

In 2025, Music for All celebrates a monumental milestone: its 50th anniversary and that of its flagship program, Bands of America. What began in 1975 as a small but ambitious organization called Marching Bands of America (MBA) has grown into one of the most influential forces in music education, touching the lives of millions of students, educators, and families across the nation.

I came to work for Bands of America in the northwest Chicago suburbs in 1985, just out of college. We ran a single digit number of Bands of America Regional Championships, a two-day Grand National Championship, and two-week-long summer camps for marching band students and band directors – one in Whitewater, Wisconsin and one is San Marcos, Texas. I was not thinking at the time of what my future of the organization might be, but it turned out to be my life's work.

/ The Early Days: Marching Bands of America

Founded in 1975, Marching Bands of America was created with a singular vision: to elevate the artistry and performance of high school marching bands. Founded by Larry McCormick, it was a program of McCormick's Enterprises. The organization quickly gained recognition for its innovative approach to competitions, emphasizing not only technical precision but also creativity, showmanship, and the transformative power of music. By the early 1980s, MBA had become a "bandroom" name in the marching arts community, hosting regional and national competitions that set the standard for excellence.

In 1984, the organization completely separated from its parent company, with new leadership and staff, rebranded as Bands of America (BOA), and became a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, solidifying its commitment to serving students and educators.



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This transition marked a turning point, as BOA expanded its reach and influence, the name change opening the possibilities of serving all aspects of band programs. The annual Bands of America Grand National Championships, held in Indianapolis, became a three-day pinnacle event for high school marching bands, drawing thousands of participants and spectators from across the country. Bands of America launched the National Concert Band Festival in 1992, with guidance from luminaries including Dr. William D. Revelli, John P. Paynter, Gary Green, Richard Crain, and many others, inspired by the National Band Contest of the 1930s, which Revelli's Hobart High School, Indiana, bands won several times. During this time, Bands of America also added programming for orchestras, at the National Festival and for students at its summer camp.

Major Events and Programs Over the years, Music for All has become synonymous with world-class events that celebrate and support music education. The Bands of America Grand National Championships remain the crown jewel of the organization, showcasing the best high school marching bands in the nation in a multi-day spectacle of artistry and performance. Regional BOA Championships provide opportunities for bands to compete and grow, while the Bands of America Summer Camp offers students and educators a week-long immersion in music, leadership, and personal development. well-rounded education that prepares students for success in all areas of life. Through its collaborations as part of the TeachMusic Coalition, Music Education Alliance, SupportMusic, and other leading national music and arts educational organizations, Music for takes an active role in ensuring students across America have access to active music-making in their scholastic environment.

Looking Ahead As Music for All enters its next 50 years, the organization remains committed to its mission of creating, providing, and expanding positively life-changing experiences through music for all. A New Era: The Music for All Merger In 2003, Bands of America merged with the Music for All Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to advocating for and supporting music education in schools. This merger created a unified entity under the name Music for All, combining BOA's expertise in marching band events with the Music for All Foundation's broader mission of ensuring access to music education for all students.

The Music for All Foundation had long been a champion of music education, working to address the challenges faced by schools, such as budget cuts and inequitable access to resources. Through research, advocacy, and community engagement, the foundation highlighted the critical role of music in fostering creativity, discipline, and emotional well-being in students. The merger allowed Music for All to expand its impact, offering a comprehensive suite of programs for school instrumental music programs under an umbrella Music for All hosts the Music for All National Festival, which brings together outstanding concert bands, orchestras, and percussion ensembles for a non-competitive celebration of excellence. The festival emphasizes collaboration, learning, and the joy of making music, reflecting Music for All's belief that music education is about more than competition—it's about building community, enriching lives, and perpetuating a life-long love of music.

