science, Business, Engineering, Education and Human Development, Health Sciences, or Journalism, there is a place for you in Marching Mizzou.

Marching Mizzou advances into its second century with a time-honored tradition of excellence that combines quality musicianship, spirit, and pride to create their internationally renowned level of performance that blends the great traditions of the University of Missouri with the modern collegiate marching arts styles of today. With powerful music, creative and viral show designs, and a marching style that is clean, precise, guick moving, and entertaining, Marching Mizzou continues to captivate audiences of all ages at football games, parades, and performances both domestic and abroad, rightfully taking its place among the nation's oldest and finest university band programs.

In addition to performances across Missouri and the United States, Marching Mizzou has performed at the 2012 and 2016 St. Patrick's Festival Parade in Dublin, Ireland. While in Ireland, Marching Mizzou also performed in the Limerick International Marching Band Festival and Competition where they were distinguished as the International Band Champions. Marching Mizzou planned to return to Ireland this March for both the 2020 St. Patrick's Festival Parade and Limerick International Marching Band Festival and Competition until the COVID-19 pandemic forced the postponement, then cancellation

of the trip in 2021. This past March 2024, Marching Mizzou returned to Ireland after earning yet another invitation to perform in the St. Patrick's Festival Parade in Dublin. After their performance in Dublin, Marching Mizzou was named "Best Overall Band" of the parade out of 14 bands from Ireland, France, and the United States.

In September of 2021, by invitation of Governor Mike Parson, Marching Mizzou represented the State of Missouri in the Bicentennial Inaugural Parade, showcasing 200 years of Missouri history in Jefferson City, MO. In April of 2021 Marching Mizzou earned an invitation to perform in the 96th Annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York, New York in November of 2022, where we led the parade and was featured in the Opening Number alongside Lea Michele and the Cast of Funny Girl.

Our 2024 Exhibition Show Theme is "Jungle Beats" featuring a series of our traditional drumline cadences from the University of Missouri.

The 2 highest scoring Bands from each of the four classes, from each Prelims, should they not already be among the Bands selected based on the criteria above, shall perform after the initial 30 numbered performance spots according to the Semi-Finals predraw that took place at Band Check-In.

In the event a single Class A or single Class AA Band is included in the "next 8" Performance slots (positions 1–8), that/those Band(s) will perform after the 22 "middle of Semi-Finals" performance slots, according to the Semi-Finals pre-draw that took place at Band Check-In.














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



Chip was also a featured musician on the Grammy-nominated "Celebration of Life" with Little Joe Y La Familia. Additional recordings include performances with the University of Texas Wind Ensemble, University of Texas Jazz Orchestra, Penn State Centre Dimensions and East Carolina Jazz Ensemble "A". Dr. Crotts has also been a featured soloist in some of the world's premier musical venues, including Birdland, Blues Alley, Blue Note, Hollywood Bowl and Carnegie Hall.

As an educator and clinician, Dr. Crotts presents clinics nationally on Brass Pedagogy, Jazz Pedagogy, Breathing for Wind Players and Versatility in Performance. Currently, Dr. Crotts serves as Vice-President of the Georgia Association of Jazz Educators, as well as being a member of NAfME, the American Federation of Musicians, the Jazz Education Network and The International Trumpet Guild. He is a past fellowship recipient from the Aspen Music Festival and Music at the Banff Centre (Canada), as well as a grant recipient from the National Endowment for the Arts, Georgia Tech Foundation, and recent selection as a Georgia Tech "Class of 1969 Teaching Fellow".

Highly involved in the Marching Arts, Dr. Crotts has served as a brass instructor with Spirit of Atlanta, Phantom Regiment, The Cavaliers, Santa Clara Vanguard and is presently Brass Caption Head for the 19-time World Champion, Blue Devils. Chip is active as a clinician and adjudicator and has served in this capacity with organizations such as Bands of America, Drum Corps International, Drum Corps Japan, DCI Taiwan Marching Academy, Winter Guard International, and numerous state and national music educator associations.