The Importance of Music for All

As Music for All celebrates its 50th anniversary, its impact on music education is undeniable. The organization has played a pivotal role in advocating for the arts, providing opportunities for students to grow as musicians and leaders, and supporting educators in their mission to inspire the next generation. Music education is workforce development. Through its programs, Music for All demonstrates that music is a vital part of a community, Music for All will continue to inspire, educate, and advocate, ensuring that music remains a vital part of our culture and our schools. As I enter my 41st year as part of the Music for All team of staff, I am happy to serve in a leadership role that allows me to continue to be part of this important work.

The 50th anniversary of Music for All and Bands of America is a testament to the power of music to bring people together, to inspire greatness, and to change lives. Here's to the next 50 years of excellence, innovation, and impact in music education!





Bands of America is a program of Music for All, whose mission is to create, provide, and expand positively life-changing experiences through music. **Bands of America** Championships, presented by Yamaha, provide opportunities to perform in the finest venues, receive quality evaluation, and to observe other bands, all in a positive, affirming, and celebratory atmosphere.

What Bands Receive:

- The best in adjudication and feedback from a national panel.
- · Participation recognition and achievement awards.
- Participating band students are admitted free to watch Prelims and Finals. (Excluding Grand Nationals Finals which is reserved seating only.)
- Prelims and Finals format with 12 band Finals at Regionals and Grand Nationals, 14 band Finals for Super Regionals.
- Complimentary school administrator tickets.
- Event credentials for adults and staff working with the band (defined quantity).
- Educational video of your performances (streaming access for directors).

How to Register:

- All high school bands are eligible to enroll in Bands of America Championships.
- All events are open on a first-come, first served basis.
- Bands may choose competitive or Input Only participation.
- Applications must be signed by both the director and the school principal or superintendent and must be accompanied by the registration fee to be considered a complete registration. An unfulfilled purchase order is NOT considered payment.
- Register by January 31, 2025 to be eligible for the initial draw for preliminary performance times. Completing a registration in December or early January does not provide any advantage, as those registrations will be among those eligible for the random draw for performance times for those registered by January 31. All complete registrations postmarked after January 31 will be placed in the prelim schedule at earlier performance times than all bands that complete registration by January 31. If the requested show is already at capacity after January 31, a band will be placed on the wait list or encouraged to consider a different Bands of America Championship. Please review the cancellation policy prior to completing your registration.

- All one-day Regionals enrollment fee is \$875.
- Super Regional Championship enrollment fee is \$925.
- Grand National enrollment fee is \$975.

Music for All Philosophy Statement: USE OF AMPLIFICATION AND ELECTRONIC ENHANCEMENT OF BAND SONORITY



Music for All is committed to expanding the role of music and all arts in education and heightening the public's appreciation of the value of all arts education.

We believe music and all arts are core to students' education and must be available to **all students.** We are faithful to a high standard of integrity, **a strong ethical framework**, and a deep and abiding sense of respect for all with whom we interact.

Bands of America nurtures the pursuit of music-making by creating and providing **quality educational experiences for every participant.** We believe that competition is a great motivator and provides substantial opportunities for learning life lessons.

The essence of competition is to strive for performance excellence and to be **held accountable for learning. If the focus is on the learning,** the competitive climate will be valuable throughout one's life. On the other hand, the negativity associated with "winning at all costs" will be a detriment to personal growth.

Music for All's mission and core values support the principles of **fair play**, **including professional and collegial behavior.** Bands of America competition policies and guidelines are explicit regarding the expectations for all stakeholders, including performers, educators, and evaluators.

The following are examples of the parameters we believe all competing ensembles should adhere to:

 All music from traditional wind and percussion instruments or electronic instruments must be performed by a student live and in real time. • The use of **sampled**, **prerecorded**, **or sequenced sounds of woodwind and/or brass instruments is not permitted**.

Advancements in audio technology have created possibilities for participating ensembles to adapt musical performances in such a way as to minimize the involvement of every performer within the ensemble and showcase the talents of only a few. We acknowledge that, for artistic reasons, such adaptations may be appropriate and enhance the overall presentation. However, when amplification of only specific individuals during full ensemble passages leads to an intentional misrepresentation of the band sound as a whole, the instructional leadership has strayed from the core values and beliefs stated above. By enhancing the performance of only a few players, such misrepresentation of acoustic qualities is unacceptable and must be self-regulated by the participating bands.

In consideration of the Bands of America philosophy, the following was implemented for the 2023 BOA season and beyond:

• Amplifying individuals through a soundboard during tutti sections leads to an intentional misrepresentation of what is being performed by the total ensemble. This misrepresentation of acoustic quality by enhancing a few individuals is unacceptable.

• Soloists and featured ensembles may use microphones during a feature section but must be muted from amplification when not being featured.

• Where a participating band has a limited number of performers (e.g., one player to a part), the use of individual microphones is acceptable.

Bands of America has always operated with the philosophy that the priority is an educational (more than a competitive) experience. We expect our adjudicators to be mindful of philosophical perspectives while providing the **best possible educational experience for all participants** through their role as evaluators. Similarly, we encourage all educators to take a lead role in **prioritizing the educational process** when planning and designing shows, including determining any means of amplification, as well as how any sound reinforcement or manipulation of sound will be executed. Together, we must demonstrate effective methods that showcase excellent teaching and performance and not misrepresent the ensemble character by using artificial methods/devices that create a false depiction of the band sonority.


Bands of America supports all forms of creativity; however, music judges and even visual judges need to hear an accurate representation of an ensemble's sound and quality. While BOA approves the use of electronics, directors should ensure that any combination of acoustic and electronic sounds is what they want the audience, including judges, to experience.

Bands of America Adjudicators will: • be advised to **recognize and reward the acoustic qualities of the wind ensemble** over electronically produced sonority for prolonged periods of time

• consider any extraneous sounds when providing feedback and making ranking and rating decisions. This includes humming from electronic equipment, audio feedback, and acoustic sounds obscured by over-amplification or poor fidelity.

The Bands of America Judge Administration Team recommends these guidelines and philosophy with support of the BOA Advisory Committee.

Change doesn't happen in a straight line, but every step brings you closer to the culture you aim to build.

Your Growth Fuels the Program: Your program's potential is directly tied to your own growth. What kind of culture do you want to create? Reflect on your goals and the needs of your students. Consider what actions—no matter how small—could move you toward that vision.

Whether it's setting clear boundaries, creating space for student voices, or choosing repertoire that inspires curiosity and connection, every step you take brings your culture to life.

Start today. Take one action that aligns with your values and reflects the kind of program you want to build. Create moments where students feel heard and supported. Foster an environment where growth and collaboration thrive. With each decision, you're crafting the learning environment your students need and deserve.

Growth is a journey, not a destination. Trust the process, reflect often, and adjust as you learn. Every effort you make today strengthens the foundation for tomorrow, and as you invest in your growth, you inspire your students to do the same. Together, you'll build something truly remarkable.



REBUILD STRONG: Music for All in collaboration with the Indianapolis Public Schools drives meaningful change

As part of this partnership, I have provided strategic recommendations and overseen the execution of several impactful projects. A comprehensive summative report was prepared and shared with Enrichment Program leaders, detailing key recommendations for future implementation. This report was designed to inform leadership within IPS and highlight areas of concern, opportunities for growth, and a proposed 3-5 year plan.



For many years, Music for All has cultivated a strong partnership with Indianapolis Public Schools (IPS) to support and expand opportunities for fine arts students.


In 2023, IPS reinforced its commitment to this collaboration by appointing a Fine Arts Program Manager to advance the goals of the Rebuild Stronger initiative.

The plan focuses on budgets, stipends, scheduling, curriculum, professional development, the development of district -wide combined ensembles, and teacher support.

NEW Arsenal Technical H.S. Orchestra!

IPS has made remarkable progress in expanding access to fine arts education. In 2023, only 35% of K-12 students had access to fine arts classes. By the start of the 2024 school year, that number increased to 100%. Previously, IPS followed a K-8 and 9-12 educational structure. However, as of 2024, the district introduced seven standalone middle schools serving grades 6-8, each offering a robust fine arts curriculum. This restructuring not only enhances the quality of education but also allows students to begin formal music instruction in the sixth grade.