Dr. Crotts received his undergraduate degree in Music Business from East Carolina University, a Master of Music in Orchestral Performance from Penn State University, as well as the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Trumpet Performance with a Jazz Emphasis from the University of Texas at Austin. His primary teachers include Ray Sasaki, Ray Crisara, John Daniel and Tom Huener, including additional studies with Boyde Hood and Roger Ingram.

Previously, Chip served on the faculties of Samford University, Jacksonville State University and The University of Texas at Austin. Dr. Crotts resides in Acworth, GA with his wife Kelly and daughter Abigail.

Dillon holds a bachelor's degree in Fine Arts and Education from York University in Toronto, Canada, and

a master's degree in Jazz Performance/Pedagogy from The University of Miami (FL). Dillon is the former Director of Bands at Elizabeth High School in New Jersey. He has been awarded the State of New Jersey Governor's Teacher Recognition Award, and most recently was named the New Jersey Outstanding Jazz Educator for 2021. The Elizabeth High School marching band earned ten state championships, and the symphonic and jazz bands achieved consistent superior ratings during Dillon's tenure. He currently provides clinics for schools and organizations on a variety of topics including performance, leadership, mindset coaching, rehearsal management, and show design. He has conducted clinics in Japan, South America,

Canada, and the United States. Dillon is currently the Chief Judge of the winds division of Winter Guard International. His responsibilities include directing the Marching Band (17 years), Wind Ensemble, Jazz Ensemble, and Percussion Ensemble as well as teaching AP Music Theory. The MTHS Marching Band was crowned New Jersey State Champions in 2013, and they were selected to represent New Jersey at the 75th anniversary of Pearl Harbor in 2016. In addition, the MTHS Wind Ensemble has received multiple gold ratings, and they have been selected to perform at Carnegie Hall, the NJ Performing Arts Center, and the NJ State Band Gala. The MTHS Percussion Ensemble has performed at the All-Eastern and New Jersey Music Educators Association conferences. They have also been Winter Guard International (WGI) Power East Regional Champions.

Hoskins recently retired as Director of Bands at Wheeler High School in Marietta,

Georgia, after 19 years and his 25th year of service in the Cobb County (Georgia) School District. He oversaw the entire band program, consisting of three concert bands, marching band, jazz ensemble, jazz combo, woodwind and brass choirs, winter quard, and percussion ensembles. He was the founder and director of the District 12 Honor Jazz Ensemble, created in 2018. A graduate of East Tennessee State University (ETSU), he is in constant demand as an adjudicator, clinician, and conductor in the marching band, jazz, and concert band arena. His program at Wheeler was regionally and nationally recognized in those fields as well, consistently receiving superior ratings and best-in-class awards. While at ETSU, Hoskins had the opportunity to perform with many of the jazz greats of our time, including Jon Faddis, Ed Shaughnessy, Allen Vizzutti, Dick Oatts of Flim & The BB's, and Ernie Watts. He is a music and brass adjudicator for both Bands of America and Drum Corps International, as well as a member of Phi Beta Mu Honor Music Society (2020), the Georgia Music Educators Association, National Association for Music Education, Jazz Education Network, and a founding member of the Minority Band Directors National Association. Kennedy's career encompasses varied and successful experiences as a composer, arranger,