Additionally, IPS addressed a longstanding issue of insufficient equipment for band, orchestra, choir, visual arts, and piano programs. Many instruments and classroom furnishings were either outdated guided by method books, audio tracks, and video lessons.

Another milestone was the establishment of an outdoor marching band practice facility. Before 2024, no such facility existed. As of August 2024, Arsenal Technical High School now features a painted field with additional markings to enhance student learning.

To accommodate the influx of new instruments, I developed an instrument recycling program. For years, IPS schools stored broken and obsolete instruments in unused piles. This program now facilitates recycling, generates additional funds for fine arts programs, and creates more space for teachers and students. which provides project-planning guides for booster clubs of various sizes, organizational tools, and branding strategies. This session proved invaluable for IPS teachers.

2. Choral Program Support: Recognizing the need to uplift IPS choral programs, I helped to facilitate a three-day workshop with a national clinician known as "The Girl Conductor." Maria Ellis worked directly with students and teachers in IPS schools, encouraging participation and fostering a love for singing.

In collaboration with IPS, Music for All continues to drive meaningful change, ensuring that fine arts education is accessible, equitable, and impactful for all students.

or non-existent. In 2024, over \$6 million was invested in high-quality instruments and equipment for students and teachers. Significant efforts were also made to redesign and implement a district-wide fine arts curriculum aligned with the National Coalition for Arts Standards. Nearly one million dollars was spent to adopt a new curriculum for the next six years.

Elementary music programs received fine arts support as well. Each elementary school received class sets of ukuleles and instruments to introduce students to the Modern Band Method. This approach focuses on teaching popular music genres like rock, pop, and hip-hop using instruments such as guitar, bass, drums, and keyboard. Students quickly learn to play contemporary songs in a band setting, Music for All also played a pivotal role in improving professional development (PD) opportunities, which were previously minimal and poorly attended. Today, PD sessions are targeted, feature world-class clinicians, and are highly relevant, with attendance reaching 98%.

Two particularly successful PD initiatives deserve recognition:

1. Booster Program Training: IPS previously overlooked the potential of music booster programs to support classroom teachers. Music for All brought in Dr. David Vandewalker, a national expert from Georgia, to host a full-day conference. Dr. Vandewalker shared insights from his book *Strategic Plans for a Successful Booster Club*,

Music for All hosted seventy-eight music education majors at Grand Nationals for the 2024 TeachMusic Experience. Led by Susan L. Smith, participating students represented 10 states and 17 colleges/universities. In addition to meeting with leaders from Music for All and its sponsors and strategic partners, students toured Lucas Oil Stadium, enjoyed a look at BOX5's production studio, and learned essentials of ensemble audio recording from Sweetwater. Following a series of roundtable discussions with master educators, the students watched the remainder of Semi-Finals performances.

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6 Tips for Engaging Wind Rehearsals + **Downloadable Wind** Instrument Care Checklist: Differentiating instruction for a



variety of instruments all in one group can be tricky because you must keep all students engaged. I use a number of rehearsal techniques that apply to all instruments, therefore engaging everyone. Try these tips on how to rehearse your winds section and maximize your time during rehearsals!

Start with the Warmup: The warmup is when most of our instruction on fundamentals takes place. My warmups vary depending on things like how much time we have, where we are, who is missing, etc. Most of the time, we work out of a warm-up book. I encourage you to look for two things in a warm-up book: 1) it should have more exercises than just scales for everyone, and 2) it should have chorales in various keys. If your book does not have those, supplement to make sure your students are getting what they need.

For example, the book we use includes lip slurs for brass that are harmonized by the woodwinds and vice versa when the woodwinds are playing embouchure studies. Chorales provide a fundamental understanding of tone, balance, blend, tuning, etc. We make sure to do a chorale every...