producer, performer, educator, and administrative leader. He is Vice President for Academic Affairs/Vice Provost at Berklee College of Music in Boston. Kennedy received his Ph.D. from Boston College, and Master of Music and Bachelor of Music Education degrees from Northwestern University. Mr. Kennedy has composed, arranged, and produced music for hundreds of television and radio commercials, for which he has received numerous awards. His music has also been heard in feature films, including Wayne's World, Electric Horseman, Fast Break, and Lethal Weapon 2; and in a variety of television series, including One Tree Hill, Judging Amy, and Felicity. A veteran of the recording industry, Mr. Kennedy has written and produced music for Sheryl Crow, Siedah Garrett, James Ingram, Patti Austin, Little Richard, Stanley Clarke, Brenda Russell, Dave Grusin, and Singers Unlimited. Mr. Kennedy was a Grammy Award finalist in 2002 for arrangements on the recording of "Virtuosi" by Gary Burton and Makoto Ozone. His published compositions include works for concert band, percussion ensemble, and marching band. Mr. Kennedy has been an active adjudicator for marching band, drum corps, and indoor percussion competitions for over 30 years, and has written for several drum and bugle corps. He has also composed the themes for the Drum Corps International (DCI) championship broadcasts and DVDs. He was elected to the DCI Hall of Fame in 2007 for longtime contributions as an adjudicator, judge administrator, arranger, and composer.



MARK MCGAHEY Keller, Texas

McGahey is in his 34th year as a music educator. He has been Director of Bands at Keller High

School in Keller, Texas for 25 years. He also directed bands at South Grand Prairie High School in Grand Prairie, Texas, and Shawnee High School in Shawnee, Oklahoma.

Bands under his direction have enjoyed notable success, including the following honors while at Keller High School: Eight-time National Winner of the Mark of Excellence National Wind Band Honors Contest, Bands of America Super Regional Finalist, Area Finalist in the TMEA Honor Band Competition, First Runner-Up at the 1999 4A Texas State Marching Contest, and named the 2000 4A State Honor Band in Texas. The Keller Band has been a participant at the Texas 6A University Interscholastic League State Marching Contest in all eligible years from 2006 to 2021 and placed as a finalist four of those years.

McGahey is an active clinician and guest lecturer in many states including Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, Missouri, Florida, Illinois, and Ohio. He is an adjudicator nationwide, most notably with Drum Corps International (DCI) and Bands of America (BOA). McGahey has judged at DCI World Championships from 2013 to 2019, and he recently adjudicated at the Bands of America Grand National Championships. Under his direction, they were a six-time national finalist at the Bands of America Grand National Championships, being named the 2004 Bands of America AAA National Champion" and a four-time Regional Champion in Bands of America events. In December of 2003, the John Philip Sousa Foundation presented the Kennesaw Mountain High School Band the prestigious "Sudler Shield of Excellence" for outstanding achievement in marching band. In 2005, the band appeared in the 79th Annual Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City. The Kennesaw Mountain High School Wind Symphony performed at the 60th Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic held in Chicago, Illinois in December of 2006.

Mr. Starnes is sought out nationally and internationally as an adjudicator, clinician, guest conductor, and creative designer. In 2016, he was appointed a member of the John Philip Sousa Foundation's Sudler Shield Jury. From 2013–2018, he served as Design Advisor for Carolina Crown Drum and Bugle Corps, during which time the corps won the DCI World Championship and received the silver and bronze medals four times. Mr. Starnes served as the founding Board Chairman for United Sound, a nationally recognized special needs music education program from 2014–2017. Throughout his career, he has adjudicated for several state, national, and international organizations including Bands of America, Winter Guard International, and Drum Corps International from 1994 to the present. Additionally, he serves as an Education Consultant at Music for All in Indianapolis, Indiana. While fulfilling this role, his duties include serving as the program director for The Honor Band of America, who appeared in the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California 2005, 2009, 2013, 2017, and will again in 2022. Mr. Starnes was inducted into the Bands of America Hall of Fame as a member of the Class of 2019.

As a native of Chattanooga, Tennessee, Mr. Starnes graduated magna cum laude from The University of Tennessee, Knoxville in 1988. He and his wife, Rhea Jeanne Starnes, who is a practicing architect, reside in Acworth, Georgia. His daughter, Hannah, works as an Interior Designer in Royal Oak, Michigan.
